

Side by side with the demand for national and international news is that for knowlege of one's friends, one's acquaintances, one's neighbors. AGAIN THE Y-O CROSSING

The issue in the Y-O crossing controversy is clear-cut: shall Roswell be permitted to divert business from a trade territory which is Artesia's by right of development.

The conversion of the roads west of Artesia into the mountains reducing his rations. from wagon trails to their present condition represents six years of intense effort, six years of work, lobbying and persuasion with the state highway department, with the state forest service and with every other branch of the state government which might have been of help. They are the achievement of a number of local people active in civic affairs, utterly unassisted by any group or individual in Roswell.

And now, with the road west of the Y-O crossing improved by no efforts of their own, the Roswell Chamber of Commerce, by urging that \$25,000 be spent on the road from the crossing to Roswell, endeavors to benefit at our expense.



located on the block of a little more than 640 acres of land owned by the University of Texas, which are producing oil of 56 to 60 degrees gravity, the highest grade yet found in any oil field in Texas. These wells are producing from a depth ranging from 8,500 feet to 9,020 feet. The largest producer in this group has a potential flow at this time of more than 5,000 barrels adily. The total production of 10 wells of this group since their completion is approximately 15,000,000 barrels.

The first of these deep stratum wells was completed November 30, 1928, its depth being 8,520 feet. Since then it has been deepened to 8,761 feet. It has a production record of more than 2, 660,000 barrels. The cost of drilling this well was approximately \$250,000 and each of the other wells, drilled to the great depth from which this production is obtained, have cost more than \$200,-000. At this time there are four wells being drilled in the deep



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

HEALTH COLUMN

Conducted by Dr. J. R. Earp, Director, New Mexico Bureau of Public Health.

CALCIUM IN PREGNANCY

The average American diet has been shown to contain just under oone-half a gram of calcium daily. The need of the average man or woman for calcium is estimated at one-gram daily. It is clear, therefore, that most adults get less calcium in their food than they need.

The amount of calcium in the skeleton of a growing baby increases from 5 grams at the twenty-eighth week of pregnancy to 30 grams at the time of birth. Thus in the last twelve weeks of pregnancy the mother needs 25 grams of calcium, more than two grams weekly, for her child besides one gram daily for herself. And still the average diet supplies her with but half a gram daily.

When the diet contains less than enough of this mineral the mother's body suffers so that the child may have as much as possible. Calcium is taken from her teeth and bones to go into the building of her child.

The Brush Foundation in Cleveland studies growth in children from the earliest stages in order to find out for us how we may fashion a finer race of men. Says Dr. T. Wingate Todd, director of the Brush Foundation: "Many expectant mothers, suffering from lac of minerals and vitamins in the diet, produce children already handicapped in the developmental growth at birth. Dental caries in expectant mothers is but one symptom of the lack of adequate calcium, phosphorus and vitamin C, without which the foetus cannot expect to thrive. The parents must not wait to consult a physician until shortly before the birth is due. If the child is to have his rightful chance this consultation must occur immediately pregnancy is recognized and it is advantageous to begin the consultation even earlier to ensure favorable conditions at conception.'

UNTIL WE LEARNED BETTER

Until we learned better, we used to mix wood and steel in our car bodies and wheels.

It was the best way to make bodies -- then. But the state of the art has advanced.

Of course, it is more expensive to make an all-steel body than to make a wooden frame and nail steel panels on to it. The better way involves an initial expenditure of several millions of dollars for new dies, which renders a change very costly. Cars, especially large expensive cars which are produced in small volume, cannot afford this, because the dies cost as much for one car as for a million. That alone explains why allsteel bodies are not used in all cars.

But our basic policy from the beginning is to make a good car better, regardless of cost.

For example, when we discarded wood-steel body construction, it was not because we lacked wood. We still have some thousands of acres of the best hard wood in America. Economy would urge us to use up the wood first, and then adopt the better all-steel body. But we decided that quality was more important than expense.

We weighed the reasons, for and against, before we made the change. We could see only one reason for retaining a mixed wood-and-steel body -nailing the metal on, instead of welding an all-steel body into a strong one-piece whole. That reason was, it would be cheaper -- for us.

Our reasons for adopting an all-steel body were these: A wood-steel body is not much stronger structurally than its wooden frame. In all American climates, wood construction weakens with age. Every used car lot gives evidence of this. Rain seeps in between joints and the wood decays. A car may have a metal surface, and yet not be of steel construction. Under extreme shock or stress the steel body remains intact-dented perhaps, but not crushed.

Steel does not need wood for strength or protection. Wood is fine for furniture, but not for the high speed vehicles of 1933.

In the Ford body there are no joints to squeak, no seams to crack

The all-steel body is more expensive -- to us, but not to you. By all odds, then, steel bodies seem preferable.

Wheels also have become all-steel. No one argues that an electrically welded one-piece steel wheel, such as the Ford wheel, needs to be "strengthened" by adding wood to it.

The one-piece all-steel body is the strongest, safest, quietest, most durable body made. That is our only reason for making them.

VESELY TO LEASE TWO MILLION ACRES **NEW MEXICO LAND**

Upwards of two million acres of state land has gone unleased for years, State Land Commissioner Frank Vesely said, and he is going to do something about it.

A quiet survey of records has been going on in his office for months, he said, to determine why the state land revenue was not as large as he thought it should be. He says another \$60,000 likely can be added yearly to the land office revenue.

With all the disturbance over the Ickes fence order, the land office spurred its efforts to complete the survey. At present about two million acres is shown on a number of maps as land not leas-

Vesely would not comment on the fences. He said his concern was getting the state its just revenue. He said there had not been a personal investigation of the report that fences had closed much

It had been said in some places that state land would be leased and fences so constructed as to block off unleased land, giving the leasor the advantage of a number of sections on which no rental was paid. That was true in one case, Vesely said, where a man applied for several sections between two ranches, He had been informed the land was leased, but investigation at the land office showed it was not leased, but was

land had been leased. This block of land was leased to the applicant over the protest of the ranch adjoining, but Vesely said the land had not been leased before and no rental had been paid for at least three years.

In his effort to get all the state Mand paying the three cents an acre rental, Vesely said he would complete the survey and would advertise all unleased land, open to first-come-first-served at the regular rate. To avoid this, any steckmen who have been taking advantage of lands by surrounding them with leases, can apply to the land office to lease the surrounded land at the regular rental.

NEW RULING TROUT FISHING

SANTA FE - Fishermen may bring home only one day's limit in trout whether they have been fishing a day or a week, under a new regulation adopted by the state game commission.

State Game Warden Elliott Barker said Monday the one-day limit is 25 trout or 15 pounds plus one trout.

Barker has been authorized to put on a new deputy for the northeastern district. It was said the place was offered to Tom Holder, Jr., of Taos.
