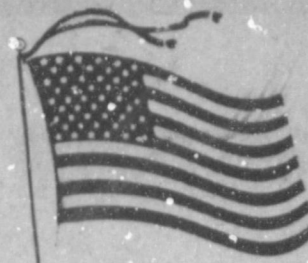

Chemigation

For Crops

Talks Set

An agricultural meeting on Crop Chemigation will be held on Friday, June 10, at 9 a.m. at the Bailey County Civic Center, announces Spencer Tanksley, Bailey County Extension agent.

This program has been planned to provide timely information to all crop producers who can apply insecticides, fungicides, fertilizers, and herbicides in irrigation water.

The following program has been planned:

9-9:20-Chemigation; EPA Law and Safety-Dr. Pat Morrison, Entomologist - TEXS, Lubbock.

9:20-9:40-Application of Fungicides and Insecticides; Dr. Allen Knutson, Entomologist, Castro County.

9:40-10-BREAK-Coffee and Donuts - Sponsored by Bailey County Soil-Water Conservation District.

10-10:40-Application of Fertilizers and Herbicides - Dr. Brent Bean - Area Agronomist - TEAX.

10:40-11-Types of Chemigation Equipment and Calibration of Equipment - Leon New - Irrigation Specialist - TEAX.

Tanksley encourages all irrigation farmers with sprinkler systems to attend this meeting. He states that chemigation will provide excellent coverage to crops and can reduce farming expenses.

The meeting is free and open to the public regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

It is being sponsored jointly by the Bailey County Extension Crops Committee and the Soil and Water Conservation District.

Department, who presented a film, "Terrible Tuesday."

The film was actually shot during and after the devastating tornado that 'hit' Wichita Falls about 10 years ago -- termed perhaps the largest tornado ever reported in the United States.

Much of the film showed the tornado as it formed, and roared into Wichita Falls, leaving death, injury and destruction behind.

Although Wichita Falls had a viable safety plan, it still wasn't enough to cope with a tornado as large and all-encompassing as the one that left 46 dead, and more than 1,600 injuries, along with up to 25,000 homeless residents.

It was reported that the tornado that devastated Wichita Falls was one and one-half miles wide and ranged across the north Texas city before it lifted back into the clouds and dissipated.

Several victims of the tornado told their stories on the film -- where they were and what they were doing as the tornado roared over them.

They discussed their injuries, and how the devastation affected them.

Parker said it was due to the well-trained disaster personnel and weather spotters that kept the casualty list from being over 2,000 people.

On the film, Wichita Falls residents discussed hearing the storm warnings -- and ignoring them -- as they continued their day to day routines.

Parker told the Rotarians, "We have trained weather spotters, but we have to depend on you and your eyeballs. We may be on the backside of a cloud and not see a funnel or tornado -- where maybe you can."

"All the trained people in the world can't be too many."

He told how the May 30 severe storms that formed to the southwest of Muleshoe were very much the same formations that dropped the tornado on Wichita Falls, and cautioned people to be sure to listen and take to a shelter

when necessary -- or when warned to take shelter, immediately. "That warning means just what it says," he cautioned.

The Muleshoe fireman praised the local trained weather spotters, which includes the Bailey County Civil Defense, operating with Cleve Bland in charge, in the basement of the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center; the Muleshoe Fire Department, with firemen out in all directions, watching the clouds and keeping up with what is happening; and Bailey County Law Enforcement officers who are also trained spotters.

"We all do the best we can," said Parker. "But, at night, the only way we can spot threatening weather in the darkness is in lightning flashes, and they don't always show us what we need to see."

"Terrible Tuesday" is a very graphic and horrifying film, and one not easily forgotten, as it shows the death and destruction of a city and its people. It is also a film that should leave everyone with a better view of what happens in severe weather.

The film also outlined several safety precautions, such as:

- Don't ignore warnings;
- Don't try to escape in a

Lazbuddie Seeks

Site To Build

New Post Office

If a suitable site can be located, the U. S. Postal Service will be constructing a new post office building at Lazbuddie.

According to a spokesman, the preferred area to be considered will be bounded within one-half mile of the present post office building.

He said the desired size is 12,500 square feet, or a lot with dimensions of 100x125 feet. However, he said both smaller and larger sites will be considered, particularly those with a corner location.

Crop Damage Figures Still Rise As Heavy Rains Are Continuing

Bailey County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley said Wednesday morning, "Crop damage was reassessed on Tues-

day, June 7, one week after the large storms which occurred in Bailey County.

"These storms, plus additional rainfall that occurred this past Sunday in the southern part of the county, has many farmers facing replanting decisions.

"Rainfall amounts of up to two inches occurred in the Needmore, Longview, and Baileyboro areas again on Sunday, and caused additional crop losses," he added.

