## MHS Vandalism Investigation Continuing, Say City Officers

"We have an investigation still in full swing," echoed Muleshoe City Police Chief

Wayne Holmes and Detective Julian Dominguez. They gave that response to a question as to the status of the investigation into vandalism and burglary at Muleshoe High School on Sunday night and early Monday morning, April 10-11.

Additional charges were filed last week against Roger Pena, 19 and Andy Olivarez, 19, in connection with the incident.

Charges of 'Burglary with intent to Commit Criminal Mischief' was filed, in addition to the charges of 'Burglary of a Building,' the initial charge.

Bond was set at \$5,000 each on the first charge filed and \$10,000 each on the second charge filed against the duo.

They still maintain they acted alone in entering the school, using a baseball bat and hammer to inflict heavy damage throughout the school, and take several items when they left.

This week, they will be taken to Lubbock to a law enforcement polygraph operator to be sure their statements are correct, and they are the only ones involved, according to the chief and sergeant.

In the meantime, several young people have been questioned in connection with the case, that left in excess of \$10,000 in damages at the school.

"At this time, the evidence leads to just two people," said Chief Holmes. "Each has implicated only himself and the other."

"We have questioned other people," continued Chief Holmes, "and the people we have picked up for questioning are not necessarily suspects in the case. Their name may have

MISD also offers a gifted/talented program; a summer school program; continuing education; adult education and special education.

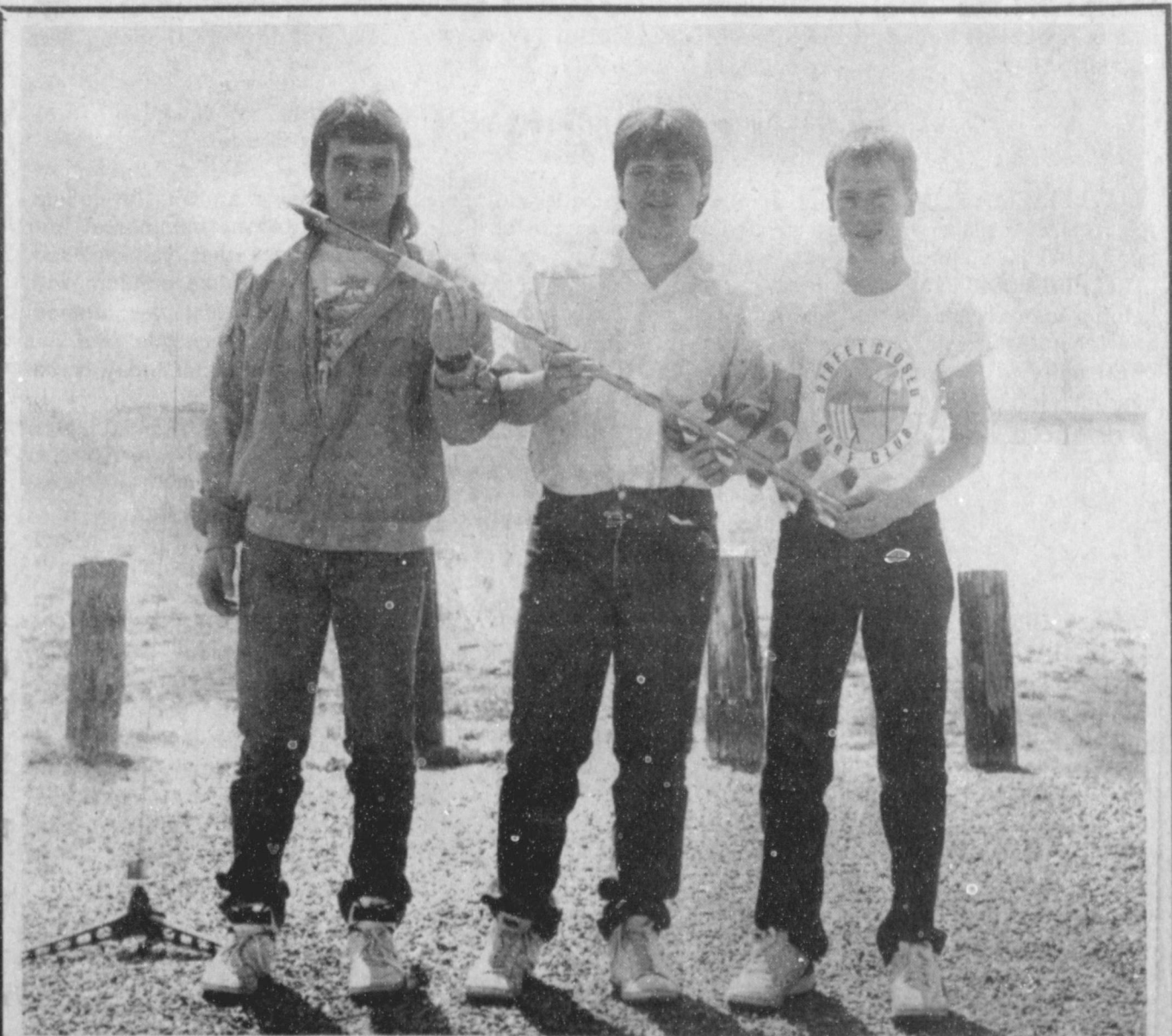
MISD encompasses a total of 485 square miles, 6,000 people and 1,700 school age children.

