



guest speaker for the Muleshoe Rotary Club Tuesday at noon. However, immediately prior

to his CofC update, Tim Campbell, chairman of the Rotary International Polio Plus program, spoke for a few minutes on the international program undertaken by the Rotary this year.

Campbell explained that each day, 750 kids from around the world get polio, and 75 of these youngsters die each day.

Each dollar donated by the Rotary Club is enough to provide vaccine for eight kids somewhere in the world.

Campbell said they are dying one-by-one in a lot of families, and there is no control for the disease in some countries.

He told of the people in India who are crippled from the disease, and no crutches or wheel chairs are available. He said there is no treatment.

This massive program has been undertaken by the 22,000 Rotary Clubs in more than 120 countries and work diligently to eradicate Polio.

Of the money contributed, Campbell explained that more than 95 cents of each dollar is used to buy vaccine.

Muleshoe Rotary Club has pledged \$7,000 over the next five year period, with the major part of that coming from personal donations.

He told how the weekly 'drawing' in the club is used to help fulfill that pledge.

He also told how Plainview Rotary has pledged \$120,000 in the same period and received a grant for one-half of the amount.

Campbell encouraged the Rotarians to extend the amount of pledges to help take care of some of the devastating polio in the world.

Texas motorists who gift-wrap their families with safety belts will get a head start on a happy holiday season, a leading traffic safety advocate announced to-







GREEN CHILI ROUNDUPS

FESTIVE FOODS '87

6 to 8 fresh long green chilies, 1/2 cup thin-sliced dried beef, finely chopped, 1/4 cup pecans, chopped, 2 pkgs. (3 ozs. ea.) cream cheese with chives, 1/2 tsp. dried basil, 1 sweet red pepper, optional, Fresh basil leaves, optional.

Remove tops and hollow out seeds from chili peppers. Cook chili peppers in enough boiling water to cover for 3 to 5 minutes until tender; drain. Let cool. Chilies can be microwaved in ½ cup water for 3 to 5 minutes on high until tender. In food processor with knife blade, chop dried beef and pecans separately. Empty bowl and place cream cheese in processor with knife blade. Process just until blended. Carefully fill each chili pepper with cream cheese mixture; chill. Using a serrated knife or electric knife, cut each stuffed chili pepper crosswise into 1/2-inch pieces. Cut off top

and remove seeds and veins in red pepper. Slice crosswise into thin rings. Place on serving plate in a thin layer. Arrange green chili roundups over pepper rings. Garnish with fresh

Elders Can Give Special Gifts To Grandchildren

The gift of family history and traditions is one of the most important that grandparents can pass on to their grandchildren at Christmas.

"Children like to know where they came from and what happened in the family," says Dr. Judith Warren. "A gift that gives that information can be especially valuable to the youngster."

Warren, a gerontology specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service, notes that special ways to pass on traditions have been around for a long time.

"Many grandparents make and give quilts designed with family handprints, names and birth dates. Others do needlework and samplers."

An album of family photographs is also a good way to preserve information by giving it to grandchildren, says Warren.

She says one of most appealing gifts is a personal book that grandparents write for their grandchildren. You can include information and stories about your own parents and grandparents, sisters, brothers and other relatives; where you were born and raised; games you played as children; school days. and work experiences.

"Grandchildren especially enjoy learning about the funny incidents and occasional trouble that their parents got into when they were young," Warren

The specialist says that the blank books sold in department and book stores are ideal for this purpose. She concedes that writing may seem like an overwhelming task, but writing one page a day can fill a book quickly.

If you don't enjoy writing, Warren suggests using electronic means to record family traditions.

"A video or tape recorder makes creating oral histories easy," she says. "If you want to change a story, it can easily be erased and redone with the push of a button. Plus, some embarrassing, but wonderful, family stories may be easier to record than tell face-to-face."



History Of Computer Study Shows Progress

the study of computers as a science during the 1980 school year. The lab setting for computers at that time was made up of five radio shack models with tape drives and three monitors. Computer technology in schools was hardly known at the time. During the 1982-83 school year, the Muleshoe ISD Board of Education approved the purchase of a new computer lab to be installed in Muleshoe High School. This lab consisted of 20 Apple IIc models. At that time, the course offering was made up of an introductory course for one semester.

During the 1985-86 school year, the lab was updated with IBM compatable models to replace the Apple IIc models. The lab was moved to Room 13 which became an integrated part of the Business and Math Departments of Muleshoe High School.

The beginning course for students is called Introduction to Computers. The full year beginning courses actually consists of two semester courses: Introduction to Computer Programming (½ credit) and Business Data Processing (½ unit). The combination of these two courses give the student one full credit of Computer Science which meets the state requirement for the Advanced High School Graduation Program. In addition to the introductory

Computer technology in schools was hardly course, Muleshoe High School offers a course called Computer Programmer which is an advanced programming courses, and Computer Math is offered. Computer math is an above-Algebra I course which counts as a math course or a computer science course. (It cannot count

In addition to the teaching of computer science through the lab setting, Muleshoe High School has approximately 35 other computers placed various classrooms and the office. Students use computers in all English classes for word processing, note taking in the library, and tutorial lessons as necessary. Computers are used in the Science Department for lab work. At the present time, several programs are available for lab simulations and enrichment and remedial work in science. Every department makes use of computers in various ways. Four are placed in the library for students' use along with a printer.

