Mr. Dexter stressed that 50 cents of every membership up to and including a \$25 supporting membership remains in the North Eddy County fund for needy and emergency cases. The 50 cents in each case goes to the national Red Cross to be used in case of disaster in any part of the nation.

Explaining it further, Mr. Dexter said the money collected remains at home as follows: \$1 annual membership, 50 cents at home; \$5 contributing membership, \$4.50 at home; \$10 sustaining membership, \$9.50 at home; \$25 supporting membership, \$24.50 at



MUST NOT FORGET RACIAL ORIGINS

If Americans were shocked and saddened by the dissection of Czechoslovakia, they ought to be almighty careful not to let the principle on which that dissection was based become established in their own land.

The principle is simple. It is that the ties of "race" are both permanent and all-important; that a man is, for all time, what his ancestors were, no matter where he may go or what he may do, and 5 that no right of society or claim of economics can prevail against that racial tie.

That is about as dangerous a piece of dynamite as could well be introduced into American life. For if there is one spot on earth where the whole structure of society rests on the exact opposite of that theory, the United States is it.

So it is extremely discouraging to read of the little brush which Gov. Lehman of New York has been having with the Ukranians of that state.

The Ukranian-American Democratic Club recently bolted the state ticket—on the ground that although the Ukranians cast 125,000 votes in New York elections, only five persons of Ukranian extraction | Christian Endeavor Society. hold political office. The president of the organization declared that in addition to patronage his people want representation in party councils in proportion to their voting strength.

That is a lesson that we thought we had learned a century ago. Apparently it needs to be learned again. For this emphasis on the importance of race is the subtlest and most dangerous thing that "When mortal man blends his proof walls. could possibly arise in American life. Unless it is stamped out we are in for the worst kind of trouble.-Gallup Independent.



State banks reported a total of \$13,023,085 in resources, as of Sept. 28. State Bank Examiner Woodlan Sanders' office announced, showing a gain of \$256,680 since June 30, date of the latest previous report. Loans had increased, in the same period to \$4,715,034. On June 30 they were \$264,128 less. Deposits totaled \$11,663,757 on Sept 28, also showing an increase. On June 30, they totaled \$11,456,-272. Of the \$11,663,757, the bank examiner's office said \$2,357,385 was in savings and time accounts, showing a decrease of \$68,349 in this item.





Uncle Sam Has Scruples About Christmas Mail

Uncle Sam has scruples that, violated, might cost an offender a century, or in the venacular, "100 berries." This is brought to the attention of the millions of people in this country as Christmas again approaches, for postmasters are warning that while the postal service will gladly carry a Christmas greeting anywhere within the country for 11/2 cents, inclusion of written messages in a parcel post package makes the sender liable to a substantial penalty.

"Written cards in parcel post packages makes the package first class mail and any person doing this is liable to a fine of \$100," a postal authority said.