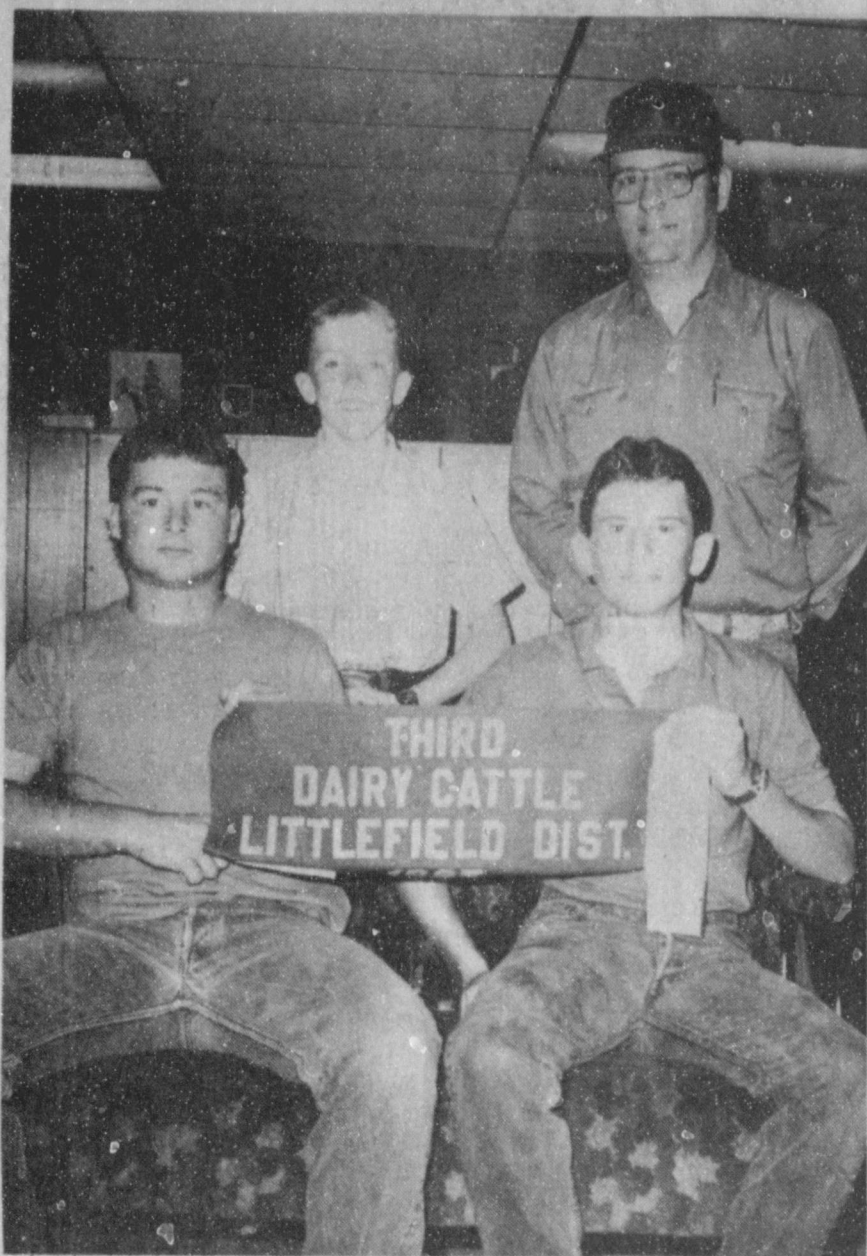

Muleshoe ISD teachers, Alice Liles, Vowery Dodd, and Patricia Angeley, represented the local school district in attending the Conference on Thinking held at the Stouffer Hotel in Austin on April 13. The conference was co-sponsored by the Texas Education Agency, Division of Exemplary Programs and The Texas Association for Supervision and Curriculum De-

velopment. The objective of the conference was to encourage teachers to involve students of varied intellectual abilities with the higher order thinking skills in a variety of subject areas. This objective was met through 21 content area and general sessions. Teachers attended these sessions, which were of interest to them.

"Approximately 80-90 percent of school work involves lower level thinking processes: recall, memorizing details and facts, and restating. This is basic comprehension that does not require a student to use or develop the more complex thinking skills of analysis, synthesis, and evaluation," said Alice Liles, junior high teacher, who attended the conference.

