itself, should be converted to wiser uses. Self-sustaining land-use ac-
tivities should be estalished. To
serve that purpose the Public
Works Administration has Works Administration has alllo-
cated $\$ 25,000,000$ for the purchase
of land in problem areas and for the testing of plans by which a
rational federal and state land
policy may be developed for such areas.
"The plan is to set up sub-
marginal land acquisition projects n regions, first of all, where local
relief problems are most acute.
But before any project is set or beyore any project is set up,
or any land bought, it is imper-
ative that aceptabe plans be
devised for the resettlement devised for the resettlement of the
present occupants of that land,
that the present occupants be given ample opportunity to ap-
prove or disapprove such plans,
and that the project proceed only and that the project proceed only
with the assured cooperation of
the settlers and of agencies."
According to federal regulations a complete reinvestigation of each
family on relief is required for family on relief is required for
the new program. After the in-
vestigation, detailed budget is worked out for each family, based
upon the number of persons, other
resources available, then resources available, the locality,
et cetera. This is a large task
and requires time. The investiga-
ting and budet. and requires time. The investigk-
ting and budgeting are done by the
local relief committee through local relief eommittee through a
trained scoial worker where one is available, and where where one is
committee itself. When the family
has been certified for need by
the has been certified for need by
the social worker, the name is
referred to the county project manager for work. county project
The working hours per day are not less than hours per day are
than eight. The monthly mine more than eight. The monthly minimum
is eighten hours. The hours are
regulated so that the maximum regulated so that the maximum
weekly earnings shall not in any
