News Briefs of the "Sunshine State," Gleaned from Many Sources

Farmers of South Quay County plan their own telephone line to the county seat.

The State Game Department sold licenses totaling \$173,354.85 during the last fiscal year.

After several years' trial, about 96 per cent of the farmers and ranchers in five Eastern New Mexico counties expect to continue soil and water conservation on their lands.

A record yield of 10,000 bushels of apples was reported for the Mimbres River orchards of Grover C. McSherry.

State School Superintendent Grace Corrigan announced a nationwide cash essay contest.

Cattle shipments from New Mexico totaled 40,069 head in September, up from 15,612 in August and 39,840 a year ago.

The State Employment Service today appealed to the field division of ports of entry for cooperation in sending cotton pickers into the Pecos Valley and the Las Cruces cotton areas.

Gov. Miles, in a statement released from his office, praised county clerks for their preparations for conscriptions registration.

Bernalillo County commissioners admit they probably violated a New Mexico law requiring bids on all purchases of \$200 or more.
