#### THE EUROPEAN SITUATION

The ordinary pattern of a revolution is simple and well established: Comparatively radical or liberal elements within a country rise against a conservative or monarchist government. The French and American revolutions are examples of this.

The current Spanish revolution violates the accepted rules. The party in power in Spain-"The Government"-consists of so-called liberals and radicals, whose beliefs range all the way from a mild semi-socialism to communism. The rebels are the reactionaries—the

Spanish equivalents of Tories and monarchists. At this writing, the revolution is still in full swing, and both sides are claiming great victories, both say they are certain of success. Normally, such a civil war would not be of any great interest to America and Europe. But the chaotic European and Asiatic situations being what they are, the Spanish revolt is of tremendous international

as well as national, significance. Today, roughly speaking, all Europe is divided into two campsfascists and anti-fascists. Germany is fascist. So is Italy. So is Austria. France is anti-fascist. The Spanish rebels, if they succeed, will establish a fascist government in Spain, and, following the German-Italian pattern, will rule through power of might, at the expense of all civil liberties. And if they fail, it will still be evident that a substantial minority in Spain is opposed to all liberal tendencies, favors a militaristic dictatorship. (The present Spanish government leaves much to be desired, in the light of American and British ideas of freedom, but, by comparison with Germany and Italy,

it stands solidly for civil liberties.) To continue, France is the last important mainstay of democracy in Europe. Even now, she is bordered on two sides by fascist states, which hate her and are hated by her in turn-Germany and Italy. If Spain goes fascist and, as would doubtless follow, enters into an accord with Germany and Italy, France would be almost entirely in November. It is strongly rumored that both Italy and Germany have been encouraging the Spanish rebels, have provided them with arms and other supplies.

In the Far East, Japan wishes to dominate the Pacific-but first, she wishes to dominate Asia. All that prevents the fulfillment of that ambition is Russia, which is possibly the best-armed country in the world, and which has almost limitless resources of all kinds. The experts are certain that in case of trouble, Japan and Germany would guys not eligible for the pension and that there is little fear for the enter into an accord, and the enemies of 1914 would become allies.

The whole situation is charged with dynamite—there is no question but that the outlook is much darker even than in the dark days of 1913, before Sarajevo. One of the best of the foreign observers recently said that Europe has been drifting toward war for yearsbut that now it is marching. That is no exaggeration. And the "little Spanish match" could explode the whole powder keg.

From the commercial standpoint, the effects of the Spanish uprising will naturally be unfortunate, whichever side wins. When a country's resources must be given over to revolution, it has no money for cars, cotton, machinery, or the other goods Spain usually buys in some quantity from the United States. Furthermore, Business Week points out that "effects of Spanish trouble on France and Britain (our best customer, next to Canada) are more important to us than what happens to our own Spanish sales." Spain has been a very important purchaser of manufactured goods from England, loss of this business will hit Britain hard, have an unfavorable influence on her balance of trade, thus reduce her buying from other countries, including the

That clusion that nothing can be done about the situation. Well, if you are willing to sit and take what the mosquito gives, there is nothing we can do about it, but if you believe as we do that something can be done to rid this section of a health and comfort nuisance, give us your cooperation and effort. If no good is done, there is only a little wasted effort spent, but regardless of the outcome we can at least have the knowledge of the origin of the mosquitoes; whether or not they breed in alfalfa, grass and shrubbery, or if they originate in the still or stagnant water, as we believe they do. A survey might provide us with the means of effecting a partial control and this would help.

Rain barrels, fish and lilly ponds sometimes provide breeding places in addition to the bogs and tin cans and other rubbish might even furnish a sufficient amount of water for a breeding place.

The Texas health department recommends a five-point inspection which might well be imulated here. These five points needing attention include:

1. Weeds and long grass which spring up almost overnight this time of year.

2. Cans and other rubbish which might furnish a sufficient amount of water for mosquitoes to breed. Inspection of fish ponds.

Garbage should be disposed of in such a manner that flies will not be attracted.

