ORCHIDS TO UNCLE SAM'S EMPLOYEES HERE

With no intent to curry favor-for we know that cannot be done anyway-we wish to pass an orchid or two to the personnel of the Artesia postoffice; from Postmaster Jesse L. Truett down.

We know the jam we have been in, trying to keep things running smoothly while adding hundreds of names to the mailing list of The Advocate, still getting off the press in time. So we can appreciate the jam it has put the postal employees in as we pile more and more Advocates on them each Thursday because of the 8 p. m. highly successful subscription contest we are having.

It would be stretching a point if we did not admit that the additional work has caused mistakes, both in our shop and at the postoffice, but the cooperation Uncle Sam's people have given and the willingness shown in taking on more work in a crowded workroom has helped hold mistakes to a minimum.

But it can be understood, for Truett, when he received his appointment to the postmastership, first instructed all employees they always must be courteous and give service to all alike. And that rule is maintained. When postal regulations do not permit this or that, they explain them-and they live up to them.

Sometimes such regulations may not be to our liking, but we have found that when Uncle Sam says such and such is the law, or regulation, it must be respected. So, whenever Truett or one of the postal employees points out a regulation, we are glad to cooperate, for we know that every other postal client in the United States will be subject to the same rule.

We told the postmaster to his face that we liked the way in which we always have been treated and that we intended to tell our subscribers—and they are many—about it. So we asked him a few questions. We asked him what the Post Office Department thought about 5 p. m. the way he is running the Artesia postoffice. As the department is an impersonal organization, it does not go around handing out bou. first Sunday of month, 7:30 p. m. tyranny of death. are placed in the hands of the postmasters. During the six years Truett has been postmaster, the reports show, the Artesia postoffice has had an average grade of 93 per cent, which is really something when you consider several demerits

But during his second year it was reduced o'clock Sunday evening. to \$9,000 because of the conditions of accounts and reports. That was in the face of a steady increase in postal receipts here, for they have grown from \$11,808.51 the first year, to a potential of \$30,000 for the current year.

Colorado Woman's College Group to Visit Here on Trip


Peace and good-will is the theme of a student-faculty tour of Colorado Woman's College in Denver, which will pass through Artesia Easter Sunday.

Poisoning

Death came to New Mexico in strange ways last year.

who was burned to death-his grass skirt caught fire from a flaming brand, and he proved more combustible outside than in.

And there were three inmates of the New Mexico Insane Asylum who dug up and ate some hemlock root. They died in the manner of Socrates, from one of the most ancient of poisons.

The cases were listed by Miss Kay Parker, state health department statistician, who reported that all types of accidents killed 440 persons in New Mexico last year with automobiles accounting for 195 victims.

Others who died in unusual ways

The baker who succumbed to injuries after he caught his arm in a dough roller.

One person killed by a bull and another fatally kicked by a horse. Three who didn't rally from "blows on the head" (Miss Parker put a question mark after that entry).

More pathetic than bizarre were the cases of one child who starved to death because of his family's poverty, and a baby killed by the shock of strong medicine administered by a grandmother soon after its birth.

Next to highways and streets, homes were the most dangerous places in the state last year, accounting for 107 victims, including five who died from drowning, presumably in bath tubs.

Only 93 persons died in pursuit of their occupations.


