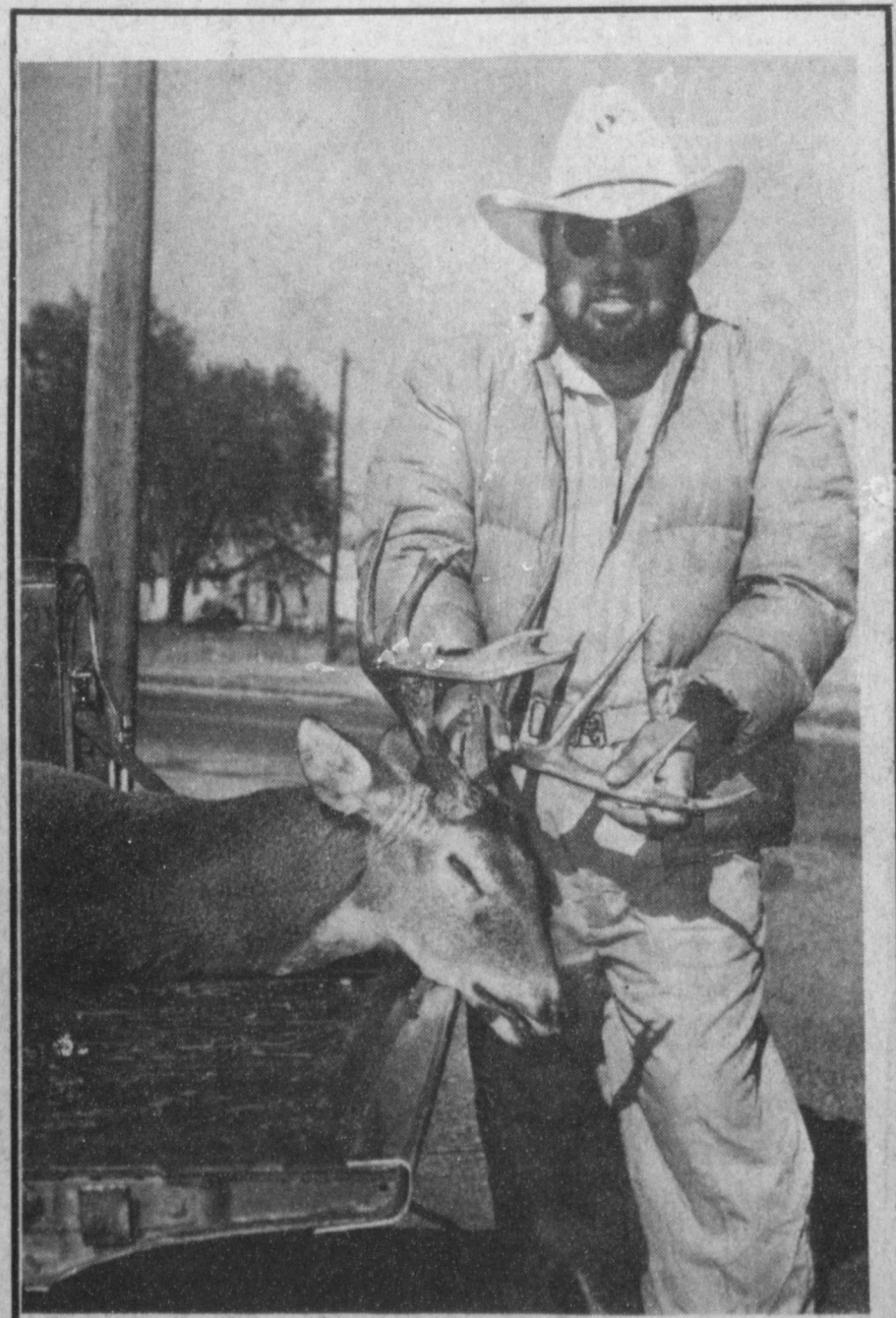
Services will be hosted by the First United Methodist Church, and Paul Brigham, pastor of the Progress Baptist Church will bring the message.

## Yellowhouse, Emco Awarded City Bids

In one of the longest meetings ever held by the Muleshoe City Council, the Tuesday morning meeting lasted until noon-time.

Council members got briefly 'bogged down' by a number of bids submitted for three large pieces of equipment, including a garbage truck, loader and motor grader.

Representatives from Muleshoe Motor Co., Inc.; Pak Mor Manufacturing of San Antonio; Emco Affiliates of Plainview; Yellowhouse Equipment of Lubbock; Waukesha Industries of Lubbock; and from West Texas Equipment of Amarillo, were in the council meeting room for the bid openings.

