Thousands Injured In **Riots** In **ParisFrance**

Streets of Paris Scene of **Bloody Rioting. Scores** Injured—Fear Expressed for Overthrow of the Government.

PARIS, France-Scores were wounded-including two Americans -in a renewed outburst of rioting in the heart of Paris last night which laid waste blocks of the city's streets.

Vandalism and guerrilla warfare left the Boulevard des Capucines strewn with glass from shattered shop windows and lighted by the fires of burning blocks. The Champs Elysees, the Rue Royale and streets leading to the presidential palace all bore marks of the insurrectionary disorders.

Premier Edouard Daladier stepped out as a result of Tuesday's bloody fighting, and President Albert Lebrun immediately called the beloved 70-year-old Gaston situation.





The national board of which Secretary Ickes is a member has said that unless the states speeded up their requests, available money would be given other states showing a more aggressive attitude.

Col. J. D. Atwood of Roswell, member of the state public works, states the claim that state projects are held up for want of legislative approval is a false alibi and that only ten of the fifty-three projects sent to Washington from New Mexico need legislative approval and that the government could have acted on the other forty-three involving \$6,000,000. Ex-Governor Otero, back from Washington last week, says Col. Atwood's statement is all wet. Otero, who conferred with the New Mexico legislative representatives, says the state will get the money as soon as the legislature passes the necessary laws.
