A Slowly Recovering Economy Reflected

State Comptroller Bob Bullock late last week sent checks totaling \$57.6 million in local sales tax to 852 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Bullock said this month's allocations showed an increase of \$3.3 million over last year's December allocations, an increase of 6.2 percent.

However, statewide year-end totals for the monthly city allocation decreased to \$850.7 million from the 1986 total payment of \$886.3 million, Bullock added.

"The increase in this month's payments is the result of two factors - statewide economic recovery and a widening of the state's tax base," Bullock said. "Our economy is recovering, but it's going to take some time," he added.

December checks represent taxes collected in October and reported by November 20. October was the first month that the broadened tax base went into effect, according to Bullock.

The tax base was widened as a result of state legislation passed during last summer's

special session.

For Muleshoe, the rebate check amounted to \$14,737.70, up from the \$12,431.27 received for the same period a year ago. This year, closing out 1987, Muleshoe is 2.01 percent behind total receipts received for 1986 at \$188,441.62, compared to 1986's total of \$192,306.52.

In Cochran County, Morton is still 6.21 percent behind 1986 receipts with a total of \$48,654.34, compared to the \$51,878.40 received a year ago. Payments for the current period were \$4,697.42, up considerably over the \$3,467.19 received a year ago.

Cedar Ridge 'Mayor'

Aids EMS Toy Project

For the past 19 years, plus, he has been known as 'The Mayor of Cedar Ridge,' a local location in the foothills out of Sacramento, CA. But until the late 1940's he was known as Junior Benson, a Muleshoe resident.

John Benson, Jr., has not forgotten his Muleshoe roots, although he left here in 1947, when he joined the military. He never came back to Muleshoe to live, but still remembers many of the local youth (in the 40's).

When he lived in Muleshoe, his father was a contractor, who constructed homes and businesses. He attended school here, and played football here. He ran with local boys, such as Bill Jim and Lowell Irvin St. Clair, Billy Don Barber, the late Joe Pat Wagnon and others. (He also remembers a number of the 'girls' here, apparently having had an eye for pretty girls.)

Snow Blows; Traffic Slows; Schools And Businesses Close

After enjoying unseasonably very warm weather into mid-December, under an illusion of 'no winter for 1987' -- area residents got a rude awakening when Mother Nature unleashed her own 'Bag of Tricks' over the last weekend.

Saturday, it was cold and cloudy, with predictions of possible snow -- the first for this winter. By Sunday morning, it was snowing -- and it continued to snow, and snow, and snow.

That wouldn't have been too bad, except it was windy -- and got windier. And then, snowdrifts started forming. Drifts of three to four feet virtually paralyzed traffic, and kept city and state maintainers and snow equipment busy. As fast as they could plow the snow off the streets and highways, it was blowing back again.

Most motorists found it rough going -- including police cars. Many police vehicles were unable to move through the deep drifts, so pickups and four-wheel drive vehicles were utilized.

Using maintainers and snow plows, major thoroughfares, and emergency locations were plowed out to allow emergency vehicles to move. Chains were installed and what traffic that was moving just crept along.

School was cancelled in a wide area, as most country roads, and many FM roads were considered impassable. Businesses closed, or opened late. Some opened late and closed early, as the snow continued to

fall all day on Monday, adding to the woes.

By the time the snow stopped late Monday evening, an estimated 10 inches of snow had fallen, and once the sky started clearing, the temperature started rapidly dropping. By 8:30 p.m. Monday, it was officially 3 degrees above zero. On Tuesday morning, the official low as -9 degrees, and many people found they were without water due to frozen water pipes -their vehicles wouldn't start, and once again, it was very careful driving on icy, snow-packed roads.

Basketball games, civic meetings, Boy Scout meetings, and schools were again cancelled on Tuesday, and several businesses were opening late.

