

Supreme Court Upholds TVA

WASHINGTON-In a decision tutionality of the TVA as a whole, the supreme court Monday upheld the right of government to dispose of surplus power for dams constructed for purposes of navigation control or as a national de-

fense measure. In an eight to one decision, with McReynolds dissenting, read by Chief Justice Hughes, it was held 17-26 that the construction of Wilson dam at Muscle Shoals was constitutional and that the government purchase of transmission lines to distribute the energy was also

A minority contended that the court should have dismissed the

A record-breaking crowd which included many notables, listened long, history-making decision. The chief justice leaned forward and spoke in a clear, forceful voice.

After ruling that the construction of the Wilson dam as an act of national defense and for the improvement of navigation was Block 46, Lot 10, Block 43, all in legal, the court held that there Stevens Addition to Carlsbad. was no constitutional prohibition against the manner in which the Tennessee Valley Authority was disposing of the electricity generated there. "Surplus power" is power produced in excess of purely governmental needs.

Hughes asserted authority to dispose of property constitutionally acquired was specifically provided in the constitution itself.

"The constitutional provision," he ruled, "is silent as to the method of disposing of property belonging to the United States."
