# Tax Fables

You may have your personal preference as to what color of horse you like. You may paint a black horse red or a white horse brown, but after you have done this you still have a horse, although his color may be different. And the same thing applies to taxes, whether you pay them under the name of sales tax, intangible tax, gross income tax or what not. Perhaps one name sounds better than another but after all, the money you pay to the support of your government is a tax.

The progressive republicans are pledged for the immediate repudiation of the sales tax, which they say is too great a burden on the poor. Practically all citizens understand that the present sales tax was passed as an emergency measure and is still classed as an emergency measure.

To lift the burden imposed by the sales tax, a gross income tax of one percent is proposed. How would the gross income tax operate? Take the merchant, for instance. The wholesaler would pay the one percent, which would be passed on to the retailer and the retailer would pay one percent which would be passed on to the consumer, who would still be subject to the one percent, making a total of THREE PERCENT paid by the consumer. In what way is this different from the sales tax, except the percentage is higher, and is the consumer any better off? You can answer!

Another tax proposed by the republicans is an intangible tax. Perhaps you may not know what an intangible tax is, but think back about five years. You will recall New Mexico had an intangible tax on oil and minerals. This tax practically succeeded in stopping all oil and mineral development, but it was never enforced and leading republicans fought it just as bitterly as anybody else. Your land, if you have any, may be potential oil, sulphur or potash land and you may have opportunity to lease it, but do you know any yardstick that can be successfully used in measuring the value of your lease or royalty? You can answer!

The republicans propose an oil severance tax. You remember New Mexico had an oil severance tax of four cents per barrel about two years ago and you remember when oil went to ten cents per barrel. The severance tax, apparently small as it was, represented forty percent of the profit from oil. Do you think the oil industry, now paying fourteen different kinds of taxes, would continue to operate in New Mexico? And do you know that the gasoline you buy now for eighteen and twenty cents per gallon, eight and a half to nine cents of this cost is represented in taxes? You car owners, how much tax are you willing to stand? You can answer!

New Mexico is comparatively poor in taxable wealth. We realize that we do not have as many taxable sources as other states and therefore may not be able to extend the benefits of governments as extensively as other states and to offer to extend public benefits as the republicans propose to do would mean a greater expense in taxes, regardless of the tax name. Who will pay for these benefits? You can answer!

During the past four years, the average advalorem tax has been reduced about twenty-six percent in Eddy county. While doing this the highway system has been extended and improved and the school system extended and improved, including free text books for the first three lower grades. Other progressive social service has been inaugurated and other improvements made as rapidly as general conditions would permit.

Do you want governmental and social benefits inaugurated as New Mexico citizens are able to pay for them, or do you still believe in fairy tales?

#### Trained to Save Lives

First aid certificates were issued by the Red Cross last year to 130,-972 persons who finished the course of instruction put on by the chapters. Included in this list were more than Cross chapters, at the request of strikes. the War Department, are giving first aid instruction in CCC camps. Where it has been requested by Army engineers the same instruction is also made available to key men working on federal water conservancy and flood control projects.

#### War Veterans' Problems Increase

Last year American Red Cross chapters dealt with the problems of nearly 400,000 veterans and their families. The workers find that as the years go on their responsibility increases rather then decreases. Changes in legislation, the increasing age of veterans and the consequent increase in physical ills, bring ment by trained Red Cross workers. In addition to this service to veterans the Red Cross served as the official medium between the people and the men in military and naval service, giving aid through this service last year to 6,979 men in the army, navy and marine corps.

#### Busy Year for Volunteers

Red Cross volunteers made nearly five million garments last year; they prepared 342,366 pages of handtranscribed braille and 314,788 by the duplicated process; 16,132 place 10 minute Christmas bags, 3,678,831 surgical dressings and 18,475 layettes were prepared, and many other valuable community services were reported by chapter volunteers.

of sparkling, bright colored jelly is a tactful gesture. It makes the family forget that they are being fed left-overs. Red Spiced Jelly and cold meat go together like ham and eggs. Unfallies it has no fruit in

Red Spleed Jelly 1¼ cups water; ¼ cup apple vinegar; 2 three-inch sticks cinnamon; 1 tablespoon whole cloves; 2 teaspoons whole allspice; 3½ cups (1 ib. 7 oz.) sugar; red coloring; ½ bottle fruit pectin.

