

But they would at least realize that all typewritten copy for any publication should be double spaced and on one side of the paper only, that whatever is submitted should be signed, that no one should presume to write headlines, but that ample space for them should be left, and that no editor needs be told, "Of course you may change it, if it doesn't sound just right." The editor will exercise his prerogative without being told. He's a poor one if he doesn't!

On the other hand, it is not to be expected that the layman knows Good music and good sermon. all the accepted journalistic forms or the particular style of a certain publication. Any editor will tell you that form and style constantly each Sunday evening at 7 o'clock. are changing and few, if any, can keep up with every change. In fact, few agree on all points.

But we believe that all editors will agree that it is about time some member of the profession takes the chance which we have just taken in order to get the point across that we receive an ungodly lot of poor copy from those who should know better.
