

Scarlet Fever The disease was first described

"Though the scarlet fever may happen at any time, yet it generally comes at the close of summer when it seizes whole families, but especially children. (1) A chillness and shivering come at the beginning . . . (2) afterwards the whole skin is covered with small remains a kind of branny scales . .'

The name which Sydenham gave to this sickness has stayed with it ever since It has served its purpose well for 260 years but now it is about time to find another. Because now we are reasonably sure that the same infection that causes fever and small red spots followed by branny scales sometimes causes fever without any rash and without any scales. The infection is probably just as contagious when there is not a rash as it is when there is a rash.

No wonder it has been hard to stop the spread of scarlet fever by isolating only those who show the rash while others with the same ease. The health officer never ports "scarlet fever" unless there

For annual legumes, seeded between October 1, 1935, and September 30, 1936, inclusive, and grown in 1936, farmers will receive a rate of \$3.00 per acre on irrigated, and \$1.50 on non-irrigated land.

For alfalfa turned under with one cutting growth between March 1, 1936, and September 30, 1936, she began, "does it really make farmers will receive \$2.50 per acre.

For small winter grain sown between September 1, 1935, and November 1, 1935, and grown and turned under in the spring of 1936, farmers will receive \$1.00 per acre.

Rust-Resistant Flowers

CEEDS of certain flowers will D germinate more readily if the seed coat is cut or nicked. Care must be taken to cut only the coat, of the seed may destroy it. Canna lily, all types of morning glory, perennial and annual sweet peas, lupin and moon flower are some of the seeds that may be thus treated. Overnight soaking in warm water will also aid the germination of these seeds.

Dist. Columbia Has Big Gain

WASHINGTON — A statistical picture of America's population shifts was presented Monday by the census bureau, which estimated that while many states have made gains in the past five years, eleven have fewer residents than in 1930.

From 1930 to 1935, the population of the country gained from 122,766,046 to an estimated 127,-521,000 or nearly 5,000,000.

These figures for the whole country, published some time ago, were broken down Monday by the census bureau to show figures for individual states and the District of Columbia

The District of Columbia led all states in percentage gain during the period, which saw an increase in the number of government workers. The district's population for 1935 was estimated at 594,000, a gain of 107,131 since 1930, or 22

"New York, with 12,889,000 persons as compared to 12,588,066 in 1930, remained the nation's largest state. Pennsylvania was second with 10,966,000 as compared with 9,631,000 and Illinois third with 7,817,000 as compared to 7,630,000.

The eleven states which lost thru population shifts, and the estimated percentage of loss are: Michigan, 3.7; Wisconsin, 1.1; South Dakota, 2.6; Rhode Island, .9; Nebraska, 1.9; Kansas, 1.8; Mississippi, 2.4; Montana, 1.2; New Mexico, 5.0; Arizona, 11.4; and California, 0.7. Among the states which gained the most during the period were:

Some 10,000 others of the same classes will be planted by the Federal Hatcheries and state game department on the Rio Bonita during the coming week, it was said.


Many of the planted fish, put in on the upper portions of the Ruidoso, north, middle and south forks, were put so far toward the source that it was necessary to pack them in with horses.

"With the addition of these, fishing on the upper portions of both the Ruidoso and Bonita is expected to be far above that of the last few seasons because of plenty of snow water," Stevenson said.


