Scott Re-Elected

Light Turnout

Only 477 Bailey County voters, out of nearly 4,000 took the time and trouble to go to the polls Tuesday, in a run-off election, with only one contested race locally.

Bailey County Commissioner for Precinct One, R. L. Scott, defeated H. E. Newsom, 207-87, and will continue as commissioner. He faces no Republican opposition in November.

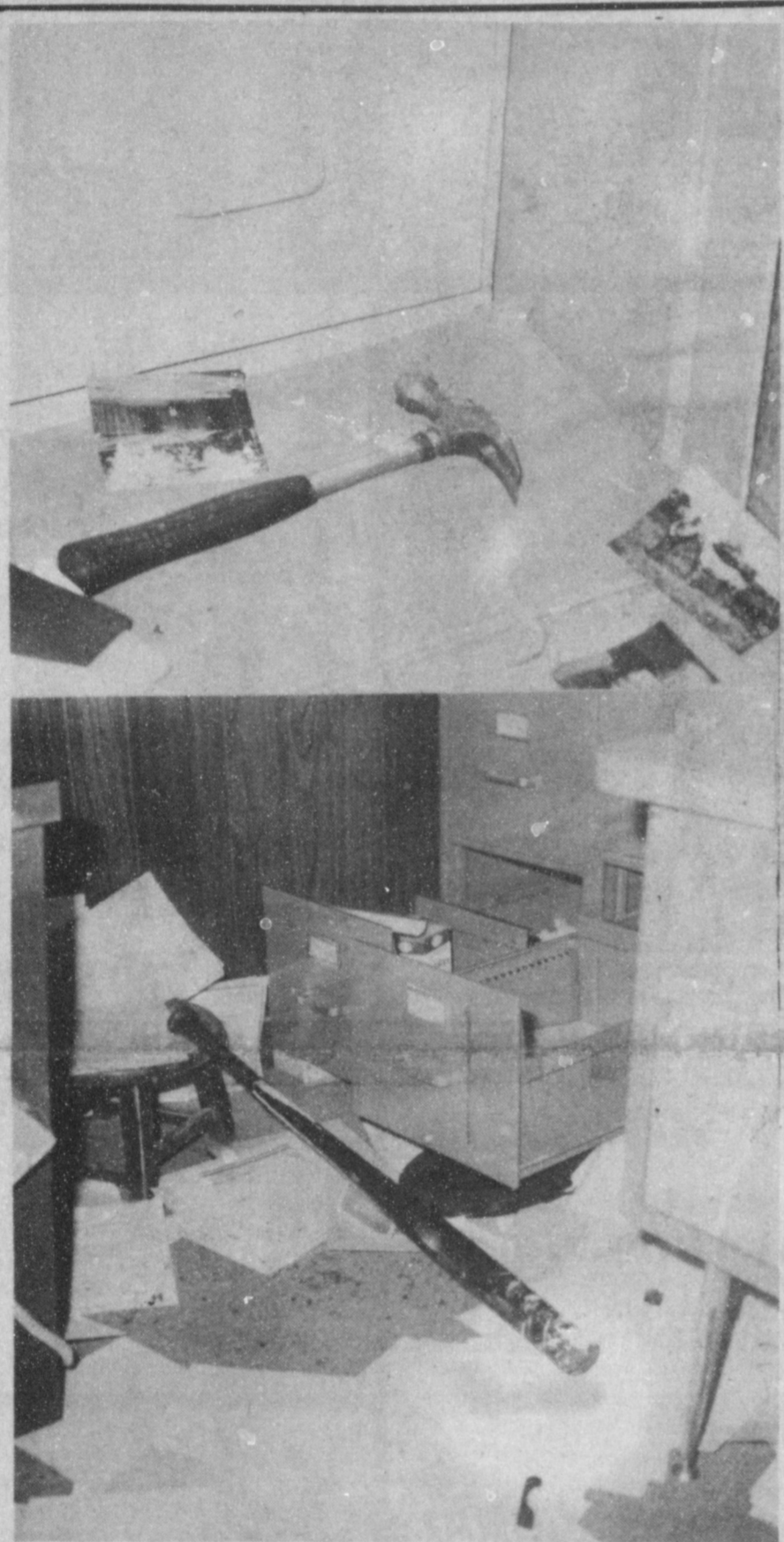
Also on the democratic ballot, Mel Phillips defeated H. Bryan Poff, Jr. for State Senator, District 31 in a 255-138 race.

