"Any community can buy the degree of health it wants," Dr. Parker said, in explaining communicable diseases decrease in any town, county or state as funds for health work are increased.

In the last few years, Phoebe Jane, 9. he said, the press and radio have helped educate the public on the disease, which was formerly more widespread because of ignorance. "Until the public looks on venereal diseases as other communicable diseases, we cannot hope to wipe them out," he said.

Contrary to general belief, no other disease can be cured with as great certainty if treatment begins early, Dr. Parker said. Positive cures are made in 85 per cent of the cases, he declared. In the United States, 8 to 10

Wendell Welch Monday Night Dies Sunday in Thieves Monday night stole a Texas Hospital

The Pearson brothers reported Son of Prominent Oil Man Follows Brother, Van. P., in Death by Six Weeks - Services, Burial Are Here Tuesday.

> Wendell N. Welch, operator of the W. N. Welch Drilling Company, died at 5:30 o'clock Sunday morning in a San Antonio, Tex., ospital at the age of 35 years, less than six weeks after the death on Oct. 25 of his brother, Van P. Welch, his former partner.

> The brothers, both prominent in oil circles, were sons of Van S. Welch, one of the best known oil men in Southeast New Mexico and a pioneer operator in the fields of this section.

Wendell Welch was poorly the last five years and was in the San Antonio hospital the greater part of the time since September. He was seriously ill since Monday of last week.

With Mr. Welch at the time of his death were his wife, his father, his two sisters, Miss Phoebe Welch of Artesia and Mrs. S. J. Iverson of Fort Worth, Tex., and Mrs. V. P. Welch. They all arrived here Sunday night. Mr. Welch's brother, James M. Welch, who had been at San Antonio, returned to Artesia Saturday.

THE KING HAD A TOUGH LIFE

In the current issue of a number of the better magazines is a striking advertisement, advertising a nationally known beverage, pleasing to some, abhorrent to others. The product does not interest us; rather are we speaking of the picture and editorial matter.

"Long lived the king . . . but it was a hard life," the advertisement reminds us. It reads:

"All Europe marveled at the pomp and splendor of Louis Fourteenth. Yet in all his 77 years, the French king had no refrigerator, fans or telephone . . . no radio or movies . . . no inflated tires on his gaudy coach."

(It seems the ad writer could have included newspapers, but he come and worship with us. overlooked that bet. However, he continues:)

"So, it appears that we Americans don't live like kings at all. We live far better . . . far beyond the dreams of our pioneers . . . in a land of peace, coddled by science and invention . . . strengthened by the knowledge that this land of ours will always offer ample rewards to those with faith in the foundations laid down by our forefathers . . . faith in our national destiny . . . faith in themselves."

Yes, we live far better than kings; we live far better than our cousins overseas; we live far better than dictators who hold the destinies of our cousins in their hands.

For we can arise tomorrow with clear consciences, unafraid that our programs of life will backfire, that some assassin's bullet will find us; secure in that we do not have the blood of a helpless race or downtrodden people on our hands; happy that our fellow citizens neither fear us nor harbor inward designs against us.

NEWSPAPERING FROM NEWSMAN'S EYES

We have a friend who, comparatively young, has made a reputation for himself in the publishing field. He has held down about every kind of a job a newspaper plant has to offer. He has held them down well. Looking back on fifteen years of newspapering, these are his pungent observations, which should interest both the trade and readers:

Most newspapers reflect too much of the tastes of their editors and not enough of that of the readers.

God's greatest gift to journalism is a good proofreader.

A press agent who receives half as much free space as he asks for is happy because he has twice as much as he exepected.

The fact that a question arises in a reporter's mind whether

something should go into a story, supplies the answer that it shouldn't. The easiest way to lose a friend for life is to print his name with the wrong middle initial.

The best newspaper recruits come from schools of journalism. That is left-handed praise for the schools. Primarily it reflects the fact few decide they want to go into the game early enough to educate themselves for it.

One person out of ten is convinced that for the right price any story can be kept out of the papers.

Even though editors sometimes are elected to public office, no one can be a good editor and a good politician at the same time.

Every newspaperman should know shorthand, but few do. Paradoxically, the best way to secure a favorable press is to tell the press all, and in particular the part you do not believe should be

printed. Four out of five of the editorials that see print are an utter

waste of space. The curse of the profession is that its reporters don't have time

to write their stories in half as many words. The man who says he doesn't want to see his name in the papers

under any circumstances, lies through his teeth.

Three out of four newspapermen can't spell and are largely in ignorance of the rules of grammar to be found in a primary school

No composing room is quite satisfied with the contents of the newspaper given it to put into type. Professional reformers, as a class, are the hardest to satisfy of

anyone with whom a newspaper regularly deals. Women would get farther in journalism if girl graduates from

schools of journalism didn't feel that being a society editor was be-

Most readers relish an off-color story occasionally, so long as it is told in nice words.

Newspapers would be better if editors didn't take themselves so seriously. (Including this one.) - Santa Fe New Mexican.