4. Outdoor toilets should be made sanitary.

5. Wells and cisterns should be inspected to see that the family

The phenomenon of gravity which amazed Isaac Newton centuries ago confronts Dr. Robert H. When Instinct Fails The essence of human wisdom, distilled from the experience of many thousands of years, is represented in our instincts. When we are thirsty we seek water and drink until our thirst is quenched. Long ago those who failed to respond to this urge or who never felt it failed also in the struggle for existence. We have no need to reason when we touch something that is very hot: our hand is drawn away away before we have time

Our instincts fail only when we have to deal with dangers that are new to the human race. Thus appetite is a safe guide in eating so long as we eat the food which our ancestors have eaten for thousands of years. But when modern cookery rejects bones and entrails and dishes up only muscle meat our instinct fails to warn us that we are missing essential elements in our food. We must listen to the dietitian who can tell us how to get a complete diet from our modern foodstuff. Instinct cannot tell us when to stop eating sugar because refined sugar is a modern product in the use of which racial experience is lacking. The law of the survival of the fittest is at work here as is seen by the increasing amount of diabetes. Nature will in time kill off those among us who cannot control our craving for too much sugar.

Modern medicine, too, has introduced new perils to health even

with the very remedies that save life. The arsphenamines that will cure syphilis if given early in the disease and over a long enough time, are actually harmful to the syphilitic if he takes only a few doses and stops taking treatment as soon as his symptoms disappear. In New Mexico the doctors tell me that patients with syphilis usually seek treatment in the secondary stage with sore throat and skin rashes. This is the stage at which S. E. sauce, flavored with a hint of clove, or with thick, sweet cream to pour over it. I always make a lot-because my sons bring all the younger neighbors in to sample it.

Sour Cherry Cobbler 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca; % cup sugar; 2 tablespoons melted butter; 3 cups pitted and drained sour red cherries, fresh or canned; 1 cup cherry juice; 2 cups sifted flour; 2 teaspoons double acting baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 6 tablespoons butter or other shortening; % cup milk (about). Combine quick-cooking tapioca sugar, butter, cherries, and cherry juice; let stand while crust is being made. Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk gradually, stirring until soft dough is formed. Turn out on slightly floured board and knead 30 seconds, or enough to shape. Roll 2/3 of dough in strip, 2 inches wide and 1/4 inch thick; line sides of 8 x 8 x 2-inch pan, fitting closely into cor-Fill with cherry mixture. Roll remaining 1/3 dough 1/4 inch thick; with sharp knife make slits to permit escape of steam. Fit over cherries, pressing edges of dough together with fork dipped in flour. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 15 minutes; then reduce heat to moderate (350° F.) and bake 25 to minutes longer. Sprinkle pow-d sugar over top, if desired.



### **Income of State Institutions**

The handling of federal grants and the monies derived therefrom by he state for various beneficiary institutions and agencies is of vital importance. There follows a statement prepared by the Taxpayers Association of New Mexico, showing in the first column the income derived from permanent funds; in the second column the income derived from the lease of state lands for various purposes and in the third column the total income which is made available for the use of the institutions for current maintenance purposes. Under enactments of the legislature this income may be anticipated by the issuance of bonds and such part of the total income used as may be necessary to pay interest and retire such bonds. These figures are based on a period from July 1, 1935, to June 30, 1936:

## Ranges May Be Under Soil Act

An attempt is to be made to bring stockmen under the revisions of the soil conservation and domestic allotment act, according to D. A. Shoemaker, assistant state forester, who recently returned from a meeting in Salt Lake City, a press report given out last week stated.

According to Shoemaker the representatives of the AAA are holding meeting to define the provisions of the act, its limitations and administrative considerations, with a view to having the stockmen suggest what may be required in the several states in order to set aside some of the private range land for conservation purposes.

The suggestions will then be sent to Washington where such as are applicable may be approved.

Through county and state committees the compliance of stockmen to the requirements will be certified, in the event the program can be worked out, and then the stockmen will be eligible for benefits as now are farmers.

It was pointed out that there are about 35,000,000 acres of private range lands in New Mexico.

