

DEATH ON THE HIGHWAY

Early in 1933, there were fewer automobile accidents than during same period in 1932.

Duing the last half of 1933, however, the trend changed. In the year, 30,500 persons were killed—a 3½ per cent advance over

The automobile accident toll follows the amount of gasoline used in the country with almost loving exactitude. During the first half of 1933, for example, when gas consumption was 3 per cent below the same period in 1932, there were fewer accidents. During the last half gas use was 2.5 per cent above-and the accident record soared accordingly. The dangerous driver seems to have learned little from the ghastly experience of the past. He still exaggerates the safety factors of better cars and roads. He still cuts in and out of traffic, still passes on blind curves and hills, still takes a chance to save a second. And he leaves behind him a shambles of deaths and injuries and needlessly ruined property.

Everything that mechanical and road engineers can do to make motoring safer, is being done-an extremely small percentage of accidents can be blamed on car failure or poor roads. "What can be done with the land rented to the government" is a question foremost in the interesting address. minds of farmers who sign the cotton contract.

The contract provides the following uses for the land taken out of cotton production: Soil-improving crops; erosion-preventing crops; food crops for consumption by the producer on this farm; feed crops for the production of livestock or livestock products for consumption or use by the producer on this farm; fallowing; or such other uses as may be permitted by the secretary or his authorized agent.

The farmer cannot grow any crop on contracted acres for sale,

directly or indirectly. Erosion, or soil, washing, removes about twenty times as much soil fertility per acre as crops take out each year. Wher-ever the soil is not held by freezing, the loss of plant food from erosion in winter is serious. Out of the 15,000,000 acres of land to be removed from cotton production, much will be badly damaged in 1934 from erosion if it is not properly terraced.

Many cotton farmers fail to provide for a family living from the farm because of the low yields received from the land set aside for production of home supplies. The cotton contract permits the production of food and feed on the rented acres, for use on the farm. CATTLE ON FEED SHOWS A DECREASE

There was a decrease of about 3.5 percent in the number of cattle on feed for market in the eleven corn belt states on January 1, 1934, over the number on January 1, 1933, according to the cattle feeding estimate of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics. There were decreases in all states except Iowa and Nebraska, where small increases are estimated. The decreases in the area east of the Mississippi river, where cattle feeding has been increasing for several years, amounted to 17 percent. In the area west of the Mississippi, the decrease was only 6 percent in spite of a decrease of 50 percent in South Dakota.

In the western states the number of cattle on feed January 1, able. 1934, was not greatly different from the number a year earlier, a small decrease being indicated. In Texas and Oklahoma, however, the number on feed this year was sharply reduced with the estimated number this year for the two states combined one-third less than a year earlier.
