





ABUSES OF THE LAW At a recent annual meeting of the American Bar Association it is openly admitted by prominent members that public confidence the courts and their administration of the law is being steadily kened. A report was adopted denouncing "the growing prevalency of use of expert witnesses, with their conflicting testimony." This erred particularly to the use of alienists in criminal cases, where erts may always be secured to testify that the accused is insane, wided he has the money to employ them. As a matter of fact, lawyers in convention very frequently icise the prevailing method of criminal procedure, but so far y have done very little to correct it. Legislators are also to blame for the present state of affairs, as most legislators are lawyers the responsibility still rests nost wholly upon the legal profession. By the passage of innumerable laws regulating everything under sun, and imposing upon peace officers the task of enforcing ial and often foolish statutes, the perpretator of major crimes h as murder and robbery have all the better chance to escape inshment.
