Milestones of American Genius



ROBERT EDWIN PEARY

IN a generation when commercial and political success were the goals of most men, Robert Edwin Peary devoted himself to the hazardous life of extending man's knowledge of the world in which he lives. His discovery of the North Pole marked the apex of his career of exploration. It was touched, unfortunately, by bitterness because of the alleged earlier discovery of the Pole by earlier discovery of the Pole by

Peary was born on May 6, 1856, at Cresson, Pa., but spent most of his youth near Portland, Maine. Even as a boy he showed the persistence in reaching the top which ultimately, after twen-ty-five years of hardship, brought him literally to the top of the

world.

He was educated at the local public schools and at Bowdoin College, where he took an engineering course. After graduation he entered the Navy, joining the corps of civil engineers. It was while serving in this corps that he came across an article describing the inland ice of Greenland. He developed the theory that this ice cap might make an accessible route to the North Pole. Finally, in 1886, he persuaded Navy officials to grant him a leave of absence to explore

government permission to leave with another expedition. The seventh attempt was begun in July; 1908, and was successfully completed on April 6, 1909. Peary returned from the Pole to find that Dr. Cook had just announced his own supposed discovery of the Pole before Peary. It was a bitter blow. But before Peary's death, Dr. Cook's



John Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation said in a recent address at Kalamazoo, Michigan:

"We are prone today to decry the immorality of youth, when we learn that seventeen percent of all crime is committed by persons of less than voting age. Rather, however, we should look upon the truth of this situation which is to be found in the failure of parenthood to train the youthful minds into paths free from criminality. Today, there are in America over 4,300.00 criminals actively at work, plundering, marauding and murdering. There is an aggregate of over 1,-300,000 serious crimes each year, which means that every twentyfour seconds there is a felonious infraction of our laws including In addition over 14,000,000 minor robbery, assault, arson or murder. crimes are committed each year, not including traffic and liquor law violations. Each setting sun leaves its final glow over a country supposed to be the most enlightened in all the world; yet each and every day witnesses a total of thirty-six deaths at the hands of murderers
****Our greatest crime in America today is the toleration of crimetoleration of the conidtions existing throughout the nation which help to create a national crime bill estimated at fifteen billions of dollars each year."

That is a serious indictment. The worst part of it is that these conditions exist because we are willing that they should. Ask most any man of the street the cause of these conditions and he has a ready answer-"it is the fault of somebody else." We art all "Alibi Ikes." If, instead of offering alibis, every one of us would give serious consideration to his own responsibility for these conditions, with a view to correcting them, the record would be a different one with surprising





Efforts to balance supply with demand resulted in the passage of the Connelly hot oil act, which seeks to regulate oil shipments between states.

Mr. Brown also told of the efforts of the association to prevent harmful legislation to the oil industy, particularly with reference to the elimination of the twentyseven and a half percent depletion clause from the annual income.

C. E. Buckner, executive minager from Tulsa, Oklahoma reviewed briefly the organization plans and stressed the practical value of a closer cooperation. He said the Artesia meeting was the 26th district meeting held by the association this year. Twenty-eight district meetings of the association are scheduled in the oil states.

Dr. E. H. Wells of Socorro, president of the New Mexico School of Mines, reviewed briefly the history of oil legislation and proration in New Mexico, beginning with the conservation law of 1912.
