County Is Being Considered for Mattress Project

Eddy County is being considered for a mattress project of the Surplus Commodities Corporation, said G. R. Howard, chairman of the Eddy County ACA, today.

If this county is selected, it will mean that eligible families will be allotted sufficient cotton and mattress ticking with which to make a mattress for each two persons in the family up to three mattresses,

It is a part of the program of the Surplus Commodities Corporation to distribute surplus agricultural commodities to the lower income groups. Cooperating with the corporation are the various agricultural conservation committees, whose normal duties are to administer the various agricultural programs, and the Agricultural Extension Service.

Cotton and mattress ticking are supplied to the county agricultural conservation committees by the Surplus Commodities Corporation. . These supplies are in turn given to eligible families who have made proper application to the county committees. The Extension Service supervises the making of the

mattresses. So far, more than 110,000 bales of cotton have been used for this purpose, Howard said.

An Editorial by Ed Shaeffer in The Albuquerque Tribune, Sept. 4, 1940

There is nothing to be said for the two per cent political assessment on state employees. Nor is there anything to be said for levies on municipal employes in behalf of the candidacy of one man who controls jobs. Both practices are wrong.

Disclosures the past few days of cancelled checks issued by the Democratic chairmen do not reveal much that is new. It has long been known that the two per cent collection was in effect. It was known that expenditures were made from the fund. That these expenditures were made by check is fair evidence that they were in order, as such expenditures go. You can't very well cover up with a check.

We should say that party payment for a governor's luncheon for newspapermen, one of the "exposures," was a plausible party expense. The governor, we assume, represented the party; was considered the party symbol and we suppose the luncheon did the party no harm. Checks to the governor's wife covered expense accounts to a national Democratic Women's meeting. We can't seem to become greatly excited about that, either. Nor, on the basis of information so far made public, about other ex penditures of party funds. The fact that party funds paid state radio stations for broadcasting a state executive's report on his administration seems surprising only in view of the fact that national networks contribute such time free when the national executive makes similar report. It appears to be the ordinary political stuff, not particularly spiritual, nor particularly mendacious.

The major effort, obviously, is to smear Governor Miles, and the inspiration is clear. So we may as well drift into a little analysis.

The Tribune did not support Governor Miles two years ago. Indeed it fought him vigorously. He at one time thought and said "unfairly." We thought we were fair, as probably everyone does. But that's a matter of opinion and we could be wrong.

We supported the governor's opponent, Clyde Tingley, for something like 15 years in his various public performances and ambitions, as city commissioner, mayor, governor. A man of tremendous vitality, he did things, built material things. He ignored, as is perhaps natural, the fact that he was aided by taxpayers' money, and lots of it. The belief grew on him that he, personally, gave these things to the public. He went into the governorship at a most op-portune time, when the Federal treasury was shoveling out the money. We can't sit in judgment on who got most of the money for New Mexico, whether it was Tingley, Hatch, Chavez or Dempsey. Certainly all did their bit. And claimed as much as possible. Who wouldn't, and why not?

Granting all the credit there is, or distributing it in the fairest manner possible, it was undeniable and is undeniable that during the Tingley administration highways were built, schools were erected, the Crippled Children's Hospital was built. The same progress has continued during the Miles administration and, according to as yet uncontradicted evidence, at

much less cost. It has been the era of New Deal largess. We have been spending ourselves back into prosperity. The Government has been putting out, and we might as well get ours. You can't fight that philosophy any more than you can expect a child to turn down a piece of candy because he wonders if his parents can afford to buy it. We're all children, all pretty self centered and selfish.

Came a time in the midst of this delightful spending when Mr. Tingley remembered that he could not run again for governor. You know what happened. A campaign and a special election in the effort to change the constitution so that a governor might go on and on forever. The Tribune would have no part of that. It looked like a very dangerous attempt at self perpetuation in office, which is not a part of the American scene and we hope never will be. Nor would the peope of New Mexico have any part of it. They scotched the scheme by a heavy majority, thereby proving themselves capable of self government and alert to the dangers of over eager public servants who seek to become public masters in perpetuity.

Two years ago, and through no help of ours, for we opposed his candidacy, John Miles became gover-nor. We supported Albert Mitchell, not to his gain, for he lost. And he was, and is, an able man. But that was the democratic process. It was right. The people elected the man of their choice. There could be no complaint; nor was there any from this news-

So we, a newspaper dedicated to an unpretentious effort to do the right thing as we can see the right, sat back and watched the new governor perform. And he did perform. Not spectacularly nor with bombast but quietly and, for the major part, effi-ciently. Mistakes he made and will continue to make. We have yet to see human perfection but we do relish a season of humility. Mr. Miles bore no ill will, and if he should have borne ill will we suppose The Tribune shoud have been Number 1 on the list. And

We are heading into perilous times. We are going into a period in which the rights we have always assumed as our own are being challenged by men with eager ambitions. Do not fool yourself about this. It is a time for the opportunist; it is a time for the petty dictator who thrives by virtue of the power which he had a significant of the power of the powe given him by his neighbors. Governor Miles has evidenced no appetite for that sort of thing. He has the gift of humility. It has always been important—never more so than now.

