

CLIMBING OUT

Remedies have been applied the past eighteen months to bring us out of four unsatisfactory years that our grandfathers would never have listened to. WHEREAS, the Artesia Welfare committee has recommended to the Artesia Chamber of Commerce, in strenuous terms, that street fairs and street carnivals are a detriment and a liability to the City of Artesia in the performance of their duties inasmuch as it effects the labors of the Artesia Welfare committee di-

rectly, and, WHEREAS, in their opinion the benefits to be derived from a street fair or carnival are negligable, compared to the suffering that will be caused to some indigent families, and the work of the Welfare committee that will





A good way to store ally agreed, however, that their STATE HAS RIGHT TO KEEP in New Mexico is to pull the quality is improved by freezing. heads with roots intact and place them head down in trenches or furrows which are eight to ten inches deep. Fill the furrows or trench, leaving only a short portion of the root projecting. If the weather later on becomes abnormally severe, more dirt should be piled over the furrows or trench. If drainage is not good, it is well to dig a shallow trench beside the stored cabbage, to carry away excess water. A moderate amount of frost will not injure cabbage in storage. It should not be removed while frozen.

Onions-Onions should not be pulled until the top becomes yellow and dry, or until you are sure that the bulbs are entirely mature. After pulling, they may be left for several days in the shade to dry. Be sure that the tops are perfectly dry before the onions are put in storage. Cut the tops off and examine the necks closely to see that they are entirely dry. Be sure there are no green sprouts. A sprout that is not completely dry will allow the organisms that cause neck rot to enter, and the bulb will rot in storage.