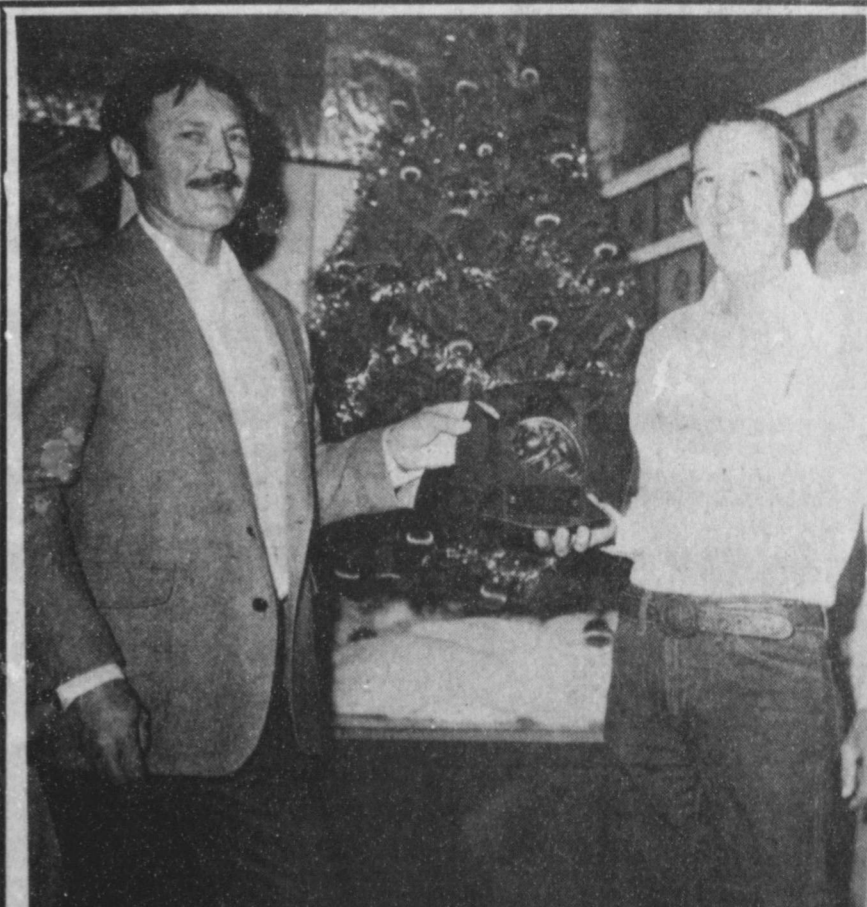
"This will be 'The Spirit of Christmas,'" said the band director, "and we believe we will have music to please everyone."

FIRST IN PANHANDLE CITY SALES TAX PASSED

Despite miserable weather conditions Saturday, a total of 307 votes were cast in the municipal election for the city sales tax which carried by a margin of 153 votes.

Ballots cast during the voting hours tallied 230 for the sales tax and 77 against.

The mayor said revenue from the tax would total from \$40,000 to \$50,000 annually. He said "The city is not in debt, but additional revenue is needed to finance improvement projects."

Muleshoe is the first city in the Panhandle area to call a city sales tax election, although numerous towns in south and east Texas have passed the tax in elections, while few have rejected the issue where votes have been cast.

Holly Huckaby, a member of the Muleshoe 4-H Club, and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lyndon Huckaby, won first place in the senior fruits and vegetables category at the South Plains District 4-H Food Show held at Texas Tech University on Saturday, Dec. 12. This win qualifies her for the State 4-H Food Show to be held in June, 1988, in College Station.

Shane Schuster, Muleshoe 4-H'er, placed second in the junior 2 breads and cereals category. District competition is as far as junior contestants may advance.

Other Muleshoe 4-H'ers participating in the district food show included: Fara Black, junior 1 main dish; Denise Greenhouse, junior 1 fruits and vegetables; Suzy Hodges, junior