After opening, tabulating and discussing the bids for the garbage truck, with each representative being given the opportunity to discuss the merits of his equipment, a lengthy question and answer session follow-

ed with the members of the city council asking questions about times, warranties and other pertinent information.

While Dave Marr, city manager and Cleve Bland, director of public works, tabulated and discussed the bids, council members opened the bids for the motor grader. This brought another discussion with the council before bids were tabulated and compared.

After the bids for the loader were submitted, the tabulation process began all over again, and merits of the various bids were discussed at length.

The city manager explained that with the old garbage trucks and other equipment needing constant and expensive repair, he recommended taking the bids that offered the shortest delivery dates, if the bids met the specifications of the city.

Warranties were also discussed with warranties offered by the various companies for six months to one year.

When the discussions had been completed, the bids were awarded to Yellowhouse Equipment Co. of Lubbock for the

motor grader and loader; while Emco Affiliates got the nod for the garbage truck.

Frank Goodman of General Telephone Company of the Southwest briefly visited the city to introduce Danny Ammons who will be the new area supervisor from Littlefield, who is replacing Goodman, who has been promoted and transferred to Brownfield.

Goodman also asked about any possible GTE problems for the city at this time.

The city council also approved Resolution No. 464A, a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Muleshoe, Texas, extending time for consideration of the Southwestern Public Service Rate Decrease Request.

This resolution will grant the city an additional 90 days to study the proposed SPS rate decrease.

## Eightieth Birthday Reception Honors Mrs. Myrtle Creamer

It all started to be an afternoon reception to honor Mrs. Myrtle Creamer on her 80th birthday last weekend, but ended up being a full two day celebration for Mrs. Creamer, and more than 40 of her direct descendants.

Family started arriving in Muleshoe on Friday night, and by Saturday afternoon, six daughters and two of her sons had arrived, along with grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Saturday afternoon, several of the grandchildren and great grandchildren went sightseeing in Clovis, prior to a dinner for all the family at the Old Corral Restaurant in Muleshoe.

During the Saturday evening dinner, Alvin Richards Jr. videoed the entire proceedings, and as he operated the video camera, he showed the group what was being filmed on the big screen TV in the dining room.

On Sunday morning, a number of family members attended church with Mrs. Creamer at the Muleshoe Primitive Baptist Church, then all family members met at the Bailey County Civic Center for a catered luncheon.

One of the highlights of the luncheon was the reading of Senate Proclamation No. 2226, issued by the Texas State Senate, commemorating the birthday of Mrs. Creamer. The proclamation had been obtained by Sen. Bill Sarpalius, a longtime family friend.

Another highlight was a personal letter from U.S. Congressman Larry Combest, and a greeting from President Ronnie and Nancy Reagan.

This was followed in the afternoon with a reception at the Civic Center from 3-5 p.m., with Mrs. Creamer's children, grandchildren and great grandchildren acting as hostesses and hosts.

Her chosen colors of lilac to purple were carried out in the theme decorations with birthday cake, white with lilac to purple trim, punch and coffee, with mints and nuts were served on crystal and brass appointments.

Lace cloths covered all the tables, with pink and lilac undercloths.

Myrtle Creamer was born November 15, 1907 in Tennessee Valley, south of Kirkland, TX to Tommie J. and Lucilla J. Davidson. She attended the school at Tennessee Valley until her junior and senior year, which were in Paducah, TX.

She married Willie Forest (Buck) Creamer on November 6, 1926 at her parents' home in Tennessee Valley.

They lived in Paducah until 1948 when they moved to Earth, and in January, 1949, moved to Muleshoe where he became a Bailey County Deputy Sheriff.

He was later named Muleshoe's first Police Chief, a position he held for several years, until bad health caused him to resign from law enforcement. He died June 11, 1981.

Mrs. Creamer has always been involved in work at her church, and is currently serving as president of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) for the third time.

She is a volunteer worker at the Heritage Foundation Thrift Shop and on each Wednesday, is the hostess at the Santa Fe Depot Senior Citizen's Center. She is a member of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and is their official telephone caller.

Children of Myrtle Creamer in Muleshoe during the past few days included two of her four sons, Travis of Dallas and Henry of San Francisco; and all six of her daughters, Jan and Johnny Schneider, Gotenbert, NE; Monnie and Weldon McBride, Plano; Carolyn and Kirk Herrington, Cozad, NE; Phyllis Champlin, Las Vegas, NE; Sue Kemp, Amarillo and Clea Williams, Muleshoe. Sons not present were James, of Wisconsin, and Forrest, of Las Vegas, NEV.