It was said that if the program can be worked out, it would be not earlier than about September 15th before the actual setting aside of land could begin. ### **GOP** Platform

ALBUQUERQUE-Action of the republicans of New Mexico in writing "old age pension principles" in their platform adopted Tuesday night, was termed a commitment "to the underlying principles of the Townsend Plan" by a prominent member of the party.

The statement came from E. R. Wright, Santa Fe attorney and former supreme court justice, who initiated the unsuccessful convention floor battle which ended in unanimous ratification of the resolution committee's report. Wright asserted the plank was similar to the old age pension plan as sponsored by the Townsendites, of whom there were many in Tuesday night's delegation

Chairman Reed Holloman of the resolutions committee, answered Wright's contention with the remark that "If anyone cannot understand the contested provision they cannot . . . say . . . it is a definite commitment to any plan."

Opposition to the old age security plank centered around the word "revolving" and one of the speakers against its adoption, Cyrus McCormick, national committeeman, urged the delegates "not to become involved in the meshes of economic debate.

Waste and extravagance in the New Mexico relief and security authority was censured.

"The practice of requiring a pauper's affidavit before an aged person can procure relief from want has no part in a civilized society," it concluded.

"Unfair and niggardly treatment" of the veterans was condemned by the party with the assertion its representatives in congress would be pledged to enactment of lays for adequate care of their dependents.

## **Tuberculin Tests**

The founders of the tuberculosis movement realized that only thru broad education of the public could any progress against tuberculosis be made. Yet this could be accomplished only with the understanding support of the people. They must know that tuberculosis is curable and preventable, that it is not a stigma, and that facilities for diagnosis and treatment must be liberally provided. Today practically every avenue of reaching

the attention of the masses is sued. Each year tuberculosis associations select a certain theme to emphasize during that year. This year the slogan is "Fight Tuberculosis with Modern Weapons." The two objectives aimed for are (a) to remind people of the early symptoms of tuberculosis and the importance of consulting the doctor on their appearance, (b) to arouse interest in the routine earch for early tuberculosis before there are symptoms and physical signs.

To achieve the former, booklets, articles, and outlines for talks have en prepared calling attention to the four most common symptoms of early tuberculosis (as determined by surveys of large numbers of sanitorium patients), namely, fatigue, loss of weight, cough that hangs on, and indigestion. The second objective sought is to encourage routine search for symptomless tuberculosis among groups of young people such as high school and college students.

that hurt look in Aubrey's eyes. erately advanced stage is usually a relatively swift one and only by the barest chance is the minimal case detected. So long as we are obliged to wait until symptoms betraying pulmonary damage drive the patient to the doctors, we shall probably continue to despair.

Wrestling with this deplorable state of affairs, efforts have been made to devise some way of detecting tuberculosis in its silent stage among apparently healthy people. Doctors Chadwick, Rathbun, Myers and others pioneered in introducing the scheme of examining routinely, with tuberculin and X-rays, students in colleges and high schools. The routine examination of all students brings to light early cases that might otherwise be undetected and progress to disabling disease. Last year all students of a large state university were examined by the tuberculin-X-ray method and seventeen cases of adult type pulmonary tuberculosis, all symptomless, were found. Contrast this with the usual method of "passive" case finding, i. e., waiting for persons to apply to the doctor for the relief of symptoms. During the course of the same year fifteen cases of tuberculosis had been discovered among students who came to the doctor because of one or another symptom. Twelve of the fifteen were advanced cases and were obliged to leave school.

In high school the story is substantially the same except that fewer cases of adult type tuberculosis are found. However, followup work of adolescent children with significant childhood type lessions leads the investigators into many homes where there is an open case. This is important, for the real threat to the youngster is probably not the calcified remains of a primary complex but daily contact with a source of infection. No wonder proponents of the routine tuberculin-X-ray plan emphasize the value of locating such sources of infection.

It is hoped that ultimately parents will depend upon the family doctor to examine their children as a matter of course with tuberculin and the X-ray when indicated. In the meantime, the Tuberculosis association with the aid of other private and public agencies will strive to show the need for early diagnosis through school suveys.
