



Under the program, as of Oct. 15, total sales and deliveries of cotton amounted to about 6,333,000 bales, including cotton products equivalent to 491,000 bales. These quantities exclude cancellations allowed because of war conditions.

Continuation of the program for 1940-41 was announced July 2, in connection with the export of cotcotton exports.