A total of 428 Democrats went to the polls in Muleshoe Tuesday. The largest vote was in Voting Box One, at the Bailey County Courthouse, where 254 voted. Smallest vote was at Three Way, Voting Box Three, where 10 voters cast their ballots.

Forty-nine Republicans cast their vote for the three races on their ballot.

For U.S. Senator, it was 45-4 for Beau Boulter over Wes Gilbreath.

Ed Emmett edged out P. S. (Sam) Ervin, 26-20 for Railroad Commissioner; and for Justice, Supreme Court, Place Two, Nathan Hecht downed Ronald S. Block, 29-15.

Heritage Foundation 'Thanks' Volunteers

Muleshoe Heritage Foundation was organized in the spring of 1983 when the Bailey County Commissioners Court appointed nine members to serve on the board.

These nine people represented a cross-section of the county and included Ruth Hall, Roy Whitt, Tom Watson, Glen Williams, Jenne McVicker, John Gulley, Jean Allison, Magann Rennels and Mike Perez.

Bailey County Commissioners then donated land east of the Bailey County Civic Center for the proposed Muleshoe Heritage Center and the future site of the old Santa Fe Depot. The depot was given to this non-profit organization by the Santa Fe Railroad and it was successfully moved in March, 1985, due in part, to a \$5,000 donation given by the Muleshoe Lions Club.

The Janes house was donated

by Jim Kassahn and it was moved to the Heritage Center in the Spring of '86. A big community wide fund drive kicked off in November 1985 and nearly \$12,000 was raised.

Jenne McVicker, publicity chairman for the Muleshoe Heritage Foundation, said Monday, "the citizens of the Muleshoe area have been very supportive and most generous with their contributions and interest shown in the development of the Heritage Center and the restoration of the Santa Fe Depot, and now the Janes house.

"The Third Big Celebrity TV Action will be staged Saturday, April 30, in the arena of the Bailey County Civic Center to raise money to continue with the plans to make a Heritage Center that will be a tourist attraction and an asset to

Organizational Cemetery Meet Slated Tonight

Tonight, Thursday, a very important meeting will be held in Muleshoe.

Persons who have an interest in Bailey County Memorial Park, owning lots, or having family members buried there, are encouraged to attend a meeting.

The meeting, scheduled for 7 p.m. in the community room of Muleshoe State Bank will be conducted by David R. Langston.

Langston, from Lubbock, is trustee of the bankrupt cemetery.

It will be an attempt to form a non-profit corporation to manage and control Bailey County Memorial Park.

State School Candidate Visits Rotary

Paul Wilbanks was in charge of the program for the Muleshoe Rotary Club Tuesday at noon. He introduced Monte Hasie, a Lubbock stockbroker, who is a candidate for the state school board.

Hasie, who spent 12 years as a member of the Lubbock School Board, including serving as its president, spoke on HB72, and its impact, both good and bad on education in Texas.

"Education is the biggest job in any community," said Hasie, "and the local school board election is very important."

He said HB72 came out of an appointed board, who was looking for 'quality' education.

However, many of the programs mandated by HB72 called for more funding, and although the board and the legislature approved the measures, did not provide any funding, leaving the additional funding up to the local school boards.

HB72 took control of the schools out of local hands, said Hasie. He said the ratio of 22-1 students and teachers was a very good concept, but still, the additional teachers were to be funded at local expense.

According to Hasie, anytime the state mandates new programs, they need to provide the funding for them. "Out of HB72, we got a lot of good programs, but they gave them to us too fast," he said, "and the fact is, we cannot afford them. Tax increases are inevitable if we don't receive help with funding them on the state level."

He also expressed concern about the role of vocational education, citing that most high school graduates will be going

Local Duo In Custody; Damages Exceed \$10,000

It was a scene of devastation Monday morning at Muleshoe High School -- much like a war zone where a bomb had landed a direct 'hit.' And, it wasn't a war at all, unless you count total and complete destruction of the inside of a school as war.

Weeping teachers surveyed the smashed trophy cases in the main hallways. They did not only smash the trophy cases, but removed the trophies and smashed them with baseball bats.

