#### SHOULD PERMIT USE OF SHALLOW WELLS

Ignorance of the law is no excuse, according to the old saying, but there are times when the person overstepping the law deserves consideration. Such is the case in regard to valley farmers and ranchers who have been enjoined from using their water wells which were drilled after a restraining law was passed in 1931.

Under the law, no one was permitted to drill a shallow well without a permit from the state engineer. But many farmers and ranchers, knowing nothing of the law, or thinking it applied only to and third Thursday. Artesian wells, went ahead with their drilling in order to improve their places, and then were restrained last year from using them.

Those fellows are not deliberate law breakers. They are good citizens, who paid good money for their ranches or farms and who are interested only in improving them to the benefit of themselves and the community. They drilled the wells in good faith.

It seems that they should be allowed to use those wells. We understand the shallow water did not decrease with the use of the additional wells prior to the restraining order.

The state legislature should pass a bill when it convenes in January making legal all water wells, where needed, which were Good music and sermon. drilled after the passage of the bill in 1931 and before the restrain-

ing order. Such a bill will be given careful consideration if all ranchers and farmers interested speak up, individually and as a body, making their voices heard in Santa Fe. Lay the facts before the legislators,

write letters, send telegrams and lobby if necessary, but get together. The new bill, of course, should prohibit further drilling without permission, but those affected probably will know better in the future, for they now are conscious of the present law.

#### THE CHRISTMAS CANDLE OF HEALTH

"How far that little candle throws its beams." This well known speech of Portia's in "The Merchant of Venice" well applies to the theme on the 1938 Christmas seal. And the second line may be changed to read: "So shines this little symbol for a healthier world."

The pleasant custom of lighting a candle in the window on Christmas Eve has come down through the ages and the mother with her two children on this year's seal links that seasonal ritual with the day in each month. idea of family and home. The message of the seal is "Protect your home from tuberculosis." To carry out the suggestion of earlier days the three characters are costumed in the formal style of the Victorian era, the period when "Home" was idealized and holiday customs meant much to old and young alike.

The health situation in those days, however, was in a sorry state. That is why it is well to realize, as we buy and use our 1938 Christmas seals, that we are living in an age when modern methods and intelligent cooperation have completely revolutionized health conditions in our country. In the middle nineteenth century, for example, people did not even know that tuberculosis was contagious. Although Dr. Robert Koch, a German physician, had discovered the germ that causes the disease in 1882, it was many years before the public learned the way infection spreads. In homes of those days any one who had consumption was considered doomed to death-he was kept indoors and watched over resignedly by his sorrowing family. When ice other members broke down with the "wasting sickness" they never realized they had been infected by the coughing victim—they believed tuberculosis was inherited. The treatment prescribed then by the best physicians was exercise or an ocean voyage, plus many tonics.

In 1885 Dr. Edward L. Trudeau established modern sanatorium treatment of tuberculosis in this country and rest became recognized as all-important. Today we have advanced still further and through the tuberculin test and X-ray are able to detect tuberculosis in its early stages, when cure in most cases may be effected.

We are privileged indeed to be living in this healthier world. The death rate from tuberculosis, for years the leading cause of death, has been cut more than two-thirds since the turn of the century. Each year finds the public better informed in the need for prevention. Yet tuberculosis still takes more lives than any other sickness during the ages between 15 and 45 years. Until that important group of people have been protected, the educational work of the Christmas seal must

The little candle on the 1938 Christmas seal throws its beams far out into the world. To those who are ill from tuberculosis it offers hope, encouragement. To others, it stands as the beacon of happy healthful homes-homes free of tuberculosis.



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

If we keep these things in mind a good deal of the usual winter losses of weight and produc-

tion can be forestalled. No matter with what kind of livestock or poultry we are dealing, an extra feed supply is mighty good weatherboarding against winter shrinkage in weight or slowed up production. The carbonaceous feeds of course play the larger part in supplying fuel for heat, but this does not mean that the protein elements should be omitted if the carbohydrates are to do an efficient job. A balanced ration is to be assumed under any and all conditions, winter or summer, for growth or production, for fattening or mere maintenance.




