Shane Wheeler gave the welcome and Michael Dunham introduced guests at the banquet before Shane Burris presented chapter awards.

Gary Freeman was presented the Green Hand Award; Jeffrey Noble was given the Star Chapter Award; Shawn Rejino was recognized as State State Farmer and Shawn Wheeler was given the Kenny Henderson Award. Outstanding Little Hustler was Colby Baldwin.

Jeffrey and Danny Noble presented scholarships in the amount of \$250 each to Kevin Atwood and Robin Moore.

Speaker for the evening was Aaron Alejandro, an Agriculture Ambassador from Texas Tech Ag Department in Lubbock. He was the 1985-86 FFA State President. Alejandro told the group that

Following a meal of barbecue brisket and sausage, with all the trimmings, Ben Brumfield gave the invocation. Hoppy Jennings welcomed special guests and introduced the speaker, Linden Weese, a women's basketball coach from Texas Tech University.

Coach Weese grew up in Higgins, a town so small they didn't even play football -- so he opted for basketball.

Much of his talk centered around things he personally experienced, and in a different and humorous way, turned his own experiences into 'learning experiences.'

He said he thought it was great when a community takes the time to honor their athletes, commenting, "Support of the kids is important. That way, they can all come together and think about things accomplished during the year."

He also said it is not good to change coaches every year, and it is not good for coaches, or for the schools to change coaches often.

He used personal experiences to show the importance of Responsibility; How To Listen; Punctuality; How To Compete; Leadership; Togetherness and Pride.

"Have pride in yourself, and in your school," stressed Coach Weese. "I am very proud of Texas Tech," he added. "I think it is a great school, and the woman I work for is a wonderful person."

In closing, the coach added, "Have pride in yourselves. You have a lot of good qualities, so put them to work -- with pride."

Football Coach C. W. Williams showed a special plaque made up to honor the 1987-88 Lazbuddie Longhorn football team. The team had a 10-0 record for the year, with several state recognitions given.

Lazbuddie was not eligible for state playoffs, as they had gone from 11 man to 6-man football, so had to play an 'outlaw' schedule for one year. In 1988-89, they will be playing a regular six-man schedule.

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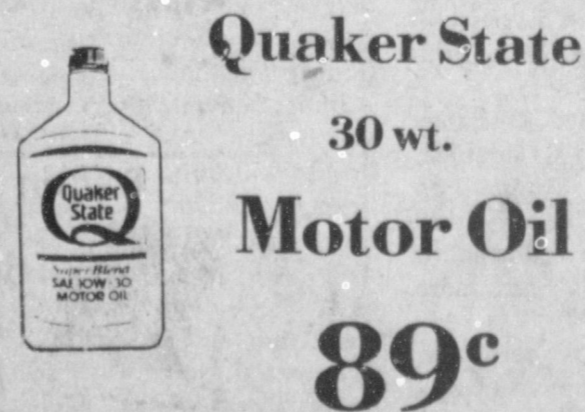

#### STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH CALLS ATTENTION TO REGISTRATION LAW

This county has now been organized in accordance with the new Vital Statistics Law, by the appointment of registrars for each justice precinct and each incorporated town or city. In some cases two or more precincts have been combined into one district, where it seemed best so to do.

Every birth is required by law to be reported to the local registrar of the district in which it occurs, by the attending physician or mid wife, or if there was neither, than by the father or mother, within five days after the birth.

The law prohibits the burial or removal of a dead body before a death certificate properly and completely filled out, has been filed with the local registrar, and a burial or removal permit has been secured.

The immense legal value of these records makes it important that the citizens of Texas be given this protection by having a complete legal record properly filed in accordance with the law.

In the first three months of 1928, there were reported from Bailey County 18 births and 0 deaths. This indicates only about 53 percent of the total number which probably occurred. Lets go 100 percent from now on.

when he spoke in Muleshoe in 1984, it was the first time he had talked to a group, adding, "When I was asked to speak in Muleshoe again this year, it was like a Holstein cow walking in johnsongrass -- utterly tickled."

The speaker said there is more to FFA than meets the eye. One out of every six ag students at Tech are attending on Tech scholarships.

"If you want an education and are willing to work for it, in FFA the money is out there waiting in scholarships and grants," he said.

