Proposal Made To Boost Surtax

WASHINGTON-A proposal to raise \$226,000,000 a year by increasing surtax rates on individual incomes was advanced Friday by Senator La Follette (Prog-Wis) to help close a revenue gap between the house tax bill and President Roosevelt's request.

La Follette offered his plan, as members of the senate finance committee began a search for new revenue in response to Secretary Morgenthau's demand that they raise the full \$517,000,000 lost when this year's AAA processing taxes were

Treasury experts estimated that the house tax bill would raise \$620, 000,000 of permanent revenue annually but only \$180,000,000 of the \$517,000,000 of temporary revenue asked by the president. CCC Crew Maps Range Country In the Oil Field

A crew of CCC boys from the Lake Arthur camp, working under the department of grazing, have been employed for several weeks, mapping the range country by sections and townships to aid in administering the Taylor Grazing act. Each section of the range is mapped by township, showing its botanical nature (nature of the soil and species of grass and weeds grown, etc.) as well as the contour of the soil and the location for fences and cross fences if needed.

The crew, now working in the oil field section, cover about four townships per week. The map when completed will also show the farming area with the location of each artesian or surface well. Mappings when drawn here are sent into the Albuquerque office, where they are completed and forwarded into the department of grazing, it was said here. It is understood plans have been made to map the entire state, which will take about two years.

Bird Sanctuary To Be Developed At White Sands

Lake Covering 200 Acres To Be Included In the Purchase of 1,280 Acres By U. S. Resettlement Administration.

AMARILLO, Texas-Glistening white sands that have made the White Sands National Monument of southern New Mexico the mecca for tourists and others pleasure bent, are to be included as part of a recreational area and migratory bird sanctuary to be developed thru funds advanced by the resettlement administration, working in conjunction with national park service.

The area covered by the sands was set aside several years ago by the National Park Service and called the White Sands National Monument, but not until recently were steps taken to extend the monument area to include a lake and artesian well, which discharges water having a temperature of 94 degrees fahrenheit from an 8 inch pipe under 60 pounds pressure.

The lake which covers about 200 acres and is a great breeding place for ducks and other migratory birds is kept at a more or less uniform level by the artesian well. This well was drilled by L. L. Garton in 1915 while searching for oil.

The purchase area covers about 1,280 acres. It extends two miles east and west, and one mile north to south and is the only privately owned land abutting the national monument. Under the plan agreed upon by resettlement and the park service the acquired area would be used for a wild duck refuge and resting place, and at the same time being used as a wayside resort for tourists. Highway Number Three between Alamogordo and Las Cruces traverses a corner of the area. It is thus contemplated that an oasis would be created with an adequate supply of the healthful mineral water of the artesian well, which is the only source of water supply available to tourists for miles around.

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The government expects to extend the size of the lake to 400 acres. The present building containing eight rooms will be used for administrative and other purposes. Boating and bathing facilities will be provided under the plan, enabling visitors to enjoy the sands and watering advantages close by. The cost of the purchase area together with improvements is less than \$5.50 per acre.

Health Column

Conducted by Dr. J. R. Earp, Director, New Mexico Bureau of Public Health. Motherhood

Next Sunday will be Mothers Day. All over the United States children will be thinking of their mothers; and surely mothers, young mothers, mothers-to-be will be thinking about the children that are to be theirs. When grown girls think of Motherhood they must be body conscious; they must often wonder how their bodies will support the train of pregnancy and childbirth and what manner of baby they will be able to call their own. For nine months their breath will draw oxygen for two from the air. For nine months their blood will carry food to the growing child. For nine critical months lack of proper nourishment can hamper the baby's growth and handicap all

A blood survey made two years ago in New Mexico showed that among unmarried girls syphillis poisons the blood stream of less than one per cent. Among married women the percentage with syphilis in the blood is over seven. If everyone had a blood test before marriage there would be only about one-tenth as many mothers with syphilis as now. How many priests, ministers, and justices of the peace urge candidates for matrimony to have their blood tested before they perform the ceremony which dooms so many women to a dangerous disease and their children to infections and almost certain death?

It is true that the children could be saved; can yet be saved if women will heed our advice. Every woman as soon as she knows she is to become a mother can have her blood tested. If syphilis is found, prompt treatment of her blood can save her baby's life and health. Ask your doctor to make the test. If you cannot pay a doctor see the public health nurse.

Fire At Hobbs Yesterday Does Severe Damage

Fire Starts In A Theater Building and Burns A Number of Buildings Before It Is Controlled: Three Are Hurt.

Fanned by a stiff wind, a fire of undetermined origin caused property damage estimated at approximately \$100,000 at Hobbs yesterday after threatening for a time to sweep the entire business district.

At least three persons suffered burns as the blaze razed four structures, including the three-story play house. Numerous business places across the street and adjoining the flame-swept areas were badly damaged.

Only the aid received from pumping equipment of the Halliburton Co., rushed from the oil fields. saved the town from destruction, observers said.

The fire department of Lovington, twenty miles northeast, also was called into action to subdue the fire that burned out eight places of business and caused heavy property loss to as many others and the United States post office.

The most severely burned was Edgar Morgan, business man, whose face was seared as he fought with other volunteers to save business properties across the street from the flames. P. H. Golden, city councilman, also suffered slight burns as he directed the work that saved the post office from complete destruction.

The mail was hurriedly carried into the street where it was placed under guard. The heat was so intense at the height of the blaze that plate glass windows across the streets were broken; sign boards burned down and tin roofs were blistered.

Authorities were not immediately able to establish the cause of the fire. The theater building housed a billiard parlor and several of-

Momentary failure of the city's one fire truck at the peak of the conflagration for a time threatened to balk all efforts to halt the blaze, as the flaming theater walls tottered precariously against the post office building before they were pushed away by volunteers.

Among the places of business burned out were the A. and H. Drug Store; Rex Theater, Hedrick News Stand; Little Liquor Shop; Pyrones Barber Shop; Stanley Pool Hall; Cearcy and Happy Lunch Room; The Smoke House, a billiard parlor, and the offices of City Attorney John Brand and Dr. C. G. Cook. The Western Union communication lines were burned out and the office badly damaged.

Erosion Program Makes Progress

The emergency wind erosion control program which is being conducted in the dust bowl area of New Mexico, which consists of counties in the northeastern and eastern part, is progressing very satisfactorily, says Tom Reid of the New Mexico State College. Much enthusiasm is being shown by farmers of this area and cooperation has been given in all localities. Each county is operating thru the efforts of a county wind erosion committee, which is composed of members from various communities within the county. In most cases, within the county. In most cases, these men are farmers and therefore capable of administering this

type of program. Up to the present time, the program has consisted of contour listing only; however, amendments have been issued and are in effect in various counties. Where contour listing is impractical, due to moisture conditions, it is now possible by chiseling on the contour to benefit by this program. The rate of payment for & 'our chiseling will be the same as . or contour listing, which is 20c an acre where equipment is on hand to do the work, and 40c per acre where hire of work is necessary.

An additional amendment to the present program is that of border or strip listing.
