



SPEAKING OF TAXES

Speaking of taxes, the New Mexico Tax Bulletin reminds us since New Mexico became a state we have added the property tax a source of revenue, the succession of the inheritance tax, the private car tax, the gasoline tax, the sales tax, the income tax, the liquor license and stamp tax, the franchise tax, the severance tax and other forms of taxes more or less productive of revenue.

Many of these are classed as the hidden tax and are not so apparent as the property tax. The extent of these taxes on the cost of living is not generally realized, which makes it easy for the so-called painless taxes to be proposed and passed.

Fire prevention week has passed, but it should not lessen precautions against fires and the attendant dangers. At this season of the year most people have either made their heating equipment ready for the fall and winter or plan to install it at once. Proper inspection now may save a fire, it may save a life. By all means see that your home is not only properly heated, but ventilated as well. In winters passed several tragic and near tragic accidents have occurred here from poor ventilation and improperly vented stoves and heaters.

The government cotton forecast, released last Friday, which indicated the second largest cotton crop in the history of the United States shows clearly the cotton farmer of the south can still raise cotton and that history repeats itself. The unstable cotton market has also checked the upward tendency of other commodities. It shows, among other things, that we can't have increasing prices on the majority of farm commodities, while one major commodity continues to be depressed by over production.