Also in the main hallway, huge pictures of graduating seniors had been smashed on the floor. Display cases from the walls were broken with twisted metal and broken glass.

Strangely enough, a large aquarium in the main hallway was untouched.

The intruders broke into the school office, and demolished it; moving into the principal's office where they overturned furniture, broke into cabinets and attempted to break into the safe.

On to the assistant principal's office where additional damage was done.

Most of the classrooms have round windows, almost without exception, these windows were smashed, a number of school rooms were entered and destroyed.

Blood was dripped all over the floors, slung on the walls

and covered books and papers. Every locker in the school was opened and everything was removed from the lockers, and strewn on the floors.

The school library was entered and bookcases that had been bolted to the walls were torn loose and overturned.

The school science department was entered, and rockets being constructed by the freshmen students were destroyed or removed.

By mid-morning following the discovery of the damaged school, one person, Roger Pena, a MHS student, was in custody.

Late Monday evening, a second suspect, Andy Olivarez, was also in custody.

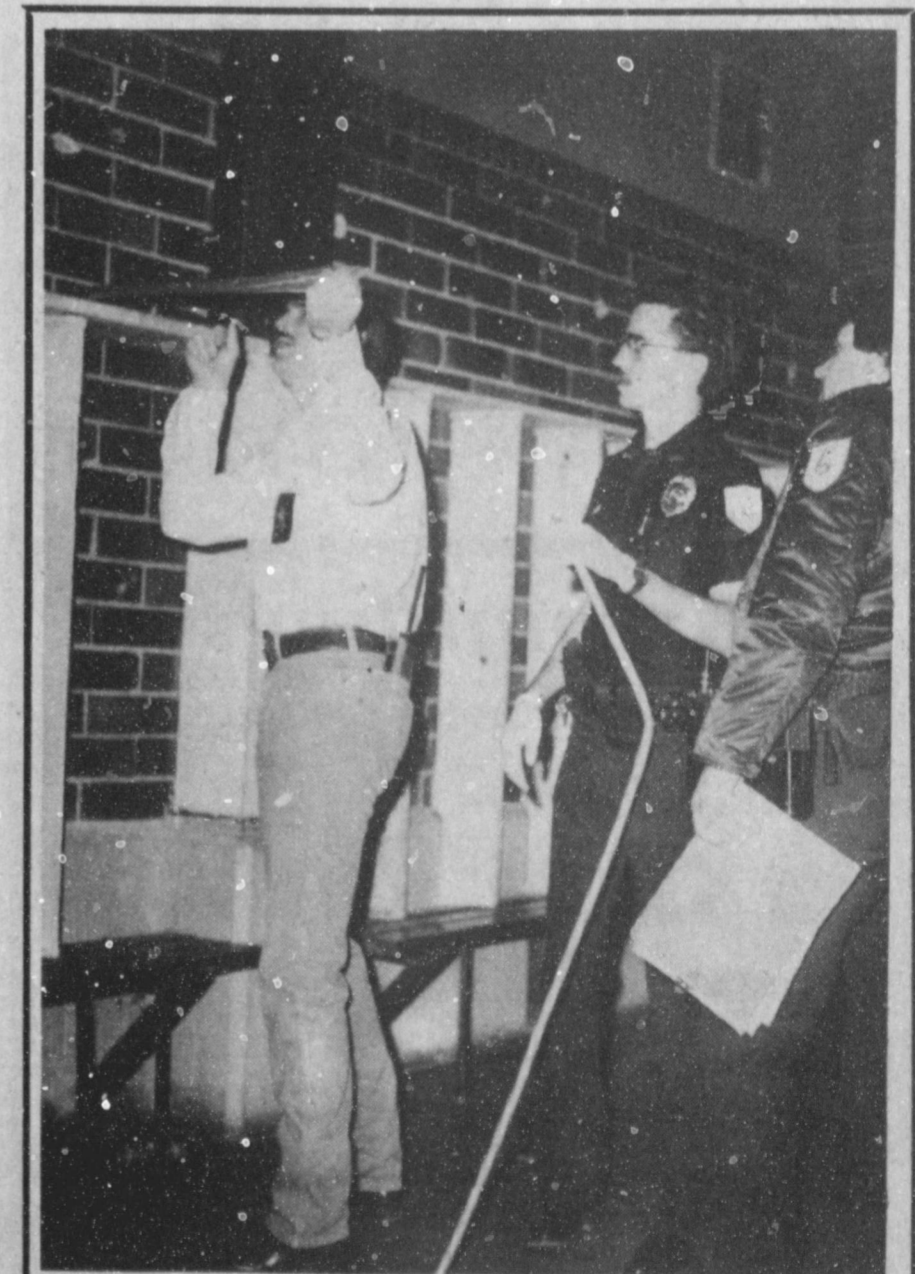
Both suspects had cuts ranging from minor to severe, and both received treatment for their cuts.

