





Health Column

Behind the Stammer Bad stammerers may be quite good actors. While they are living as an assumed personality they speak perfectly; only when they become themselves again do they stammer. Most stammerers can speak perfectly to themselves talking to the looking glass all alone in their own rooms. Careful questioning usually reveals that a stammerer can talk to one or more individuals whom he knows very well without any difficulty: one boy could speak easily with his fiancee but with no one else.

The stammerer suffers from no organic defect. Operations are useless. Breathing exercises and vocal exercises are of value for the psychological effect only. Behind the stammer is always an emotional disturbance of the personality. From what has already been said it will be clear that the fundamental trouble is a feeling of insufficiency or of inferiority. To laugh at a stammerer, to make fun of his infirmity, is to do him the greatest possible wrong. Children who stammer should be protected from situations which fbring out their weakness and embarass them. At the same time every effort should be made to build up their confidence in themselves. Give them work to do which they can accomplish well and praise the accomplishment. Special classes for children who stammer such as are described by C. S. Bluemel in his book "Mental Aspects of Stammering" are of value because the association with other children who have the same difficulty removes the sense of inferiority and enables all the pupils together gradually to acquire confidence in them-


The prevention of stammering depends on avoiding the habit of snubbing children when their first efforts fail. To discourage a child, to break down his trust in his own abilities should be a penal offense.





Behind the Stammer Bad stammerers may be quite good actors. While they are living as an assumed personality they speak perfectly; only when they become themselves again do they stammer. Most stammerers can speak perfectly to themselves talking to the looking glass all alone in their own rooms. Careful questioning usually reveals that a stammerer can talk to one or more individuals whom he knows very well without any difficulty: one boy could speak easily with his fiancee but with no one else.

The stammerer suffers from no organic defect. Operations are useless. Breathing exercises and vocal exercises are of value for the psychological effect only. Behind the stammer is always an emotional disturbance of the personality. State Gas Taxes Raised Over 1934

TULSA, Oklahoma-State taxes on gasoline reached a new high total of \$565,027,000 in 1934, and, added to federal gasoline taxes of \$170,109,000, increased the cost of motor fuel by a grand total of \$735,136,000.

Reports of 1934 state gasoline tax collections, received from the U.S. Bureáu of Public Roads by the Oklahoma Petroleum Industries committee, indicate that receipts from this source were roundly \$47,-000,000 higher than the \$518,196,imately \$30,000,000 higher than the previous peak income, \$536,397,000, collected in 1931.

New York state again collected the largest amount, \$43,927,000, or \$583,000 more than in 1933. Ohio was second with \$37,618,000, or \$3,679,000 more than in 1933. California was third with \$53,960,-000, representing an increase of \$743,000. Pennsylvania was fourth with \$33,409,000, an increase of

16,000 Dexter At Boulder Dam

Sixteen thousand large mouth black bass, produced in the federal fish hatchery at Dexter, made the trip from their rearing ponds at Dexter to Boulder Dam, a distance of 916 miles in 29 hours without a casualty, due to the skill and knowledge of T. F. Nelson, superintendent, it was announced at Roswell

These fish were the first to be planted by the federal bureau of fisheries in the huge dam at Las Vegas, Nevada, which will one day be one of the greatest fishing spots of the world. The fish made the journey under varied weather conditions, almost freezing weather at Flagstaff and torrid summer heat at Kingman. They also traveled in altitudes ranging from 7,000 to 700

T. F. Nelson, superintendent of the Dexter hatchery, and Claude Allison of Roswell, left Dexter with the truck load of fish on July 3rd and traveled without stopping, except for short icing periods and arrived at Boulder Dam at high noon-a total of 916 miles in 29 hours, and over roads that ranged from pavement to rough mountain

Taking turns at the wheel of the big truck with a load of 10,000 pounds, and changing drivers every 50 miles, the motor of the truck never stopped except for icing periods at Albuquerque, Kingman, and other points en route, the fish arrived on schedule and were planted just above the dam where the water is now backed up 70 miles and where it already reaches a depth of 215 feet. When the dam is filled it will back up 115 miles, will reach a depth of over 600 feet and will back the water within 25 miles of the Grand Canyon National Park.
