Following a brief discussion Tuesday morning, members of the Muleshoe City Council accepted a bid from Case Power and Equipment of Lubbock for a

new Loader/Backhoe for the city. Four bids were opened last Friday afternoon, with the bids being tabulated and checked to make sure they meet specifications prior to the Tuesday council meeting.

Case Power and Equipment submitted the lowest bid, plus met all specifications, including 4WD and an extendahoe. Their bid was in the amount of \$27,440.

Yellowhouse Equipment submitted two bids, one in the amount of \$32,285, and the second bid in the amount of \$30,100.

West Texas Equipment hadsubmitted a bid in the amount of \$41,942 for the new backhoe.

In other action, the council approved transferring \$5460.08 to bad debts. City Manager Dave Marr said this amount represented more than a year's worth of delinquent accounts.

Marr told the council that Bailey County had helped improve the parking lot at Roger Miller Park.

Several loads of 'ash' were moved in and spread out to help control ruts and mud spots during rainy weather.

Improvements are being done at the city swimming pool at this time, including renovation of the

He used personal experiences to show the importance of Responsibility; How To Listen; Punctuality; How To Compete; Leadership; Togetherness and



OSTEOPOROSIS PREVENTION BEGINS WITH DIET --- Women, especially those over 40, are most likely to have osteoporosis, a crippling bone disease. So it's only fitting that Osteoporosis Prevention Week begins on Mother's Day, May 8. "Preventing osteoporosis beings, but doesn't end with a good diet," says Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten, a nutritionist with Texas A&M. University's Agricultural Extension Service. "Exercise, genetics, and estrogen have also been shown to affect the occurance of this disease." For the past several years, prevention efforts have focused on getting people to consume enough calcium-rich foods beginning in childhood, to slow down the rate at which bones lose calcium as a natural part of aging, she says. "Research studies show that most adult women are consuming less than two servings, and teenagers are getting less than the four servings of dairy products they need each day," adds Sweeten.

Dr. Warren Angell, noted Southern Baptist musician, will be the featured guest of the First Baptist Church May 21-22. Dr. Angell became the Dean of Music and Fine Arts at Oklahoma Baptist University in 1936, and held this position until his retirement in 1973. He founded the 'Bison Glee Club' which first sang in 1938 for commencement at OBU, and toured the nation with them until his retirement.

STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH CALLS ATTENTION TO REGISTRATION LAW

This county has now been organized in accordance with the new Vital Statistics Law, by the appointment of registrars for each justice precinct and each incorporated town or city. In some cases two or more precincts have been combined into one district, where it seemed best so

Every birth is required by law to be reported to the local registrar of the district in which it occurs, by the attending physician or mid wife, or if there was neither, than by the father or mother, within five days after the

The law prohibits the burial or removal of a dead body before a death certificate properly and completely filled out, has been filed with the local registrar, and a burial or removal permit has been secured.

The immense legal value of these records makes it important that the citizens of Texas be given this protection by having a complete legal record properly filed in accordance with the law.

In the first three months of 1928, there were reported from Bailey County 18 births and 0 deaths. This indicates only about 53 percent of the total number which probably occured. Lets go 100 percent from now on.

Crop Planting Deadline Approaching Very Fast

May is a very busy month as producers are kept 'hopping' making sure they are complying with rules and regulations as set forth by the government. Bailey County ASCS Executive Director, Danny Noble, calls attention to a number of dates to remember.

FINAL CERTIFICATION DATE The final date to certify or request aerial measurement service for wheat, rye, barley, oats, and triticale, regardless of use, non-program or program, is May

This is also the final date to certify to zero acreage planted if the farm has a base for that

Remember, if you miss your acreage report by the larger of five percent or 1.0 acre, up or down, it can cause the farm to be ineligible for program benefits. The tolerance applies to irrigated and dryland as separate toler-

MEASURING SERVICE

Remember!! As soon as the ASC office gets your farm measured, you will be notified of the measured acreage and you have only five workdays in which to adjust (if any) and certify your acres in the ASC office. Please notify the ASC if you have to adjust prior to plowing anything

HAYING AND GRAZING

ACR and CU land can be haved and or grazed during the sevenmonth period only, beginning October 15 and continuing through May 14.

Exception: You may hav or graze CU all year if it is for

Remember: No having or grazing past May 14, 1988 through October 15, 1988 on ACR and CU program acres.

SMALL GRAINS LEFT STANDING

If you have wheat or other small grains on ACR or CU that substantially destroyed prior to May 15, you must have filed a standing and pay a \$10 fee prior

to May 15 to stay in compliance. DOUBLE CROPPING

BEHIND FAILED ACRES If your wheat, barley, or oats has failed after May 15, 1988, the second crop will be considered as planted to that crop for program benefits. If your wheat, barley or oats failed prior to May 15, 1988, it will depend on when you plant the second crop, such as:

If planted prior to June 15, 1988, the second crop will be considered invisible; if planted after June 15, 1988, the second crop will be considered as planted to that crop for program

The definition of failed means, you have given up on the crop and it has failed due to a natural disaster and an ASCS-574 : Disaster Application) is actually filed in the ASCS office.

The bottom line is: if you intend to plant a program crop behind failed wheat, barley, or oats, and do not want the second crop to count for any purpose, the ASCS-574 must be filed in the ASCS office by no later than May 15, 1988.

1987 CROP LOAN DEADLINE

May 31, 1988 is the final date for placing 1987 crop soybeans, cotton, corn, and grain sorghum in the government loan program.

FINAL PLANTING DATES The final planting dates for crops grown in Bailey County are: Barley - Nov. 15; Wheat Nov. 15; Oats - Nov. 15; Corn, -May 15; Cotton - May 31; and Grain Sorghum - June 30.

These dates are for crop insurance purposes primarily, but in the case of prevented planting, the dates are recognized as the final date for

Should you be prevented from planting any of the crops listed above, beyond your control, you have 15 days following the final planting date to file a prevented planting claim on an ASCS-574. Claims filed after 15 days will be insidered late filed

INTEREST RATE The loan interest rate for May

MAINTENANCE OF ACR Don't forget that ACR requires

a cover crop. ACR land must be free of weeds and maintained in a workmanlike manner throughout the calendar year. Don't jeopardize your program benefits by neglecting to properly farm this acreage.

PREVENTED PLANTING DISASTER PAYMENTS

Producers of 1984 or 1985 crops of wheat, feed grains. (corn, sorghum, barley and oats), cotton, and rice who participated in Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) Price Support and Production Adjustment Programs may be eligible to apply for prevented planted disaster payments.

Such producers must file an application and supporting documentation with CCC by June 30. Applications may be obtained at the county extension office.

Payments will be made to those eligible producers who were prevented from planting wheat, feed grains, cotton, and rice or other nonconserving crops on any portion of the acreage intended for wheat, feed grains, cotton, or rice because of drought, flood or other natural disaster or other conditions beyond the control of the pro-