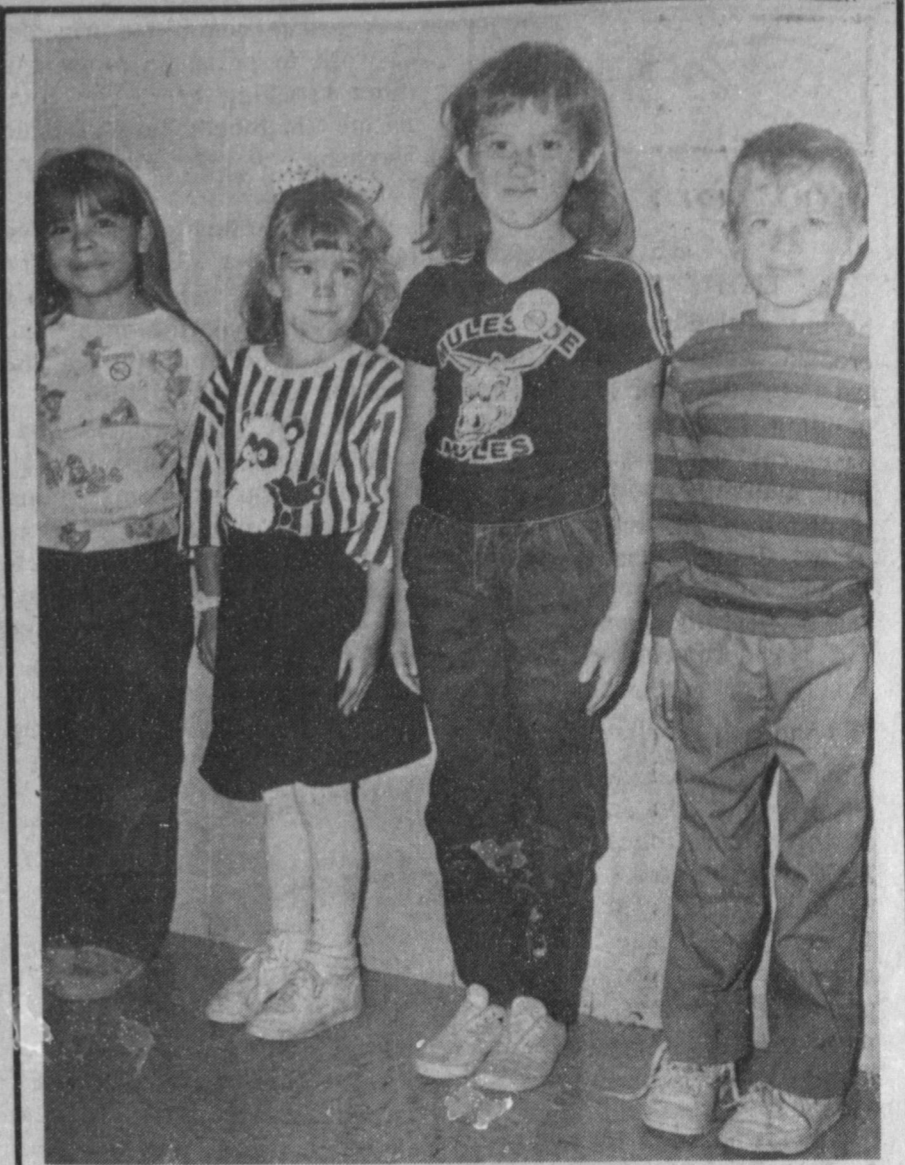

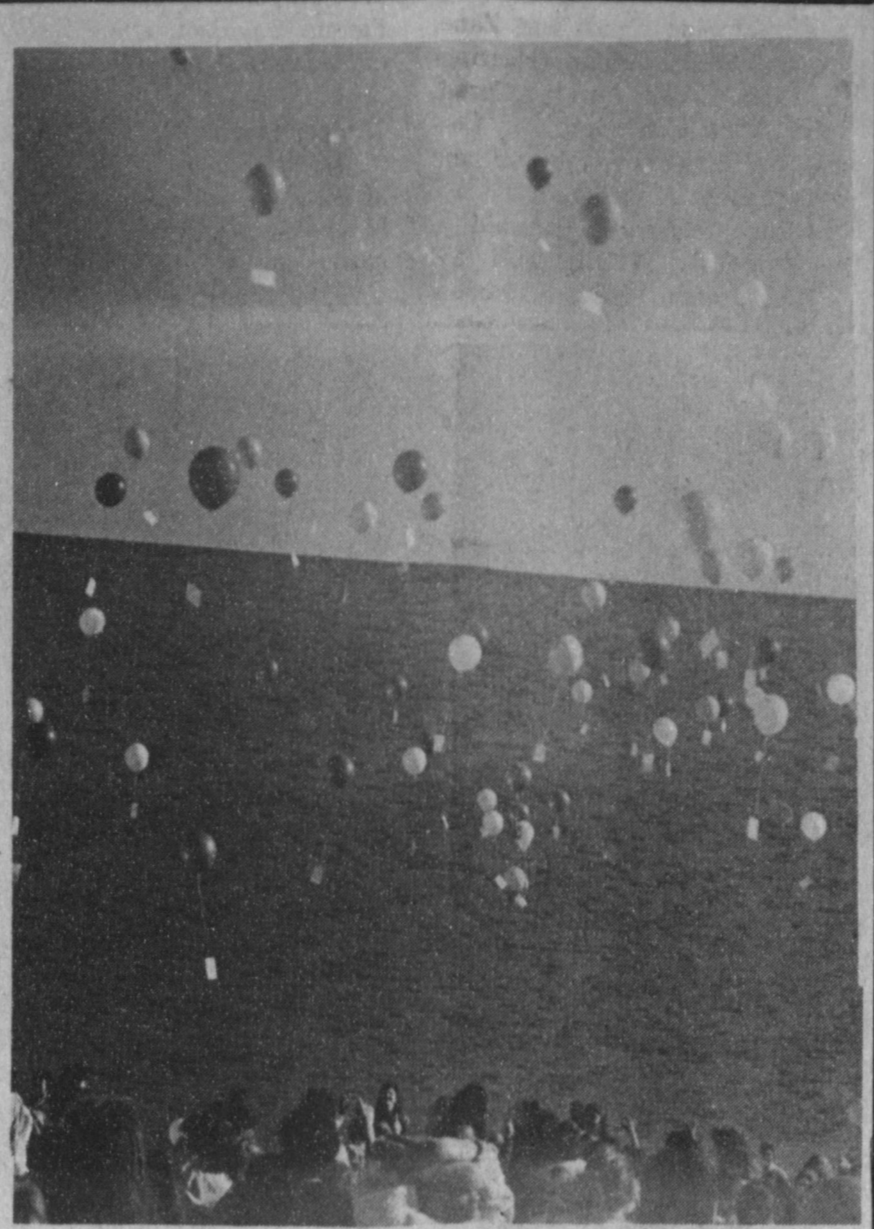

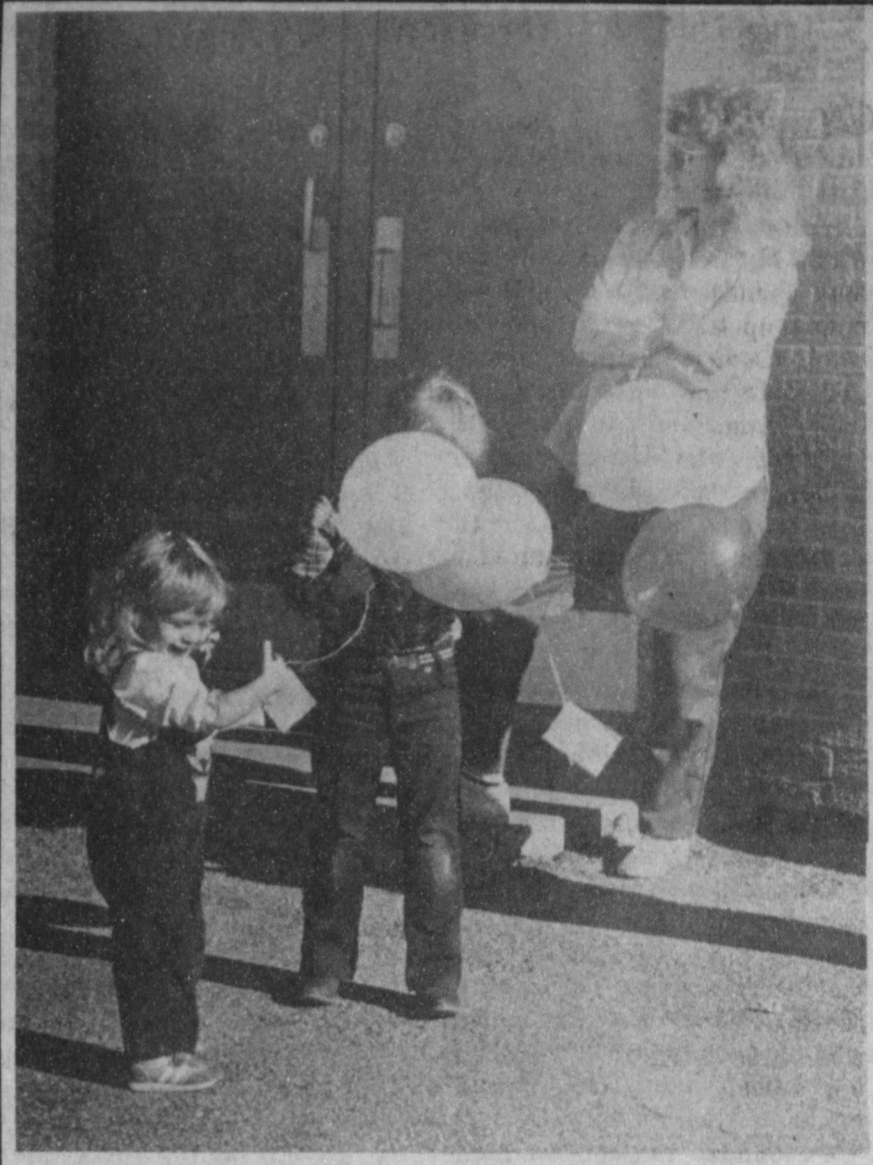

Next Monday, November 23, the seventh grade A team will take on Tulia, at Tulia, at 5 p.m.