As stated last week, dryland producers do not have many crop

alternatives, cautioned Tanksley. Most producers today will have to decide between replanting cotton, milo, or possibly soybeans or a bean crop. Producers should consider varieties of cotton that fall into the very early maturity range, he said. Cotton varieties of this type are: Paymaster 792, Alltex Quickie, Tamcot Cam D-E, and Cascot Seed 13.

When considering grain sorghum varieties, the medium-range maturity varieties are the most adaptable in this time of the year.

Much of the cotton in the southern part of the county continues to show effects from the adverse weather conditions, continued the Extension agent. Cotton continues to die from seedling disease, Ascochyta, (Wet Weather) Blight disease, being wind-blown, sand-burned and it has been washed in and covered up. Cotton which remains with two plants per foot of

Retired Director

Of Public Works

Died On Monday

Final rites for L. M. Bell, 66, of Muleshoe, were conducted at 4 p.m. Tuesday in the Chapel of the Chimes, with Rev. V. L. Huggins, retired Baptist minister from Plainview and Rev. Dale Berry, pastor of Trinity Baptist Church of Muleshoe, officiating. Interment was in Bailey County Memorial Park under direction of Ellis Funeral Home.

He died at 1:35 a.m. Monday, June 6, in Methodist Hospital at Lubbock following a lengthy illness.

L. M. Bell was born August 30, 1921, at Chillicothe and moved to Muleshoe from Vernon 39 years ago.

He was employed by the City of Muleshoe from 1949-1987, retiring as Director of Public Works on February 28, 1987. He was married to Mae Cates on September 6, 1962 at Plains.

He was a veteran of World War II, having served in the U. S. Army. He was a member of the First Christian Church in Muleshoe and was a charter member of the Muleshoe Masonic Lodge.

His survivors include his wife, Mae; two sons, Paul Bell, Amarillo and Charles Bell, Okmulgee, OK.; three sisters, Mrs. Patricia Grippando, Muleshoe; Mrs. Martha Jo Myers, Farwell and Mrs. Judy Lott, McAlester, OK.; three brothers, Hugh Bell, Gruber; Billy Bell, Weatherford and Howard Bell, Seattle, Wash.; and two grandchildren.

Lazbuddie Students Excel

In TEAMS Test Results

Lazbuddie ISD Board of Education, in its regular May meeting, heard the results of the state-mandated Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) which was given state-wide to students in grades 3, 5, 7, and 9 in February. Grade 11 students were tested in October and May.

School officials and the Board of Education were pleased with the results reported by Anne R. Farris, Elementary principal and high school counselor.

The report showed that 100 percent of the students in four grades (3, 7, 9 and 11; mastered mathematics.

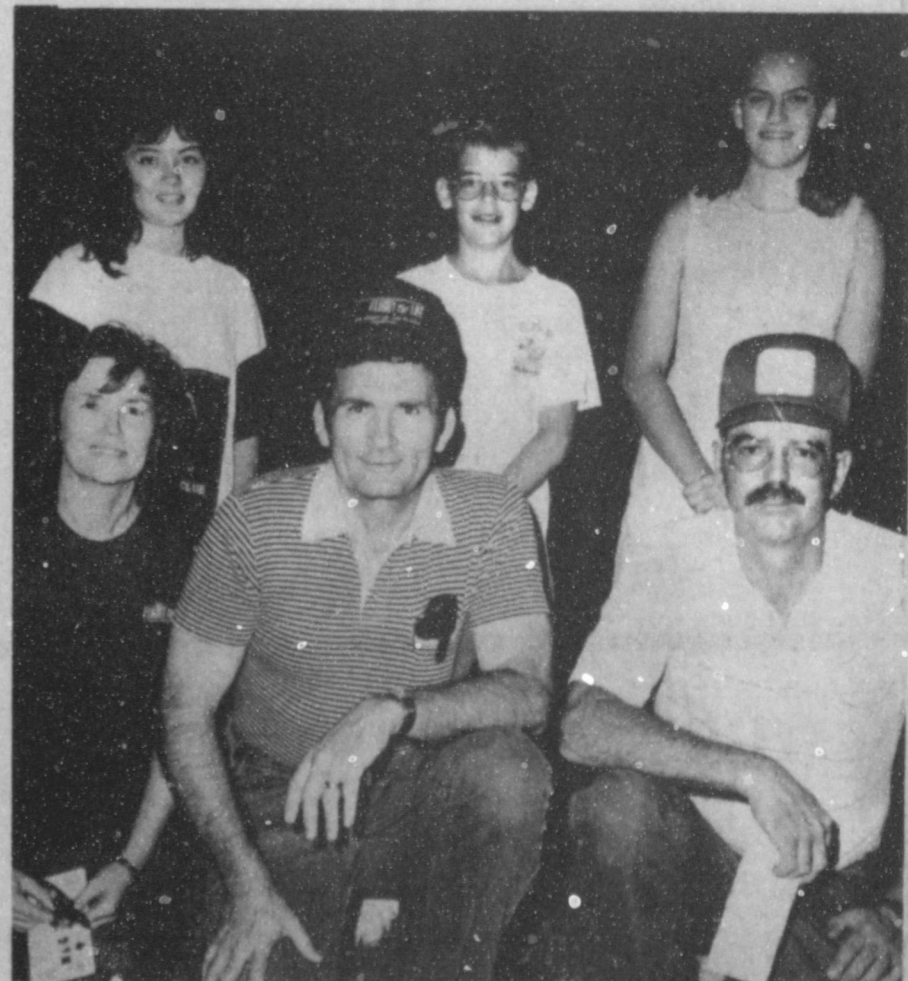
Strengths were also shown in the area of writing in grades 3, 5 and 11 with 94, 93 and 100 percent of the students, respectively, demonstrating mastery.

