out Saturday. The cause of the explosion has not been determined. Three boiler inspectors declared it was not caused from shortage of water.

The explosion demolished the engine room, throwing timbers and sheet metal siding and roofing as far as 500 feet. The northeast corner of the machine shop, adjacent to the boiler, received the full force of the blast, but the building remained standing.

Aside from a huge hole in the corner caused by the explosion, other damage in the machine shop was attributed to repercussion, for the south wall and west door were forced inward, as were all win-

Boiler Is Jumbled Mass

The boiler was a jumbled mass of pipes. The large outside plate, cardboard, was flattened.

The other men were slightly injured when blown out the door by the force of the explosion.

Joe Burrus of Artesia, who was working behind the lathe where Mr. Riske was standing and only a few feet away, miraculously received only minor injuries. Although splintered wood was strewn around him and timbers fell near him, none struck him hard enough to inflict wounds. He protected his head with his arms while timmers and debris were falling and said afterwards it seemed things fell for several minutes.

Calls Fire Department Earl Zeigler, manager, was in the shop office at the time of the blast and was uninjured, although hurled across the room.

Farmers have been notified that under the proposal, the cotton acreage allotment will be cut from 39 to 34 per cent in this area, whereas it will be increased from 39 to 44 per cent in the Carlsbad The North Eddy County farmers believe the proposed division there-

fore would work a hardship on them to the personal advantage of farmers in the Carlsbad territory who last year attempted the same general division but failed. Under the 40-50 base which the division would provide, area "A" would get 240 acres more cotton base, which men interested in the

There will probably be several thousand more producing oil wells in the United States at the end of 1939 than at the beginning, according to one article in the issue, Chaves, Lea and Lincoln Counties as the increasing trend of recent by T. H. Boswell, Jr., secretaryyears is expected to continue. At treasurer. the beginning of 1939, there were 371,875 producing oil wells in the

United States, the most on record. Known crude oil reserves in the United States also are now at an all-time peak, amounting to 15,-890,840,000 barrels, the magazine estimated, an increase of almost 400,000,000 barrels over the reserves a year ago. For in 1938, the industry added 1,590,815,000 barrels to the known reserves, through discoveries of new fields the business sessions. and extensions of old ones, while it took only 1,212,907,000 barrels from the reserves in the form of the current production of the year.

Comparatively heavy drilling in the United States is in prospect, although a small decrease in well completions from the number in 1938 is forecast. The magazine made a forecast, based on an extensive survey, that well completions in the United States in 1939 would total approximately 26,965. That would represent 5.7

per cent less drilling than in 1938. However, expenditures for drilling operations are expected to be a little larger than in 1939 than they were in 1938, when oil companies drew more heavily than usual from warehouse stocks. And expenditures for pumping operations are expected to be up ma-

Earnings in the oil industry possibly will be about the same in 1939 as in 1938, although some decline would not be surprising, because crude oil prices have been lowered somewhat in recent months. However, if 1938 earnings are duplicated the industry will be showing profits close to the average for the last five years.

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


