





Depression and Sickness In spite of the depression, death rates from all causes have been going down. In New Mexico the general death rate declined from 15.8 in 1929 to 11.5 in 1932. The death rates in New Mexico from tuberculosis, a disease known to be made worse by undernourishment, have been 191.3 in 1929, 183.4 in 1930, 149.5 in 1931 and 140.2 in 1932.

Yet it is so hard to believe that the depression with its associated unemployment and poverty has had no ill effect on health that search is still being made to find some hitherto unobserved results.