On the narrative written composition, the highest rating of 3 or 4 was received by 67 percent of the third graders, while 93 percent of the fifth graders received the highest rating of 3 or 4 on their descriptive written composition.

In language arts and math, 100 percent of the 11th graders demonstrated mastery. In reading, the third graders led the other grades with 94 percent mastering. Following closely, the fifth and ninth graders showed 93 and 92 percent mastery, respectively, while 88 percent of the seventh graders mastered reading.

A three-year comparison shows significant improvement in the district's overall scores. The state originally encouraged

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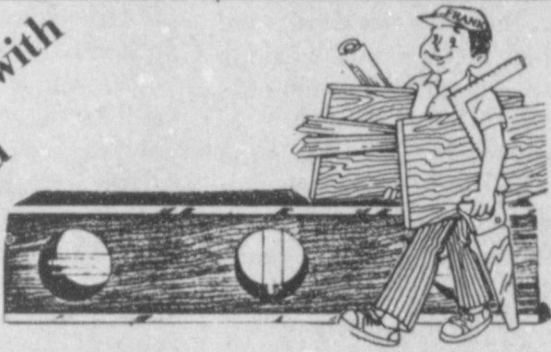

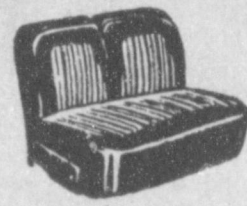

REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

40-inch row should produce a normal yield unless there are unusual other large skips in the field. Plants that have normal leaves should recover and produce a normal crop.

Many fields have been washed and severely eroded and farmers are facing a nightmare situation in shaping these fields back up in a workmanlike manner, warned Tanksley. A sandfighter should be run as soon as possible to prevent sand injury to the vital buds and leaves left in the field. Many fields of cotton have been completely destroyed and farmers have no choice except to choose which crop to replant.

Producers who are going to replant grain sorghum on cotton land which had Treflan incorporated on it will have to use a buster planter to try to get beneath the herbicide layer in the soil. Many producers in the northern part of the county will choose to replant hailed-out cotton to soybeans. Soybeans are sensitive to day length; therefore, late plantings will result in short stalk growth of most varieties.

Varieties such as Columbus, Yield, York and Park are some of the better old varieties which should be considered when replanting.

Selecting an alternate crop is always an unpleasant chore, added Tanksley. Fortunately, producers do still have time to replant and harvest something this fall.

Any producer needing additional information should contact the Extension office in the Bailey County courthouse.

To The Public**

Dear Journal Readers,
Greetings from West Germany!

For the past year, I have been participating in the first Agricultural Exchange sponsored by the Congress-Bundestag Program and FFA.

For 8 weeks immediately following our arrival in the Bundesrepublik, the entire group of 15 Americans was located in Radolfzell to take part in an intensive Language Training Course.

Eight weeks, seems like a rather long time, but it was quite necessary, since 12 of the 15 had no previous knowledge of the German language.

Weekends were occupied with organized activities including tours to Weingarten, Freiburg and Titissee, and Switzerland.

We were transferred to our host families on October 1, where we would spend the next 10 months living the life of a German agricultural apprentice.

The big adjustment - apart from language and culture - was size. Fields here in the Lower Rhein District range from 5-50 acres in size and average 20. Due to this decreased farming area, money is earned through increased production rather than decreased production costs. This requires an entirely different approach to farming.

I reside with Baron von der Leyen in Schloss Bloemersheim on the west side of the Rhein across from Duisburg. The Baron operates approximately 75 acres

of fruit production, 710 acres of crop production, and 1220 acres of forestry.

By German standards, Bloemersheim is huge. There are only 10-12 other farms in this part of Germany as large and technically advanced as Bloemersheim.

