### REGISTER

Within the next few months voters will be given an opportunity to express opinions on candidates and issues. If you are a qualified voter and are not registered, this important detail should be attended to in July. Voters will also face some changes in the 1935 law. "The oil man's interest in all this rises from the fact that the black liquid he searches for frequently gathers in sedimentary beds where these have been arched up into "anticlines." This arching up brings the more deeply buried and compacted-hence denser- rocks abnormally near the surface, producing above them a little extra gravitational pull, or a gravity "high" in the geophysicists' language.

"Gravity anomalies are also produced by another interesting formation, common in the Gulf coast regions of Texas and Louisiana, known as salt domes. These are huge piles of salt, a mile or so in diameter, punched up from great depths through the overlying sedimentary beds. In the uptilted edges of these beds, sealed against the salt, oil often accumulates. So the geophysicist sets his torsion balance up every mile or so in the region being investigated, hunting for abnormal gravity readings, which may indicate anticlines, or

"When the geophysical methods were introduced in the Gulf coast oil fields of Texas and Louisiana in 1922, the oil industry in that region seemed to have passed its peak and to be on the down grade. Purely geological methods apparently had found at all recognizable domes-47 having been located from 1893 to 1922. No new discoveries of any importance had been made for several years. 