Alejandro said that since he started attending Tech, his mother has given him a total of only \$25. He said he barely survived his first year at Tech, everything was so different then, and there were girls, girls, girls.

# Crop Planting Deadline Approaching Very Fast

May is a very busy month as producers are kept 'hopping' making sure they are complying with rules and regulations as set forth by the government. Bailey County ASCS Executive Director, Danny Noble, calls attention to a number of dates to remember.

**FINAL CERTIFICATION DATE**  
The final date to certify or request aerial measurement service for wheat, rye, barley, oats, and triticale, regardless of use, non-program or program, is May 16.

This is also the final date to certify to zero acreage planted if the farm has a base for that commodity.

Remember, if you miss your acreage report by the larger of five percent or 1.0 acre, up or down, it can cause the farm to be ineligible for program benefits. The tolerance applies to irrigated and dryland as separate tolerances.

**MEASURING SERVICE**  
Remember!! As soon as the ASC office gets your farm measured, you will be notified of the measured acreage and you have only five workdays in which to adjust (if any) and certify your acres in the ASC office. Please notify the ASC if you have to adjust prior to plowing anything up.

**HAYING AND GRAZING**  
ACR and CU land can be hayed and/or grazed during the seven-month period only, beginning October 15 and continuing through May 14.

Exception: You may hay or graze CU all year if it is for history purposes only and no payment is made on those acreages.

Remember: No haying or grazing past May 14, 1988 through October 15, 1988 on ACR and CU program acres.

**SMALL GRAINS**  
**LEFT STANDING**

If you have wheat or other small grains on ACR or CU that will be left standing and not substantially destroyed prior to May 15, you must have filed a request to leave the small grains standing and pay a \$10 fee prior

to May 15 to stay in compliance.

**DOUBLE CROPPING BEHIND FAILED ACRES**  
If your wheat, barley, or oats has failed after May 15, 1988, the second crop will be considered as planted to that crop for program benefits. If your wheat, barley or oats failed prior to May 15, 1988, it will depend on when you plant the second crop, such as:

If planted prior to June 15, 1988, the second crop will be considered invisible; if planted after June 15, 1988, the second crop will be considered as planted to that crop for program benefits.

The definition of failed means, you have given up on the crop and it has failed due to a natural disaster and an ASCS-574 (Disaster Application) is actually filed in the ASCS office.

The bottom line is: if you intend to plant a program crop behind failed wheat, barley, or oats, and do not want the second crop to count for any purpose, the ASCS-574 must be filed in the ASCS office by no later than May 15, 1988.

**1987 CROP LOAN DEADLINE**  
May 31, 1988 is the final date for placing 1987 crop soybeans, cotton, corn, and grain sorghum in the government loan program.

**FINAL PLANTING DATES**  
The final planting dates for crops grown in Bailey County are: Barley - Nov. 15; Wheat - Nov. 15; Oats - Nov. 15; Corn - May 15; Cotton - May 31; and Grain Sorghum - June 30.

These dates are for crop insurance purposes primarily, but in the case of prevented planting, the dates are recognized as the final date for planting the crop.

Should you be prevented from planting any of the crops listed above, beyond your control, you have 15 days following the final planting date to file a prevented planting claim on an ASCS-574. Claims filed after 15 days will be considered late filed.

**INTEREST RATE**  
The loan interest rate for May is 6.875 percent.

**MAINTENANCE OF ACR**  
Don't forget that ACR requires

a cover crop. ACR land must be free of weeds and maintained in a workmanlike manner throughout the calendar year. Don't jeopardize your program benefits by neglecting to properly farm this acreage.

## PREVENTED PLANTING DISASTER PAYMENTS

Producers of 1984 or 1985 crops of wheat, feed grains, (corn, sorghum, barley and oats), cotton, and rice who participated in Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) Price Support and Production Adjustment Programs may be eligible to apply for prevented planting disaster payments.

Such producers must file an application and supporting documentation with CCC by June 30. Applications may be obtained at the county extension office.

Payments will be made to those eligible producers who were prevented from planting wheat, feed grains, cotton, and rice or other nonconserving crops on any portion of the acreage intended for wheat, feed grains, cotton, or rice because of drought, flood or other natural disaster or other conditions beyond the control of the producer.
