

#### GETTING AIRPORT CONSCIOUS

Interest in building a class "A" airport near Artesia is increasing among both local business men and oil men having connections with the fields near here.

Investigation has disclosed several oil men from Tulsa, Oklahoma City and other oil centers use airplanes regularly in coming here on business. But most of them, because there are no hangar accommodations at Artesia, fly to Roswell and use other means of transportation for the remainder of the trip, rather than have to stake down their ships and leave them in the wind and dust.

And there is the possibility a regular air mail route will come up the Pecos Valley, which interests local enthusiasts.

Tentative plans call for purchase of a field, construction of properly built and ample runways and building of a hangar to accomodate 5 or 6 planes.

The burglary, in which Vander-Molen and probable accomplices New Locations Include Two in carried off the office safe, netted only \$156, but meant a loss to the company of more than \$50,000 in bonds and notes, until recovery of the safe from the Pecos River March 4 after a reward of \$500 had been posted.

The burglars entered the company office through a rear room, cutting a hole in a door panel and unlocking another inside door leading to the main Malco office. The safe was probably opened after being hauled away on a truck. After overlooked, it was dumped into the Pecos off of the bridge east of Ar-

#### COURTESY WHEN THE SIREN SOUNDS

The false alarm Friday afternoon, calling firemen to Mexican Hill, brought several things to mind.

In the first place an alarm, just to see the firemen step about, is not only thoughtless and expensive to the city, but it subjects to unnecessary perils those who are willing to risk their lives when necessary in the protection of property.

The safety of the public is at stake as well, as the fire truck, because of the time factor involved in many cases, is driven at a rapid

Sometimes a false alarm cannot be helped. Someone seeing smoke or a blaze which seems to come from a building does the one proper thing; he turns in an alarm. In such a case his mistake is excusable. Even should there be a mishap in connection with the run, the person calling the fire department is absolved of blame, for he was trying to protect and save another's property.

On the other hand, there are laws, and stringent too, which are at 6:45 Sunday evening. devised to take care of thrill seekers who turn in fire alarms just for the "fun of it." It is no fun to be called from your business on a hot afternoon, risk your neck and get hot and dirty, whether there is a fire or not. If there is a fire, one doesn't mind so much.

Just as dangerous to life and property is a habit which seems to ing church elsewhere. prevail in Artesia-or really there are two habits, both involving are always welcome. traffic: One is failing to clear the street in order to give fire apparatus the right of way; the other is racing to the fire in the wake of the truck.

The laws everywhere provide that all vehicles be pulled over as close to the curb as possible and then stopped until the apparatus or firemen's automobiles have passed. In Artesia, because of the volunteer department, firemen must first rush to the fire station and then head for the scene of the fire.

A moment after the siren sounded Friday, the sirens on the automobiles of Calvin Dunn of the department and Irvin Martin, marshall and deputy sheriff, were heard coming from the east. Traffic continued with little interruption and practically no respect to those who were heading for the fire house as a public duty. A moment later when the truck roared back down Main Street with Dunn at the helm, traffic continued to move in both directions.

And before the truck headed north on the highway and was out of sight, there was a stream of cars spread out all over the street like the tail of a comet, hell-bent on getting to the fire-if any-as soon third Thursday afternoon at 2:30.

It happened that some automobiles following the truck carried firemen. They had every right to push on. And the others should have given them a clear street. Surely 100 to 200 yards behind the firemen would get anyone to the scene in ample time to see every-

A little more thoughtfulness and courtesy will make it easier on the voluntter fire department and help make Artesia a safer town in which to live.

#### TODAY'S LITTLE PREACHMENT

It looks as though we have let ourselves in for it, but we don't K. Y. B. care. One of our first editorials in Artesia, written at the suggestion of a subscriber, mentioned a needed civic improvement. Since then others have made suggestions and we, agreeing, have editorialized.

All this preamble is by way of letting our readers know we are not a chronic squawker or constant fault-finder. But we do believe that cooperation in matters of civic pride and public comfort and safety should be brought to the attention of the public from time to time. That's what this column is for, among other things. We have no desire to revamp Artesia to our liking; we like it as it is. In this case the suggestion is that citizens of Artesia be more careful about littering up the streets with waste paper. It is unsightly in the first place. And when the wind whirls down the street, as it frequently does here, the paper sometimes accumulates in the doorways of places of business so deep one can hardly wade through. Just like the good old Northern blizzard.

Waste paper should be placed in waste cans or burned-when the wind is not sharp—and then in screened containers.

### GUIDE TO TRAFFIC SAFETY

Police departments undertaking the vitally important problem of traffic engineering, now have a guide to standard procedure. A new handbook, entitled "Traffic Engineering and the Police," has been published jointly by the National Conservation Bureau and the Safety Division of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. Its publication rounds out another section of the Bureau's comprehensive traffic control program undertaken on behalf of the nation's leading stock casualty insurance companies.

Much of the handbook is devoted to the use of traffic engineering methods to reduce hazard at accident-prone locations—those spots flying, so will the Lord of hosts in a community where accidents occur most frequently. 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



Soften cream cheese with milk. Add sugar, 1 cup at a time, blending after each addition. Add chocolate and salt and beat until smooth. Makes enough frosting to cover tops of two 8-inch (or 9-inch) layers, or top and sides of 8x8x2-inch cake, or about 2 dozen cup cakes. Double the recipe to cover tops and sides of two 10-inch layers. - Note: This frosting, when tightly

covered. may be kept in refrigers several days before maing.

At a meeting of the Chaves County Game Protective Association held at the Chamber of Commerce in Roswell last Friday evening, it was announced by the sportsmen that they would carry their fight for a December duck hunting season direct to the United States Biological Survey.

The Chaves County sportsmen recommended to the state game commission the December season for New Mexico. However, it was the opinion of the majority present at the meeting that this recommendation will not be approved by Elliot S. Barker, state game warden, and the state game commission, so they were determined to go direct to the United States Biological Survey.

The 1938 shooting season on ducks and geese will be set at a meeting of the U.S. Biological Survey on June 20.

## Common Fly Is A Menace to Health

The common housefly possesses two deceiving characteristics. As ENGRAVING-THE ADVOCATE. insects go, it is not offensive in appearance and it is so common that its presence is to a large degree accepted, says Dr. George W. Cox, a health authority. Nevertheless, the fly is a very real threat to good health. It is estimated the fly is responsible for 40,000 deaths annually in America. Its efficiency as a spreader of typhoid fever, infant diarrheal infections and tuberculosis is well recognized by the medical profession, Dr. Cox declares and says:

"We have, even so, made much progress against the diseasespreading fly. The screening of homes and a sanitary consciousness both in urban and rural communities have reduced the fly's disease-spreading ability. We all must realize, however, that in many areas there are still properties lacking sanitary pit privies and adequate screenings and garbage and filth are permitted inexcusably to exist as breeding spots for flies. "It is such carelessness that still

makes possible widespread fly hav-. There is no reason to tolerate fly-breeding conditions. In the protection, household screening would have required 40 hours with holds over 100 tons of chopped hay. and fly-swatting will greatly neutralize the damaging potentialities ers. of barnyards and cowlots.