Because we think he has made a good governor, has displayed no ambition to rule or ruin, has listened and counselled and has acted as most any of us would in the circumstances, we advocate the renomination of John Miles. Knowing that we are talking only to Democrats, we also know that Governor Miles will remain a Democrat whether he wins or loses. We do not believe that John Miles aspires to dictatorship. Nothing in his record indicates it.



The researchers are interested in what happens to flies because they are inclined to believe that the supposedly harmless house fly is the toughest of the bugs. Cockroaches, moths, mosquitoes, ants, stable flies, and others perish befor the spray of a gun loaded with insecticide, but a house fly will

stand up and fight. One oil company has an air-conditioned fly farm, complete with laboratory, and operating to produce 12,000 flies daily. 



MEN 21 TO 35 TO REGISTER OCT. 16

The signing Monday of the Conscription Bill, passed Saturday by both houses of Congress, means that all men from 21 to 35 years, inclusive, in Artesia, as well as in the nation at large, will be required to register for draft into military service on Wednesday, Oct. 16, which day was set by President Roosevelt when he affixed his name.

The chief executive at that time called upon the governors of the states to provide suitable places for registration and urged local election officials and "other patriotic citizens" to man the registration boards. Employers were asked to give employees sufficient time off to present them

selves to fill out the forms. The law requires that all who will have reached their twenty-first birthday on Oct. 16 and have not passed their thirty-sixth birthday on that day must register.

It has not been announced just how the registration will be handled in New Mexico, nor is it known how many men it will affect. But there will be no favorites as to registration, for required to present themselves on Oct. 16.

A LETTER TO THREE SONS

Under the above caption a letter was written by Henry Hoke to his three sons and was originally published by him in his The Reporter in New York City. Since that time the letter has been reprinted many times and has been commented on favorably by numerous

The letter is full of real Americanism, as well as good thoughts to the youth of America at this time. We suggest that the adult readers of this department pass on to as many boys and girls the following, as originally published by Mr. Hoke:

Dear Boys: It won't be for very long I can call you that. You have grown fast. It seems so short a time since we built the trains in the cellar . . . and packed them away to hold for little future-fellows. The world moves so fast these days . . . we've all had to grow up quickly . . . and you must look at your new world with eyes more mature than mine when I professed youth.

It's time for us four to have a "bull-session" and find out where we stand. I'll put my end of it in a letter because:

1. Habit has made that the best way to express my thoughts.

2. A session like this might have interruptions—what with radio, telephone, dances, business and other incidentals of living. 3. I've found that other fathers are worried about the same identical thing that bothers me . . . so maybe we can develop an

idea that might be helpful to other sons. What's It All About?

Those mimeographed sheets you've been getting in school (stuck) under your door, etc.) . . . and those doubtful doctrines discussed 8 p. m. (sometimes approved) by teachers and newspapers and your elders . . . have mixed-up your thinking until it's no wonder you wonder what all the shoutin's about.

You have been told, for instance and among other things, that: 1. Capitalists and imperialists are trying to push us into war. (War-

2. Our Government is rotten from the bottom up-and especially at the top. (Political incompetence)

3. Youth is given more chance of expression in the Nazi, Communist

or Fascist scheme of things. (Revolution) 4. That you should be satisfied with everything as it is and should do nothing to alter or stop the changes being made around you.

(Isolationism, Unpreparedness and "it can't happen here") It's all very alluring and smooth. The letters are signed by high sounding titles . . . such as the American Student Union or the Student Christian Union or the Students Alliance. The fellows who talk to you sound sincere . . . and they have a line of dope long and loud

enough to stop your breath. What are you going to BELIEVE? That is the real problem of FIRST METHODIST CHURCH youth. What is the one thing that most worries the fathers of fine sons? I'd say . . . the Indifference of Youth to the whole problem of this new world you face so calmly. You know that we have not tried each Sunday morning; classes for to dictate your thinking or your actions . . . and far be it for me to start now. You have heard so much. You three are a lot less indifferent than other sons whose reactions I've learned. You are grown-up enough to take the role of "guinea pigs" in this session.

It is your world ahead. You can help make it what you will. I can only offer you some suggestions.

First: I don't believe there is a single father in this America who

wants to see his sons forced into a war. I don't believe any American (official or plain citizen) wants fine, clean boys like you to be slaughtered. Weigh those rumors of war mongering carefully. They smell

Second: I nominate you three boys as charter members of a new club to be composed of American Fathers and Sons. Let's call the new club: "The Hi-Timers."