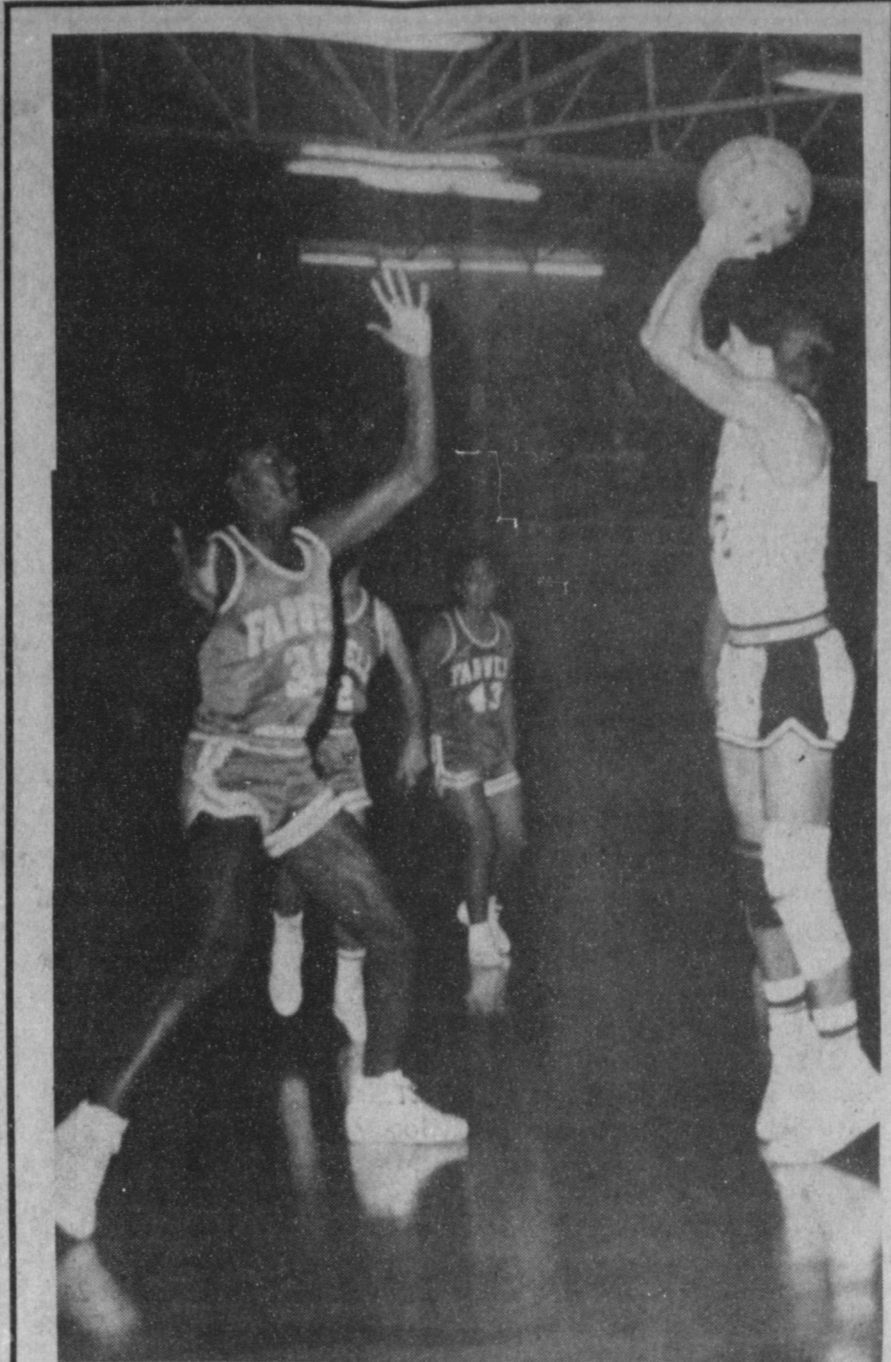
### Leadership Class

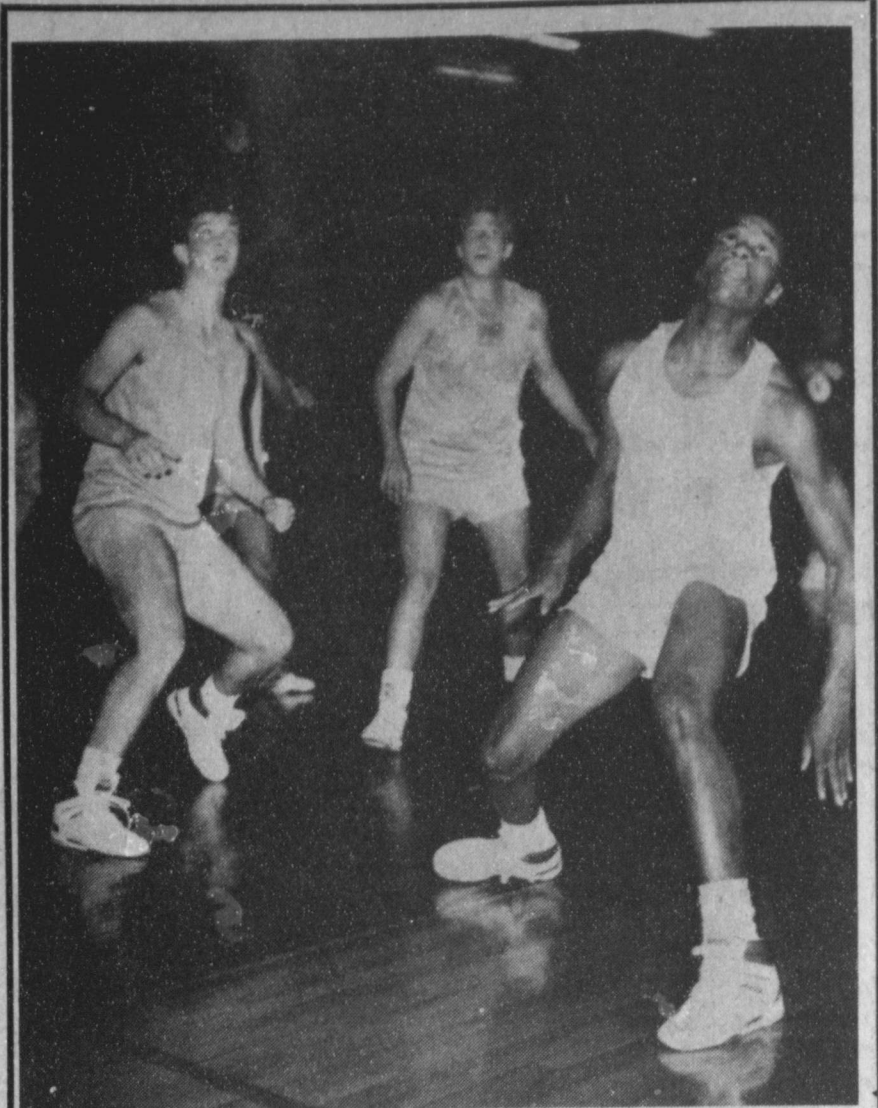

**Breeding, Production Swine Seminars Feature**

To make a profit with declining market prices, swine producers must raise more pigs per litter and increase feed efficiency. Seminars focusing on those areas will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service on Dec. 5 at Texas A&M University.

For the second consecutive year, a seminar on swine management will be conducted for women while a concurrent seminar will focus on certain aspects of the swine business, points out Dr. Bill Thomas, Extension swine specialist.

