Ex. Governor Fund Total \$147 Hagerman Dies At N. M. Capitol

Death Strikes Swiftly To Take One of the State's Pioneer Citizens; Was Interested in Development of Pecos Valley.

SANTA FE - Death Tuesday took Herbert James Hagerman, 63, former territorial governor of New Mexico, a focal point in many 7,000 birthday balls for the benefit political battles in the state, and one-time diplomatic service em-

Stricken with stomach trouble last week, Hagerman did not show any danger signs until a few hours before his death. He was taken to St. Vincent's hospital in Santa Fe, but early Tuesday life expired. Hagerman was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, December 15, 1871, and was graduated from Cornell University. He practiced law in Colorado before he went to Russia as second secretary of the em-

bassy from 1898 to 1901. Returning to the United States, he came to New Mexico where his parents had settled. 

1. WHO MAY APPLY?

Any property owner, individual, ership or corporation with a regular income from salary, com-missions, business, or other assured source. It is not necessary to be a depositor in the financial institution consulted.

2. TO WHOM DO I APPLY?

To any National Bank, State Bank or Trust Company, Savings Bank, Industrial Bank, Building and Loan Association, or Finance Company approved by the Federal Housing Administration; or to a contractor

3. HOW MUCH MAY I APPLY FOR?

From \$100 to \$2,000, depending on your income, for improvements on any one property, and in connection with not more than five properties unless approved by the Federal Housing Administration, Washing-

4. HOW LONG MAY NOTES RUN?

For any number of months from one to three years. (Notes extend-ing from 37 months to five years may be submitted to the Federal Housing Administration by finan-cial institutions for special con-

5. WHAT SECURITY IS REQUIRED?

That you have an adequate regular income and a good credit record in

6. WHAT ASSURANCE NEED I GIVE?

(a) That you own the property.
 (b) That the income of the signers of the note is at last five times the annual payments on

(c) That your mortgage, if any, is in good standing, and that there are no other past due encumbrances or liens against

your property. That you will use the proceeds SOLELY for property im-

7. WHAT SIGNATURES ARE REQUIRED ON THE NOTE?

Signature of the property owner; and (except in special cases) if the owner is an individual and is mar-ried, also of wife or husband. No other co-signers or endorsers are

8. WHAT IS THE COST

OF THE CREDIT? The financial institution may not collect as interest and/or discount and/or fee of any kind, a total charge in excess of an amount equivalent to \$5 discount per year per \$100 original face amount of



corn production. Since 1920-21, as indicated by the bottom line in the graph above, there have been three peaks of heavy hog slaughter-the marketing years of 1923-24, 1928-29, and 1933-34. The increases in hog slaughter during these years can be traced to the big corn crops during the periods beginning in 1920, in 1928, and again in 1932, as shown by the top line above. .

Over a period of years, a change of one per cent in corn production has been followed by a corresponding change of about one per cent in the number of hogs slaughtered un-

Because of this fundamental relationship, effective control of corn acreage is a vital factor in control-

ling hog production. Lack of adequate acreage control in 1935 not only would result in a large surplus of corn and low feed prices, but undoubtedly would be followed in 1936 and 1937 by heavy hog feeding and der Federal inspection.
