The republican party leaders keep up a vigorous whistling in respect to the prospects of putting Candidate Landon in the presidential chair. They go on the principle that "faint heart never won fair lady." If they speak hopefully, they assume that possibly the on-the-fence voters will flop in their direction and turn the tide in favor of Landon.

Yet, after all, what would be the use, even if so unexpected an event did take place? The senate, when congress adjourned, counted my former secretary." for the democrats a clear majority of fourty-four seats. There are to be thirty-six contests but only twenty-three of these are held by democrats and more than half of these are seats in the democratic south. By no possibility can the republicans win the senate.

The house has 435 seats. Presumably if the election were a great landslide toward the republican party, the democrats might lose the house. But the present membership is about three to one democratic. This is an unwieldy majority and it would not hurt the democrats to lose forty or fifty of the close seats. But the republicans have at present 100 seats only and would have to win 118 from the democrats to get a bare majority. Not even in the most sanguine dreams would Landon expect to win so many seats, even in a landslide

But what is the use of having a president who would find both houses of congress dominated by the opposition party? He would be unable to pass his desired legislation. His nominations made to the senate would be looked on askance. All he could do would be to protest against the system and hope for better results in 1938. But the results of the election in 1938 might be worse for his party, not

Health Column

Conducted by Dr. J. R. Earp, Director, New Mexico Bureau of Public Health.

Diarrhea

Last year 237 babies died from diarrhea in New Mexico. Of these deaths 87 were reported in September and October.

Chief causes of diarrhea are (1) infected food (2) too much food (3) irritating food. The first two of these causes are greatly increased by hot weather. Infecting germs, like the bacillus of dysentery, multiply rapidly and live much longer when it is hot. Also there are many flies to carry them from the deposits of human waste back into the home. In hot weather the baby gets thirsty just like the grown-ups. But the baby cannot reach the water jug. He can only cry. If then mother gives him milk instead of water he soon gets too much food.

The treatment of diarrhea varies somewhat according to the cause. But in all forms of diarrhea the great danger is the same: nearly every baby that dies dies from loss of water. A baby with diarrhea loses ten times as much water as

he is able to drink. The first thing to do therefore is to stop giving food and start giving water or weak tea. But do not give too much water at a time. Babies with diarrhea are easily made to vomit and if they start vomiting they lose water just twice as fast. So give the drinks often but in small quantities.

Danger signs are: Numerous (over five daily), oose, watery stools.

Fascinating Tales of Lost Mines

THE LOST CITY

I N 1879, near where the town of Aspen, Colo., now stands, a stranger staggered into a ranch house, ill, tired, and crazy from

When he had recovered sufficiently to tell his story, he spoke about the ruins of an old city in Utah, near which were an old fort and a rich mine of gold and silver. The mine, he said, seemed to have been worked centuries before his discovery of the place. He had about 20 pounds of ore to back his story, which he had managed to keep throughout his journey over the broken country. As soon as he had regained

enough health to allow him to travel, the stranger set out again with his load of ore, saying that he intended taking it to Leadville to sell. He expected to devote the proceeds to furnish a modest outfit, when he would return to his find and work it. But he disappeared from all knowledge when he left the ranch, and was never seen

A party was gathered at Meeker to go into the Ute reservation where this mine was supposed to be, and it started out on the trail of the golden phantom. The Indian understood them, and led them on to the foot of a cliff. Here they found the body of the prospector, who had been shot and thrown off of the height, but no horse nor pack was to be seen. Several miles farther on the old Ute showed them the body of the cowboy, also shot to death and his out-

The two men were buried where they fell. In 1904 the location of these graves was still known, but the site of the mine has never been found. Whether it was an old Spanish working or whether the Indians had taken out the ore was never known.