Arraigned on charges of 'Burglary of a Building,' before Bailey County Justice of the Peace Jack Bates, the JP set bond at \$5,000 each for the duo.

At presstime, they were still in the Bailey County jail, as officers continued the investigation into the weekend of school damage.

Officers also said items reported stolen from the school had been recovered.

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

GED Tests To Be Given This Week

The General Educational Development (GED) test will be given in Muleshoe on Friday, April 15, and Saturday, April 16, at Muleshoe High School. Individuals interested in testing for a certificate of high school equivalency will need to be present at both testing sessions, according to Linda Marr, GED Test Administrator.

The following requirements apply to interested persons:

1. Minimum age is 18, but a 17-year-old is eligible with parental or guardian consent.
2. Must be a resident of Texas.
3. Must be officially withdrawn from school and must not have received a high school diploma from an accredited high school in the United States.

Testing will begin at 5:30 p.m. on Friday, and continue at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday. Further information may be obtained by calling Linda Marr at Muleshoe High School, 272-3080.

A crew of nine men employed by the Santa Fe System and operating under direction of State Highway Department arrived here last Friday to install a signal system at the railroad just west of the local depot.

This is one safety flash system among many others being installed at railroad crossings in this section, two having been located at Littlefield early last week.

The system operates electrically from 110 volt line, with storage battery for reserve in case of disturbance of the high line. There are eight lights and a bell, two of the lights flashing in either direction, while four of them spell out the word 'Stop.' The mechanism begins operating when the train is within 2,100 feet of the crossing - giving most vehicles ample time for self-protection.

It will take about three weeks to completely install the system.

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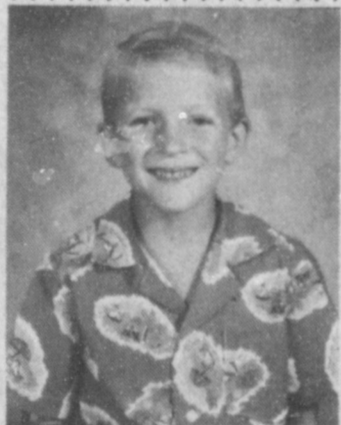

Athletic Director Dale Keeling found his office smashed up, and much of the office destroyed. The gym was broken into and the gym office destroyed. Although the intruders broke into the weight room, the equipment was not damaged.

Officers had the blood analyzed and found the large amount of blood strewn along walls and on floors, books and papers, was human blood. They also found where the school's medical equipment was ransacked, with evidence of attempts to perhaps treat a cut, or other wound.

As students arrived at the school, they were directed into the auditorium, which also received some damage. There, the students were instructed to go to their locker area, from 10-12 students at a time, and attempt to find their belongings and return to the lockers.

In the meantime, janitors, principal Wayland Ethridge, Assistant Principal Jerry Johnson, teachers and coaches started removing the debris, and clearing glass from the hallways.

City Police Officers, including Chief Wayne Holmes; Detective Julian Dominguez; Officers Don Carter and Gary Maddox; Deputies Steve Bearden and Jerry Hicks; and DPS Lyndon Huckaby were all throughout the school, checking for fingerprints and any other evidence to help identify the intruders.

It was known that the school was all right at around 9:30 p.m. on Sunday night, and the damage was found by janitors opening the school just after 7 a.m. on Monday.

Assistant Superintendent Tom Jinks said as soon as the students could take care of their lockers, school would be dismissed for the day, to allow an intensive clean-up and assessment of damages, which were expected to run into the thousands of dollars.

School officials praised the Muleshoe High School students who were sent into the HS auditorium, then sent in small groups to their locker areas to try to find their own belongings and replace them in the lockers.

