Seventy-five Pounds of Metal Tied on by Rope -Leaves Brief Note.

R. L. (Shorty) Peppers, 55, pumper for the Rudco Oil & Gas 🔶 Company in the old Artesia oil field, committed suicide early Wednesday morning by drowning himself in a 250-barrel circulator tank, + into which he jumped with a 75- . pound tubing spider tied to his neck by a rope, according to a verdict returned at the city hall in Artesia by a coroner's jury yesterday afternoon.

The jury found Mr. Peppers Getting Ready came to his death by drowning and that the act was a suicide. Discovery of the body of Mr. For Good-Will

Peppers in the tank was made about 8 o'clock yesterday morning by a nephew, Jack Peppers, and a brother-in-law of the younger Mr. Peppers, Asa M. Irby.

The two young men, who live on an adjacent lease, noticed that Mr. Peppers' pumping power was not on and investigated, thinking he was having trouble. His clothing was on the ground and young Peppers found his uncle's body in the bottom of the tank.

It was impossible to remove the body because of the heavy metal tied to the neck and it was not until about 9:30 o'clock, after Fred Hill, deputy sheriff, arrived from the water.







But there probably will come a time, and not so many years hence, when we will be subject to invasion, unless we are so strong that no nation would dare even to think of such a rash move.

And in preparing, we must continue to think about "fifth column" activities and fight them always.

The trouble is that shortly after peace is re-established in Europe we will forget all of the things which are scaring the people of the United States today and we once again will take the attitude that all foreign peoples are good enough fellows, that they were just mislead

by crackpot leaders. But we must not ever lessen our vigilence, for as long as the world exists there will be madmen who will wish the world, just for the "glory" in having it. Such men never stop to think of the suffering and damage done to their own people as well as to other peoples. They do not care if they retard civilization a decade, or a hundred or a thousand years. The acquisition of additional wealth in resources is found necessary by them only in order that they may use it to acquire further additional wealth in resources.

As surely as anything, Europe will be bankrupt when the cannons cease. But just as surely madmen will rise again, and just as surely subversive methods will be used in this and other peace-loving countries.

What we need is a permanent and adequate "sixth column" in America.

New Mexico should not be allowed to "turn neighbor against neighbor because of personal ill feeling." Commenting on his recent move to place the public on the alert against subversive agents in the state, the governor said: "If anyone has a sound basis for suspicion, it is his duty to turn the available information over to the proper authorities, and avoid spreading unfounded gossip which might injure innocent persons. In no case should anyone take the law into his own hands, since the Federal Bureau of Investigation and other constituted authorities are fully prepared to meet any situation which might arise."

It has closed since the dam's conbeen struction, and State Game Warden Elliott Barker said the area had been opened in an effort to compensate for about three miles of the Chama recently posted by Kenneth A. 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