The seminars will open with a joint gathering at 8:30 a.m. at the Louis Pearce Pavilion, at which time participants will evaluate 21 slaughter barrows. The barrows were exhibited as prospects by Texas producers at the Barrow Futurity and Swine Judging Clinic last August and have been on feed at Texas A&M since then. They will be slaughtered Dec. 7 and carcass data will be sent to seminar participants.

According to Thomas, this evaluation will help participants improve their skills for visual appraisal of slaughter hogs.

At 10 a.m. the two groups will take part in concurrent seminars at the Kleberg Center.

The seminar for women will feature discussions on factors affecting reproduction of boars and sows and how to increase breeding efficiency in boars and sows. The respective speakers will be Wayne Singleton of Purdue University and Steve Cobb, a producer from Lake City, Ark. The seminar will conclude with discussions by two producers: farrowing house management by Judy Smith of La Grange and artificial insemination by Mary Jane Gerth of Seguin.

The other seminar also will feature discussions by Singleton

and Cobb on breeding management and reproductive efficiency plus a talk on formulating practical swine rations by Darrell Knabe of Texas A&M's Department of Animal Science.

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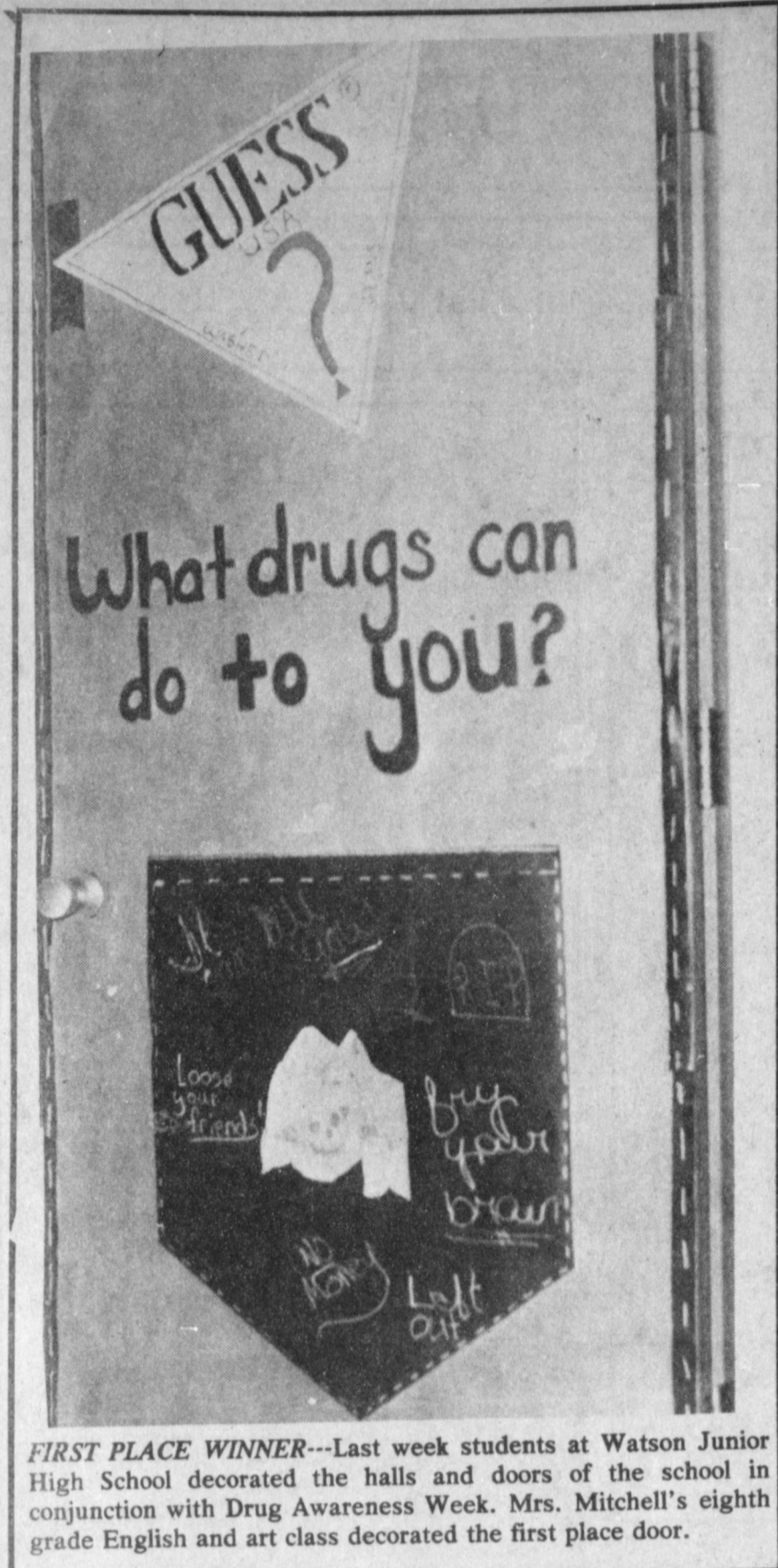

