This service in recent years has been rendered through auspices of the Chamber of Commerce. Now, the FERA has definitely taken over this type of relief and any and every hungry person may secure relief at the relief office in the old First National Bank building.

Some seeking relief have reported to merchants that the local relief agency will not care for them. This is a falsehood and such people should be reported to the police at once.

In order to give relief, certain questions are asked with the purpose to try to rehabilitate the applicant. No one who will cooperate with the local relief will go hungry. As the cold weather comes on and work becomes scarce, more hungry applicants will appear. The citizens of Artesia will do a kindness to these people if they refuse to give them "hand-outs" either in food or cash, but send them to the relief office. 

SUGAR BEET SEED CAN BE GROWN IN N. M.

ago, accidentally, that sugar beet seed planted in the fall would develop a crop that would seed the following spring. Thru this method the sugar beet seed industry has been developed on a small scale in southern New Mex-

Approximately \$100,000 worth of seed was shipped out of the Mesilla Valley in 1934. This fall, there were approximately 1,000 acres planted for harvest in 1935. This indicates that this crop will become of considerable importance in the near future in this valley.

The consumption of beet seed in the United States is approximately twelve million pounds and by assuming that each acre in outhern New Mexico planted to this crop will produce two thousand pounds, it will readily be seen the acreage that will be needed to produce this crop.

Sugar beet seed grown in and around Las Cruces has proved equally as viable and suited to northern planting as the ordinary German seed which has been imported in recent years.

The canvass made no material difference in the tabulations as announced last week.