In visiting with Wayland Ethridge, high school principal, we asked about the use of computers in the office. This was where his enlightment seemed to focus for the current year. "We have been using IBM compatible for about 3 years." "During this time, all of the office personnel have become familiar with the Lotus 1-2-3 symphony program which consists of word processing,

spread sheet utilization, and the use of a data base." "We have the complete high school inventory on a data base at the present time and many other reports either on data base or spread sheet for yearly updating." Ethridge stated that he is most excited about the computer hookup with PEAMS this year. "For the high school, this means that we are totally computerized in the office." "We will use the computer for report cards each six weeks, we use it for daily absentee reports and records, it will print transcripts for us at the end of the school year, and it will schedule students for the following year." "It has really been a plus to have this service for our schools." "I feel that as we progress with this program, we will be even more excited," said Ethridge.

Ethridge stated that he would strongly advise that every student in Muleshoe High School plan to take at least one computer science course before graduating. "This is the modern age," said Ethridge. "All young people today will, whether they like it or not, be dealing with computers all of their lives." "It would be a shame to complete schooling with no understanding of computers or how they work."







Peso Drop Poses Loss In Taxes of all Texas retail sales occur

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said the drop in value of the Mexican peso last week poses a potential loss in state and local tax revenues.

"The most immediate impact of the peso devaluation will be a decline in retail sales along the border because of the reduced purchasing power of Mexican consumers," Bullock said.

Bullock said economists in his office cannot put a final price tag on a possible loss until the exchange rate of the peso

"We know that retail trade along the border fell significantly in 1982 when the peso dropped and it's not out of the question to think we'll see a

No I-9's For Producers Of Perishable Crops

do not need to complete I-9 spices, herbs and hops. forms on production and harvesting employees until December 1988.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service recently ruled that perishable crop farmers will not be subject to penalties for I-9 recordkeeping requirements until Dec. 1, 1988, points out Dr. Dick Edwards, economist with the Texas Aricultural Extension Service, The Texas. A&M University System. Nor will the INS go back and retroactively check for I-9 completion for the period ending Nov. 30, 1988.

employers complete which verifies thay have inspected documents which verify that persons have the legal right to work in this country.

employees who are hired to work in the production and harvesting of crops that have been deemed perishable by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Edwards points out.

Those perishable crops include all fruits, vegetables, nuts, corn, rice, peanuts, wheat, horticultural specialty products, Christmas trees, sugar beets,

Producers of perishable crops soybeans, cut flowers, tobacco,

. Producers of other crops, livestock, poultry and dairy are excluded, so these employers must continue to fill out and maintain I-9 forms. Producers of perishable crops must also continue to complete I-9 forms on office employees, mechanics, packing house employees and other workers, emphasizes the economist.

According to Edwards, the December 1988 date does present one drawback. Present law prohibits the INS from fining employers for hiring violations before June 1, 1988, if they An I-9 form is the document have not been issued a warning first. Thus, perishable crop farmers must become familiar with the law by the time they are required to keep records and hire only legal workers. The latest INS ruling covers When the law applies to them, there will be no warnings issued for first-time offenders.

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

Future Cotton Market Explored

With a much smaller acreage reduction in store for 1988 cotton, the supply likely will increase, according to an Extension cotton marketing economist at Texas A&M University.

The 1988 upland cotton program will include a 12.5 percent acreage reduction, a target price of 77 cents per pound, and a loan level of 51.8 cents per pound for base quality, average location, says Dr. Carl G. Anderson, economist - cotton marketing for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"While the target price and loan rates are slightly lower, the acreage reduction program (ARP) is half the 25 percent for the 1987 crop," Anderson says.

If the adjusted world price drops below the loan level, the Plan B marketing loan program will be used, he adds. The world price has been well above the loan level, however, in 1987.

"Should the world price plunge below the loan rate, loan deficiency payments will be made to eligible producers who agree to forego loan eligibility,"

Anderson says. Up to 50 percent of any loan deficiency payment may be made in generic commodity certificates on a bale-by-bale basis. There will be no paid land diversion program nor inventory reduction program he

"The lower acreage reduction program suggests more acreage and more cotton in 1988,

provided yields are average or above. Strong consumtion for the 1988 crop is becomnig more questionable. A potential economic recession in the second half of 1988 may curtail demand," he continued.

The likely result, he adds, is more cotton supplies, less usage, larger ending stocks and a weaker market.

Key factors in 1988 price movement are possible changes in estimated ending stocks. A clear signal in the first half of 1988 that U.S. cotton gorwers are likely to produce enough cotton to exceed market needs may be bearish, Anderson says.

Favorable October weather increased the U.S. crop forecast to 13.9 million bales and expected 1987 ending stocks to above the 4-million-mark. A 1988 crop larger than usage would increase stocks by the end of that season, Anderson

"The likely result is lower prices. Growers should have a 1988 marketing plan prepared that takes into account forward pricing alterntives," he recommends.

When cotton stocks are dropping rapidly, as in 1987, the market tends to overreact dur-



Texas 4-H Program Receives Major Grant