She added, "These higher level thinking skills are necessary for students to be successful at reasoning and problem solving, which are essential skills in today's society."

"It is currently common practice for these skills to be taught only to the gifted student population. Educators are becoming increasingly aware of the need for these skills to be offered to all students. Research and application have proven that students of all ability levels are capable of mastering higher level thinking skills, simply at a different pace and level of achievement of the gifted student."

Liles concluded, "This conference provided teachers with information to help students become this type of skillful thinker who can then think, reason, analyze and evaluate."

## Temperature 'Vital' To Get Cotton Start

Spring rains and temperature variations make it critical that cotton farmers pay close attention to the five-day weather forecast, says a cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Proper moisture, aeration and temperature conditions are essential for good germination and emergence of cotton, said Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton specialist.

"If fields are too dry at planting, it hinders germination and seeding development; if they are too wet, it restricts the oxygen needed for germinating seed, Supak noted. And cottonseed are highly vulnerable to chilling injury for approximately five days after planting, he stressed.

"Ideally, soil moisture levels at planting are at or near field capacity," Supak noted. "This not only assures adequate moisture for seed hydration, but also sufficient oxygen to support the germination."

Inadequate moisture slows the germination and seedling development and may even be fatal to stands if fields 'dry out' too rapidly, the Extension agronomist said. "Waterlogged conditions, on the other hand, restrict free air movement to germinating seed and the lack of oxygen and may also cause stand failure," he continued.

The ideal temperatures for cotton germination are around 75 to 80 degrees Fahrenheit. Because of the short growing season on the Texas High Plains, Supak said, most cotton is planted into much cooler soil.

"The earliest recommended date for planting occurs when the 10-day average of the minimum soil temperature at the eight-inch depth reaches 60 degrees Fahrenheit," Supak said. Cottonseed requires about 100 hours with temperature above 64 degrees at seed level for germination and initial emergence.

For about five days after planting, cottonseed are highly

vulnerable to chilling injury, the Extension specialist emphasized. This vulnerable period usually has two phases: The hydration phase, which may last up to 48 hours after planting, and the enzyme activation period, which can occur from 48 to about 120 hours after planting.

"During the hydration phase, seed zone temperatures of 40 degrees or less for as few as four hours can be fatal, and exposure for two hours can damage developing tap roots," Supak said. Other symptoms of chilling injury include delayed emergence and low seedling vigor.

Temperatures below 50 degrees Fahrenheit during the enzyme activation phase contribute to the leakage of sugars, amino acids and electrolytes through delicate membranes, the agronomist said.

He added, "The result is a weakened seedling that is more susceptible to diseases and environmental stresses. Chilling injury during this phase results in more abnormal plants, delayed crop maturity and reduced yields."

Seed zone temperatures of 50 degrees Fahrenheit or less, aren't uncommon in late April and early May, Supak warned.

"Delaying planting until the 10-day average minimum temperature at eight inches reaches 60 degrees Fahrenheit provides some assurance that temperatures in the seed zone won't drop to these critical levels," he continued.

To minimize chilling injury, the agronomist urged producers to also consider extended weather forecasts when selecting a planting date.

"Keep in mind that the five days after planting are critical. Plantings just ahead of a wet cold front are likely to encounter periods when soil temperatures in the seed zone fall below the critical 50-degree level," he concluded.

**TWO DAY COLD SNAP SWEEPS W. TEXAS AREA**  
A spring blizzard, the worst known in 25 years, gripped the entire Panhandle of West Texas for three days and nights, beginning with Wednesday of last week. Snow piled in drifts 20 feet high in the northern part, endangering human lives as traffic was paralyzed, school trucks and automobiles stalled in the deep snow between points, cattle, shorn sheep and young lambs were killed and fruit crops damaged beyond estimation at this time.  
While there was no snow fall in Bailey County, the thermometer dropped to a 22 degree low, wind attained a velocity of more than 70 miles per hour, the atmosphere for two days was thick with sand and swirling dirt, what fruit was left undamaged from a recently previous cold snap, is thought to have been killed, while much of the wheat "in boot" or joint stage is reported seriously damaged, the extent of which will not be known for some days yet. Practically all early garden plants, except those in hot beds,

were killed. Ice an inch or more thick was common on watering troughs, and some trees with early rising sap are thought to have been seriously damaged.

