

The argument for keeping schools open is that the children can be more closely supervised by school nurses who are able to recognize in the earliest stages the symptoms of the disease. It is held that when the children are excluded from school they still come into contact with each other and amongst them there are more likely to be unrecognized cases spreading the infection.

Several years ago it was comclose schools and for this reason there was always more public criticism when schools are kept at the school to care for the cases open than when they are closed. The public who do not read the special journals on epidemiology and public health are strangely apt to assume that they know more about the subject than does the health officer. Hasty criticism should be with-

held. In New Mexico it is not at all easy to decide in any given case which is the wiser policy. Recently schools were closed in one case of a threatened epidemic of scarlet fever. There were special reasons for this action. More recently they were kept open in a measles epidemic. Again the

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


