Chief Function of a Bank

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

COLUMBIA, S. C.—Governor Lots 1, 2, 3, 6, 7, 8, 9, Sec. 5-I. C. Blackwood urged governors | 16-26. of twelve other southern states Warranty Deed: to call state-wide meetings of their farmers to draft "a thoughtfully prepared cotton control program for a period of years" upon expiration of the Bankhead act. Pointing out that the national government had initiated "three separate programs of cotton production control" since June, 1933, the South Carolina executive urged that "the farmers of the belt themselves have a voice in planning" a permanent control measure to take effect in 1935.

Governor Blackwood quoted a resolution adopted at a state-wide meeting of cotton farmers here October 2 in which the farmers said suspension of control in 1935 would mean over-production "that will again drive prices to a four to six-cent level.'

Cotton growers of each South Carolina county are to meet November 15, the governor continued, to decide details of a permanent program and elect one delegate for each thousand farmers to attend a statewide meeting November 20 to work out a substitute for the Bankhead act.