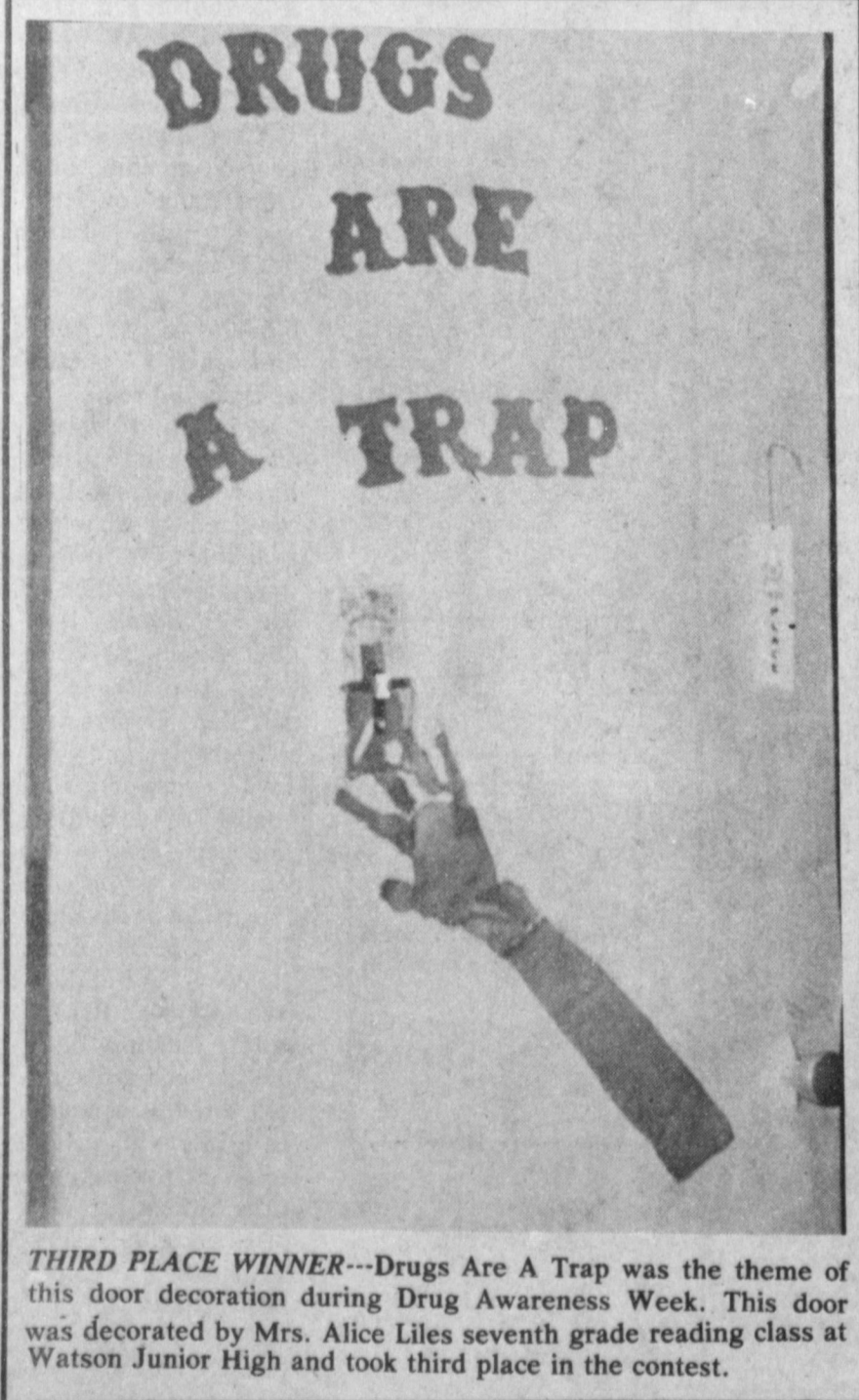