Many, many of the high school students were visibly upset by what they saw, and

helped clean up the debris, so classes could be held instead of turning out school for the day.

By Monday afternoon, much of the debris had been cleared away -- and it was school as usual.

H. John Fuller, superintendent also praised the students for their calm, quiet approach to helping clear up the school. He said the students, although exhibiting their shock at the vandalism, quickly stepped in and helped clear things away.

He said that although the burglar/vandals did not get into the computer lab, some 10 computers were destroyed or damaged; along with typewriters; other office equipment and school records.

He said the damage figures would not be known for awhile, but would be well above \$10,000. According to the school superintendent, the school insurance has a \$5,000 deductible, and that amount will have to be paid by the school, with the insurance picking up the balance.

Although this was the worst damage ever done to the school, the last severe damage was in 1981, but nothing to compare to this time.

At presstime, officers were continuing to investigate the weekend events, and did not rule out possible additional arrests.

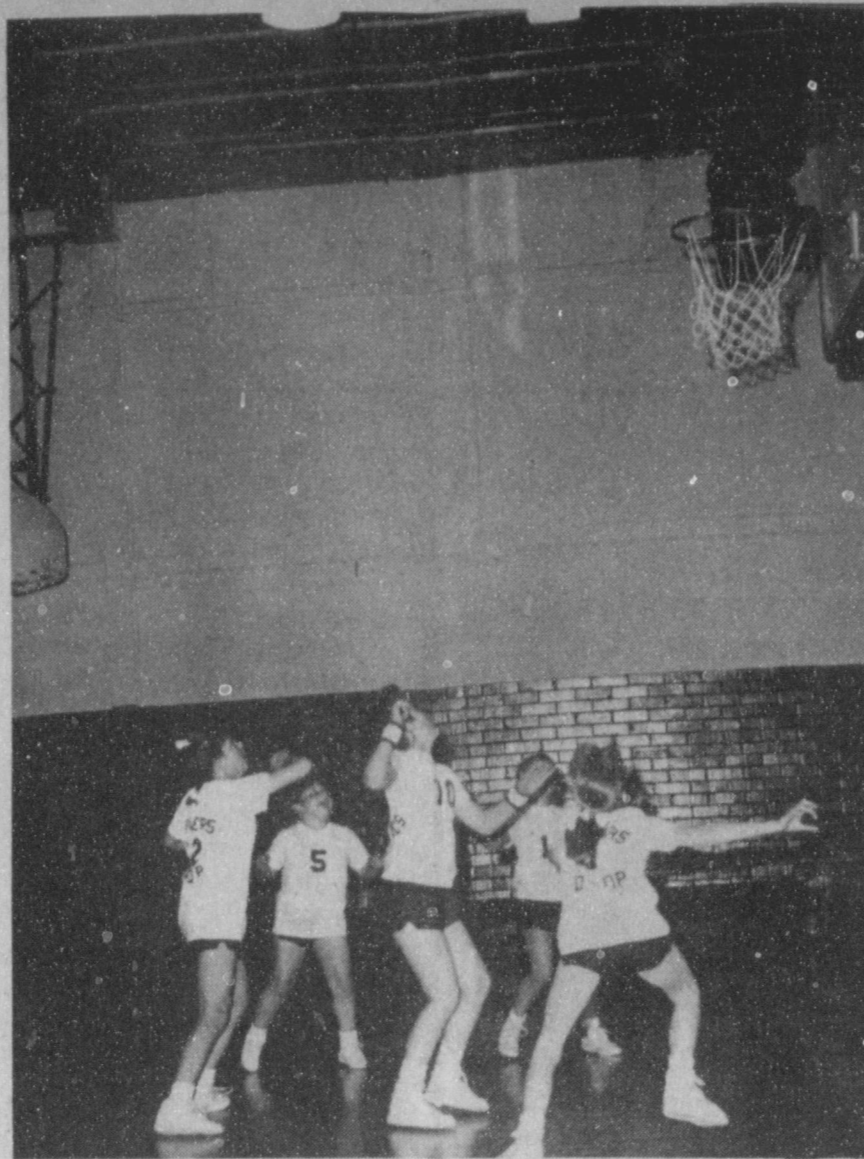