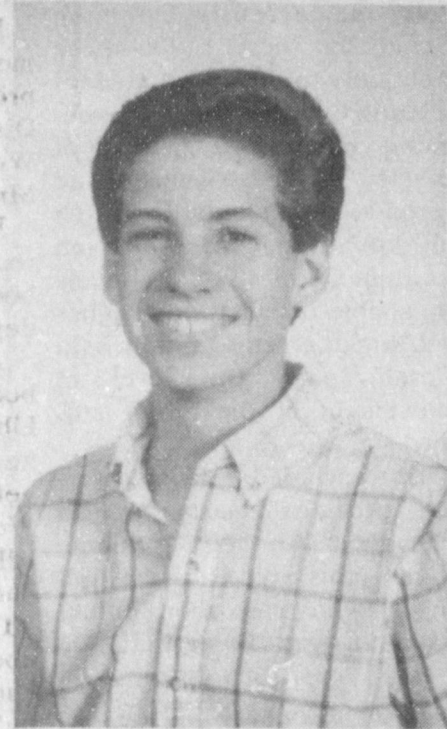

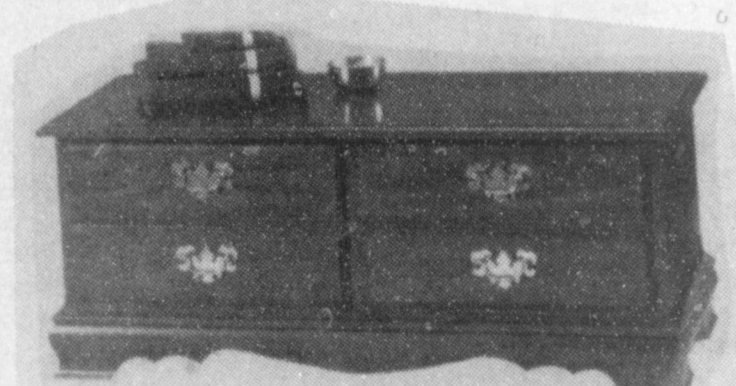

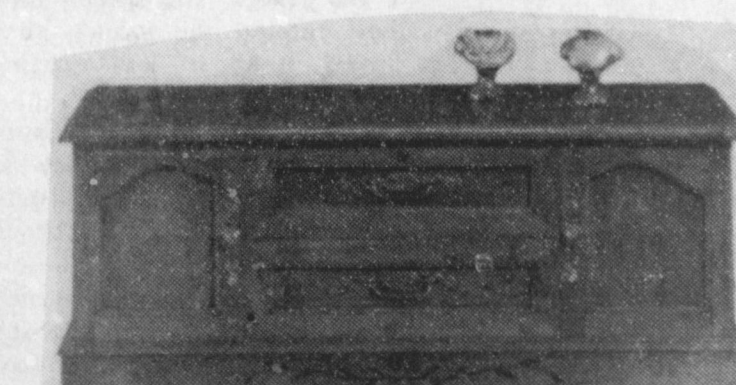

The principal also said "Child abuse should be reported by any citizen who suspects a child is being abused."

Reports of abuse are made to the police department, The Department of Human Services, or to any member of the Bailey County Child Welfare Board.

demeanor, punishable by imprisonment of up to 180 days and a fine of up to \$1,000.

According to Jim Maddox, Attorney General, such suspected cases of child abuse must be reported to a local or state law enforcement agency and to: The nearest Child Protective Service Office of the Texas Department of Human Resources, or The 24 hour Child Abuse Hotline -- 1-800-252-5400.

He also said, "The Texas Department of Human Resources is required by the Family Code to investigate every report of abuse or neglect received. The code requires an interview with the 'subject child at any reasonable time and place, which may be during school hours."

"Teachers who see evidence of abuse or neglect and report it in the good faith belief that such conditions exist and do so for the best interests of the child or children are immune from liability, and their reports will be confidential."

He also said, "Each year across the nation, over 1.6 million children suffer the physical and psychological terror of child abuse. In Texas, the number of child abuse cases is increasing by 12 percent a year. The effects of this quiet terror will be felt by both the victims and society for decades."

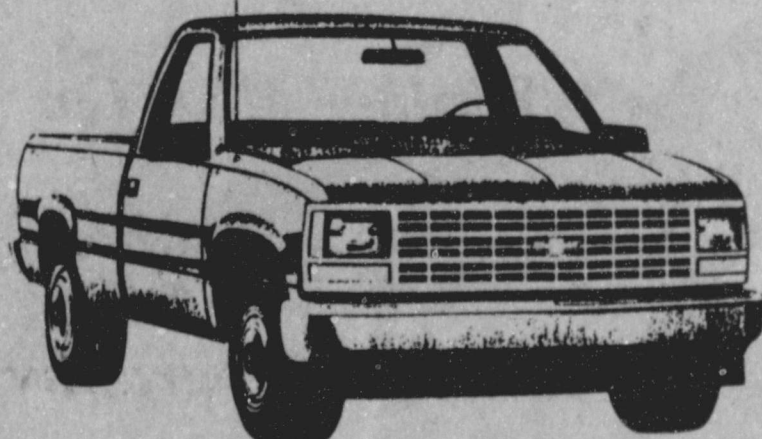
