WASHINGTON-Administration leaders virtually agreed at the White House Tuesday on immediate board to supervise a voluntary production control program.

Some of those attending the conference with Mr. Roosevelt forecast a presidential message, requesting retary Ickes, Senator Thomas, democrat, Oklahoma, Chairman Rayburn, democrat, Texas, of the house interstate commerce committee, and Representatives Cole, democrat, Maryland, and Disney, democrat, Oklahoma, were present. The proposed legislation would

embrace these general features: power to enforce oil production limits but would assemble facts and help supervise a voluntary state compact control system.

Give the president authority to limit imports.

Empower the board to administer the Connally law forbidding interstate shipments of "hot oil"-oil produced in excess of state quotas -and make that law permanent.

The Pecos valley artesian water conservation board will operate two well plugging machines, it was announced Saturday following a board meeting in Roswell. The rigs will be operated at the expense of the district until arrangements are made to secure PWA funds. One machine is now operating southeast of Roswell and another will start operations soon in the Cottonwood area. One of the best clay deposits yet found in the basin has been uncovered in the Upper Cottonwood area and preliminaries are underway to start the plugging operations.

Sift flour once, measure; add baking powder and salt, and sift Cut in shortening; add milk all at once and stir carefully until all flour is dampened. Then stir vigorously until mixture forms a soft dough and follows spoon around bowl. Turn out immedi-ately on slightly floured board and knead 30 seconds. Roll 1/4 inch thick and cut with floured 3-inch biscuit cutter. Place half of cir-cles on ungreased baking sheet; brush with melted butter. Place remaining circles on top and but-ter tops well. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 16 to 20 minutes. Separate halves of hot biscuits, spread bottom halves with soft butter and some of crushed fruit. Place other halves on top, crust-side down. Spread with butter and remaining truit. Garnish with whipped cream and additional pieces of fruit.


