The personnel of the bank remains the same for the present time.

While it is generally understood that the present plan of supplying a cash reserve will eventually be approved by the treasury department, nobody would hazard a guess as to when the bank might be licensed to reopen. Final action is now up to the federal reserve board and the treasury department. How soon the approval may be given depends on what lineup is at the treasury department. The best guess is probably the 17th. It was admitted that action might be had within twenty-four hours after the time the resolution and reports reached El Paso, but this would depend on how many banks were ahead of the First National with their cre-



Part of it goes to local merchants, who provide the needed material. Another part goes to the workman on the job.

After it is all said and done, to pass the oil severance tax, prediction was made that such a move was like the fable "killing the goose that laid the golden egg." Little thought was given the ultimate effect such a tax would have on one of the state's basic industries in the mad scramble to reduce the tax burden on part of the state at the expense of the other part, but now the effect of such a tax must be apparent to the dumbest of the politicians. The first blow struck by the operating oil companies ought to make the proverbial "goose" groggy, and anybody outside of the political circles should see the hand writing on the wall. Oil operators have simply to rub his hands and feet to relieve restorted to the way of the least resistance in showing their disapproval of an unjust form of taxation by handing the state back the pain. There are only two courses opened to get the state out of the mess, which the Seligman political machine has unhesitatingly precipitated us into and one is to have the severance tax declared unconstitutional by the courts and the other is to submit the issue to the people through a referendum.

When one shows a disposition to adjust himself to his new found position, forgetting the personal sacrifices or the humiliation connected with it, then he is in position to start a come back and the hard times and depression are over so far as he is concerned.

Today we see a striking contrast between our state executive and the national executive, both masking under the name of a democrat. The chief executive had the good grace to ask for powers amounting to practicaly a dictator. He got it. The state executive did not ask, but got it anyway through political machinery. And is he using it? Watch the appointments of the various boards.

### Kentucky's Mammoth Cave Was Discovered by Hunter

Mammoth cave, the largest known cavern in the world, was discovered in 1809 by a hunter named Hutchins. It is situated in Edmonson county, Kentucky, near Green river, about 125 miles southwest of Lexington. There are several streams in the cave, the principal one being Echo river, which is nearly threequarters of a mile long and communicates with Green river. The Styx is about 450 feet long and crossed by a remarkable natural bridge. There are avenues which extend for miles, and great chambers spacious enough to hold skyscraper office buildings. All of the halls offer to view a great variety of crystals and incrustations, stalagmites and stalactites, and with the cataracts and fountains form a most picturesque scenery.

Trips through the cave are arranged at certain hours under the direction of expert guides. Trips 1 and 2 require only a fey hours. Trip 3, which is about seven miles. takes about half a day. Trip 4, which is said to be nearly 20 miles, takes an entire day, and requires

### CARBON DIOXIDE TO **CURE DEADLY COUGH**

### Gas Also Effective in Other Respiratory Ills.

London.-Carbon dioxide, the gas that makes the bubbles in soda water, is being used as a remedy for whooping cough.

The treatment of one of the most distressing and intractable of the minor maladies attacking infant life is the result of a long series of experiments with carbon dioxide carried out by two British specialists in infantile complaints.

Their new treatment does not demand expert handling-the dosage can be handled by any ordinary practitioner.

Carbon dioxide is mixed with oxygen in the proportion of seven parts of carbon dioxide to ninety-three of oxygen.

It is given through a gas mask of the type used by dentists or released in a tent erected over the patient's bed. As a result of this treatment, one





# WOOL ADVANCES AFTER BANK HOLIDAY

The downward trend in wool prices which began in the Boston wool market in October was abruptly checked when trading was resumed following the national bank holiday, reports the Bureau of Agricultural Economics. By the second week of activity quotations on most grades of territory wool had been advanced 2 to 4 cents a pound above those ruling the end of February, and, despite opposition offered to the mark up, sufficient orders were received to establish the higher quotations. By the middle of March conditions were in distinct contrast to those ruling at the close of February when the market was largely at a standstill but trading became less active toward the end of the month.

Consumption of combing and clothing wool by the United States manufacturer reporting to the Bureau of the Census in January was equal to that reported for December and was 11 per cent above consumption in January 1932. Trading in the Boston market fell off rapidly during February, however, and the unsettled financial conditions in March greatly hindered business and manufacturing activity during that month. Wool imports thus far in 1933 have been extremely small Only 1,300,000 pounds of combing and clothing wool were received at the ports of Boston, New York and Philadelphia from January 1 to March 18 of this year compared with 6,141,000 pounds imported in the corresponding period of 1932.

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
