A FOOLISH LAW

Among the foolish laws on the staute books of New Mexico is the one that limits a county or state officer from holding office more than two terms or four years. Apparently this law was based on the theory that public offices and pie counters were so closely allied they should go hand in hand and that because the office is classed as a pie counter job, it should be passed around at least every four years. The business world would be in a mess and a constant turmoil, if such a principle were in operation. There would be no system, no efficiency and many factors necessary to conduct modern business would be so lacking that progress would be impossible

The two-term theory maybe had its origin in the founding of our government, when the first president refused the nomination for the third term. But this is merely a precedent, not a law. Furthermore, side, allowing the lons to burst the president holds office for four years, not two years.

There are many offices and especially county offices that demand not only efficiency, but a thorough knowledge of the duties of the office to serve the taxpayers well. The Eddy county democratic central committee will meet at Carlsbad this evening to determine whether the coming democratic primary will be held under the current registration list which will be about the middle of August or whether the date will be moved up. The Advocate has urged a state primary law for several years along wid de washing de fust week. with a number of other newspapers. In fact a state primary law has been and still is one of the objectives of the New Mexico Newspaper Men's association, but the politicians of northern and western New Mexico have successfully blocked all efforts to frame a primary law.

Personally we believe if the democratic party keeps the respect and confidence of the voters, it will be necessary to enact such a law, otherwise some other party will.

In the absence of a needed primary law, we believe the most sensible thing is to hold the primary under the current registration list for the general election, which would mean the democratic event could not be held before about August 15. This would stop to a large degree the alleged irregularities where Mexicans, natives of old Mexico in most instances, have been herded to the polls and voted regardless of their qualifications.

That there is some confusion among sportsmen about the regulations governing the taking of catfish is indicated by information reaching the Game Department. says a report from that office.

For the information of the public the department wishes to announce that catfish are classed as game fish by a regulation of the State partment announced last week. Game Commission and as such are subject to the rules and regulations only 23,750 fish to the same area. governing game fish. A license is required for taking them in any part of the state, and for all persons except children under fourteen years of age.






