# 'Alcoholism' Film Shown To Rotary

Tuesday at noon, it was a light-hearted Bert Sinclair, public information officer for the Department of Public Safety, from Lubbock, who presented the program for the Muleshoe Rotary Club.

He was accompanied to Muleshoe by Buddy Means, DPS Trooper from department headquarters at Austin.

Sinclair was introduced by Lonnie Adrian, who was in charge of the program, with Sinclair scheduled to present a film on "Alcoholism."

"We're not preaching prudishness," said Sinclair, we're not preaching morals.

"What we're looking at is that we're killing a lot of people out on the highways. Some 56 percent of the people involved in the last accidents surveyed, proved to involve alcohol."

The DPS trooper also said there have been measures to have gun control, because guns are used to kill people. "Did you know that vehicles kill almost twice as many people in the state of Texas as guns? Are you advocating that we take vehicles away, and walk again, or get us a mule?"

The trooper emphasized that "Alcoholism is not a sickness it is an addiction. Addiction is something you can stop.

'If you think alcoholism is a sickness, I would like to ask you you, when was the last time you sent a 'get-well card' to the town drunk?"

Sinclair followed with a film he has been showing to high school and junior high school students throughout the area.

The film shows the effects of alcohol on the body, using graphic pictures, including some

# Litter Campaign Gains Big Award In Advertising

DON'T MESS WITH TEXAS, the first anithitter program in the country to target habitual litterers, has received two of the most prestigious awards in the advertising industry.

First, the American Marketing Association of New York honored the highway department's advertising campaign with a gold Effie. The Effie recognizes the highest achievement in advertising: superior results.

Then, the American Advertising Federation awarded the program a national Addy as one of the year's best advertisements. The national Addy was presented for the DON'T MESS WITH TEXAS radio commercial featuring The Fabulous Thunderbirds.

"We are, of course, excited about these awards. They are the first national advertising awards the highway department has ever received," said Don Clark, spokesperson for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

"Our best reward, however, is that this program is successfully saving tax dollars," Clark said.

The program, now in its second year, is credited with a 29% reduction in trash along Texas highways during the first year. Results for the second year are expected in August.

"Between 1970 and 1985, Texas highway litter costs increased 17-20% every year. By 1985, the annual price tag was \$24 million. With the program in place in 1986, we were able to stop the annual increase and save Texas taxpayers about \$5 million.

COLLEGE STATION — A social instory of Texas, told from the perspective of the former students and teachers of country schoolhouses of Texas' rural past, is portrayed in a new Texas A&M University Press book entitled "Ringing the Children In."

Texas A&M Press book

Authors Thad Sitton and Milam Rowold interviewed dozens of former country schoolteachers and students and sought out first-person narratives in written sources. The voices speak of strict discipline, steadfast parental support, eagerness to learn, practical jokes and pranks, physical hardships, rigid moral codes and family entertainments.

It is an oral history showing education as it was before urbanization, consolidation and integration. The book addresses the cry for a return to basics and the decades of consolidated school education have revealed that rural schools worked far better than their critics be-

One message in the book is that the old system of the one-room schoolhouse has considerable relevance to the current problems with the teaching of basic

NO-PASS, NO-PLAY A COMPROMISE

AUSTIN - Things move so fast at the end of a legislative session that sometimes it's impossible to update you in a timely manner.

Such is the case with our report on the changes that may or may not be made in the state's controversial no-pass, no-play law. By the time you read this, the proposed change may have passed the Legislature or it may have died in the

Still, what our Senate Bill 232 proposes to do to no-pass, no-play is significant enough that we are compelled to make you aware of it, no matter what the bill's fate turns out to be.

S.B. 232, as it finally passed the Senate, created a pilot program that should determine once and for all the most effective length of time to suspend a student who is ineligible for extracurricular activities.

The state currently suspends a student from extracurricular activities for six weeks if a student has a failing report card grade in any academic subject. Many people, ourselves included, feel that suspension period is just too long.

We believe six weeks discourages a student from improving his or her grades. By the time a six-week period has concluded, so has the extracurricular activity in which the student is participating. It's unfortunate some students have to be bribed with sports or whatever to make a good grade, but the fact is some students do. If our goal really is to educate the student, then we need to use the carrot on the stick in the most effective manner possible

It's our opinion three weeks would be a much better suspension period. The student would be rewarded for his or her hard work more quickly, thus having the incentive to start hitting the books

With S.B. 232, we have a chance to find out if our theory is correct. The State Board of Education will select scientifically school districts throughout the state and allow those districts to implement a three-week suspension period during the 1987-88 school year.

The academic performance of the suspended students in the select districts then will be compared with the performance of the students in the other districts. Their findings will be reported to the 71st Legislature, which in 1989 should be

able to use the test results to put the no-pass, no-play issue to rest for good.

We are aware of the criticism that surrounds S.B. 232 as it currently is written. Indeed, that criticism may sentence the bill to death. Some people, it seems, wanted three weeks outright, not some weak-kneed pilot program. Others are afraid allowing some districts to have three-week suspensions while others have six-week suspensions will give the pilot project districts an unfair competitive advantage.

Well, we sympathize with those who have such concerns because we have the exact same fears. But, we offer two pieces of political reality to explain why S.B. 232 is the way

First, there was no way the Legislature was going to pass a threeweek suspension period this session. The simple threat of a Senate filibuster held up the bill for more than a month. An actual filibuster almost certainly would have killed it. That's why we agreed to back off the immediate reduction of the

suspension period. Second, there probably is no way in the forseeable future the Legislature would reduce the suspension period without solid statistical evidence to support the move. That's why we had to go with a pilot pro-

If that pilot project proves three weeks to be more effective - and we're convinced it will - then the Legislature will have no choice in 1989 but to reduce the no-pass, no-play suspension period to three weeks. While there may be competitive sacrifice now for some, everybody will enjoy the fruits of the pilot project in the future.

So, as we write this, the new version of S.B. 232 sits in the House waiting for a hearing and perhaps last-minute passage. But, as you read it, either a curious new pilot program will be on the books or a wonderful chance to make a dent in the six-week suspension period will have been lost.
