

Weekend Rainfall Helps Area Crops

Farmers and ranchers in the area have welcomed the weekend rain that has deposited up to four inches of moisture in the county, but almost all said what is needed now is "bright, hot sunshine" to help cotton crops

During the weekend, on Sunday and Sunday night, rain measured from near one inch to more than four inches in the southwestern part of Bailey County, leaving fields soggy, and many roads partially under

An additional one half inch of moisture was received on Monday evening in far west Bailey

County, as a storm cloud moved from the south to the north, inundating already flooded cotton and grain sorghum fields.

Sunday was also the coolest day for this summer, as the temperature stayed below 70 degrees all day, as a slow, gentle rain fell in Muleshoe.

Rain gauges in Muleshoe recorded from an inch and a half to nearly two inches of water, while rain gauges in southwest Bailey County showed up to four inches of rain.

Cotton farmers said that although they appreciated the rain, hot, dry, sunshiny weather was needed for the cotton crops to mature.

Almost all farmers were in agreement that this years crops are the 'best looking' crops in this entire area for many, many

Wednesday morning, cloudy skies were evident, and the National Weather Service predicted a 70 percent chance for additional moisture for the day, with the same type weather expected to hold through to the weekend.

Although some areas to the south of Lubbock received severe weather Tuesday afternoon and evening, no severe weather was reported in this immediate area.

Monday evening, a truck apparently hydroplaned on the slick highway about nine miles west of Muleshoe, causing one trailer to overturn in the median.

No injuries resulted in the turnover. Quite by coincidence, lightning struck a nearby highline

pole, setting the pole on fire. Startled motorists saw a trailer overturned, and the top of a light pole burning, and in

Bollworms Found Here; **Check All Cotton Fields**

MISD Coaches Visit Rotary; Discuss Year

Reports of bollworm infestations to the east and north of Muleshoe are starting to be widespread in cotton fields. Producers should be checking all cotton fields at this time on a 3-to-4 day interval for bollworm eggs or small larvae. Cotton fields that were treated for thrips of fleahoppers should be checked very closely because beneficial numbers could be low in these fields and not keeping bollworm numbers under control.

Small larvae, less than 1/4 inch, can be found anywhere on the plant. Often they are seen feeding beneath the bracts on small squares, in the terminal or on unopened blooms. Larvae are also commonly found in blooms both open and dried. These tiny larvae can also tunnel into thumbnail-size bolls, leaving only a small hole indicating their presence.

The majority of the bollworms

found this week were still in the small category, less than 3 days old. This stage causes no significant damage and is readily controlled because they are exposed to the insecticide at the time of treatment or will soon move to another feeding site and contact residual insecticide. Economic infestations were common in many fields and growers are advised to inspect their fields to assess bollworm infestation.

Since bollworms and bollworm eggs can be found anywhere on the plant, the whole plant inspection method is recommended. The terminal area and all the fruit should be inspected on a random sample of plants across the field. Record bollworm larvae as smal! (less than 1/4 inch), medium (1/4-1/2 inch) and large (over 1/2 inch). The number of bollworm eggs or larvae per acre can be Cont. Page 6, Col. 4


Wiese (Weed Scientist from Bushland). (C) Legal Aspects of Herbicide Laws - by Gordon H. Green,