Measure water, vinegar, and spices into 3-quart saucepan. Bring quickly to a boil. Remove from fire, cover, and let stand in warm place 10 minutes.

Measure sugar into seucepan and mix with spices and liquid. Place over hottest fire, and while mixture is coming to a boil, add coloring to give desired shade. As soon as mixture boils, add bottled fruit pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1/4 minute. Remove from fire: remove spices. Skim, pour quickly. To remove all traces of spices, pour hot jelly through fine sieve into glasses. Parafin hot jelly at once. Makes about 5 glasses (6 fluid

At that time we tried also to see Senator Cutting but he was on a vacation as I recall in the northern part of the state.

Some time elapsed and finally word came to us from Washington that Mr. Chavez was behind a move to secure for us what the act October 25, 1934.

intended we should get. Thinking that some additional help from Mr. Cutting would not be amiss, we wired him. His secretary informed us that he was traveling in Europe.

You will understand that the Emergency Act was passed at the session of the Congress of March and April 1933, immediately following the inauguration of the present President into office.

That summer, our efforts failed to get the loans to which we were rightfully entitled by the Act.

That fall when Congress again convened, the fall of 1933, Mr. Chavez was very busy, but not too busy to render us most valuable assistance. Congress was in session, Senator Cutting was traveling in Europe, and we needed help to save our farms-not only we, but multiplied thousands all over the country; none of us were getting anywhere, because of red tape and various so-called rulings on the Emergency Act.

Congressman Chavez, writing to me, said: "If we cannot get what is due the hard-pressed farmers under the Act as it now reads, I shall introduce a Bill to so amend it again that we do get it." But he kept working between the Land Commissioner at Washington and others until finally he secured the necessary ruling to permit of the proper functioning of the Act to our benefit.

I have gone into detail in explaining this to you because it so graphically reflects the activities of the two men now running for U. S. Senator as it affects the State of New Mexico.





WASHINGTON - Among other issues, future liquor control policies are at stake in the November next July 1, will be recommended conferences between the industrial

The men elected to congress will be called upon to frame a permanent liquor control system. The codes which now regulate distillers, brewers, wholesalers, blenders and wine-makers will expire June 16, 1935.

As to the states, a check by the Anti-Saloon League shows Florida, Idaho, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, West Virginia and Wyoming will vote November 6 on state prohibition repeal. California will ballot on a proposal for local option. Communities in Ohio and a number of other states will decide local liquor questions.

The bureau found burglary the most prevalent crime among eighteen and nineteen year olds. During the half year, it was said 6,253 persons under twenty-one were arrested for this offense. Larceny, with 5,835 arrests, was second among the more youthful criminals, while disorderly conduct, drunkenness and vagrancy was third with 3,961 cases. In addition there were, among persons under twenty-one, 2,459 cases of robbery, 2,458 of auto theft, 309 of criminal homicide, 499 of rape,



Peanut Brittle Trifle 1/3 cup quick-cooking tapioca; egg whites, stiffly beaten; 1 teaspoon flavoring; peanut brittle,

coarsely crushed

Combine quick-cooking tapioca, sugar, salt, egg yolk, and milk in top of double boiler and stir enough to break egg yolk. Place over rapidly boiling water, bring to scalding point (allow 5 to 7 minutes), and cook 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Remove from boiling water. Fold a small amount into egg whites; add to remaining tapioca mixture and blend. Cool -mixture thickens as it cools. When slightly cool, add flavoring; chill. Fold in peanut brittle. Serve in sherbert glasses. Top with additional coarsely crushed peanut brittle, and garnish with whipped cream, if desired.
