THAT HE DIED NOT IN VAIN

A little child, too young to know any responsibilities or to realize dangers, ran in front of a moving automobile Tuesday morning and was killed, through no fault of the driver.

It was a sad accident-sad not only for the family of the child, but for the driver of the automobile. The community should sympathize with her, for there always will be a memory of that terrible moment when she realized she had struck the child; of the moment when she was told the child had died.

Probably the wound will heal more slowly in her heart than in the hearts of the grief-stricken parents and other relatives, for it is within human power to overcome the immediate grief attendant upon the death of a loved one, even when during violent circumstances.

But one who feels he has caused the death of another seldom gets over it, even though he knows he was not at fault.

The little child cannot be brought back to life. The grief cannot be avoided. Nothing can be done in that case.

But the accident makes the community accident conscious and it should make those drivers who are sometimes at fault think a little. And it should make those older children think also-those who are love, as Christ also hath loved us, it a necessity. mature enough in mind to think for themselves.





In most states there are laws requiring that any vehicle on a street or highway after sundown must display either a light on the rear or an accepted type of reflector. We would never need such a law, for whether we were on a bicycle, or in a wagan or on horseback, we certainly would be looking out for our own neck. And that goes for walking on the highway too, except in an emergency, when one must Sunday Serviceswalk for help. If we were caught like that, we would get out of the way, not do as so many pedestrians-who by the way are supposed to face traffic-seem to delight in doing: Defy you to hit them.

We strongly recommend a city ordinance, if not a state law, requiring that bicycles carry a satisfactory light in front and either a light or reflector on the rear after sundown and that there be a suitable penalty for failing to comply. Then we would go one better and make it just as much an infraction of the traffic regulations and ordinances for a boy or a girl on a bicycle to do the wrong thing as for the driver of an automobile. And we would recommend a few arrests Thursday in the month, 7:30 p. m. if it cannot be accomplished otherwise.

We hesitate to mention the shortcomings of the drivers of automobiles in this editorial, lest the driver of the car which caused the death of a child Tuesday think there is any reflection on her, but she and everyone else may be assured there is no such idea. On the contrary, she needs to be congratulated for having stopped for the child. It was only after she had started again that the child ran out and was killed.

But many drivers need just as harsh a going-over as the boy and 9:30 a. m. girl bicyclists.

That can wait until another time, except for us to point out that we must not let that little child die in vain. We must learn a lesson from his death and take stock of ourselves. We must drive carefully at all times, always considerate of others, especially of the irresponsible child.

And the task of drivers will be much easier if the older boys and girls, those on bicycles, will be considerate of others too.