From the 75 acres of fruit production, 30 are planted with six different sorts of strawberries, which should begin to be harvested next week. Two acres are planted with raspberries, cranberries and gooseberries. The remaining 43 acres consist of 29,000 apple trees of different sorts and 3,000 pear trees of five different sorts.

Crops here are: 285 acres wheat, 100 acres rye, 190 acres sugarbeets, 62 acres "ackerbohnen" similar to soybeans, 62 acres corn, 11 acres flax.

Intensive farming pays much more attention to technical advancements and chemical application. On wheat ground, for example, \$95 per acre per year is spent on chemical substances (does not include diesel, Tach-hours, salaries, etc.) where one bushel brings about \$6.80. The goal set for this year's harvest is 330 bushels per acre. You'd think he was making a killin' till you find out that every field must be sprayed at least once a week for the entire summer with diesel costs four times that of the

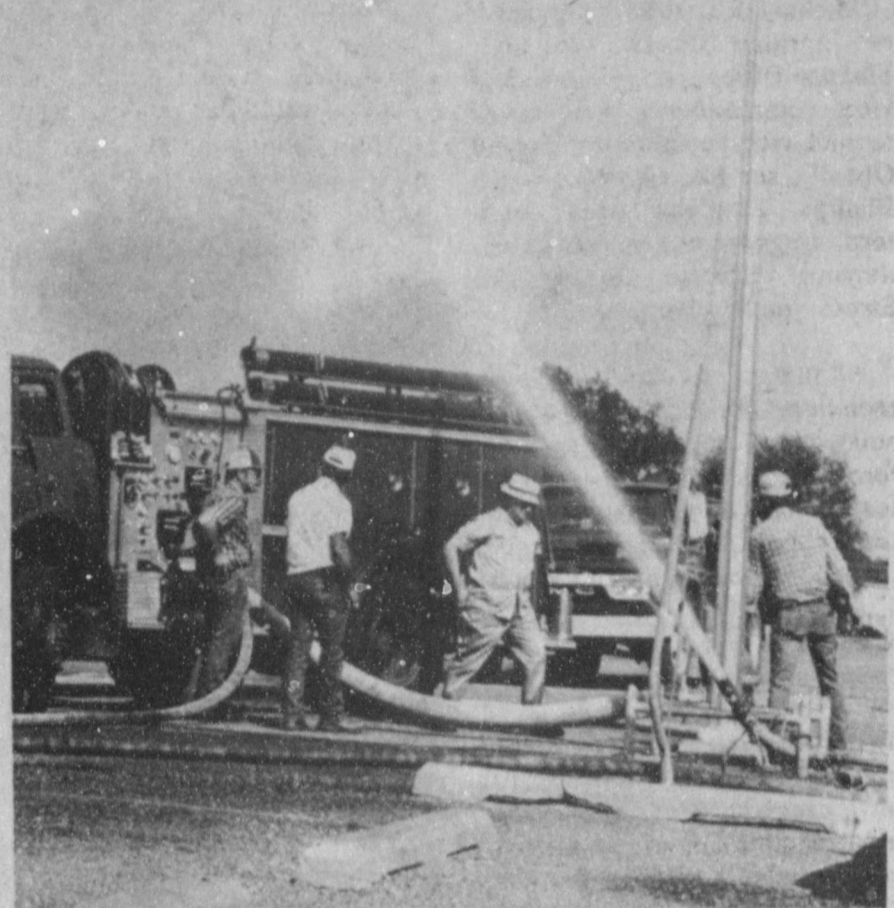

Notice To Taxpayers

Taxpayers in the Bailey County Appraisal District have an opportunity to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. The property owner must file a written "notice of protest" with the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) before June 21, 1988. The district's Appraisal Review Board will begin hearing taxpayer protests on July 11, 1988.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the Bailey County Appraisal District office, 104 E. Avenue C, Muleshoe. A letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable as long as it identifies the property owner, the property which is the subject of protest, and indicates dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal office.

Each protesting taxpayer may offer evidence or argument either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Taxpayers should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing unit spending and will not hear protests of those matters.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date, and place of their individual hearings.

The State Property Tax Board has issued a pamphlet called "Taxpayer's Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities" available at the Bailey County Appraisal District office, 104 E. Avenue C, Muleshoe, which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB.

60 Years Ago

1928

HAIL, RAIN AND WIND DAMAGE CROPS IN BAILEY COUNTY

Rain, measuring in some sections as much as five inches fell over Bailey County Saturday night and Sunday. In some localities only showers were reported, while in the Muleshoe territory .39 inches fell. The section that was severely damaged was in the West Camp neighborhood. Crops to the extent of about three thousand acres are a complete loss, according to reports. It is said that within an hour or two, something like five inches of water fell, accompanied by hail, which covered the field and roads. About 1200 to 1500 chickens were also said to have drowned for the farmers in this community, one man finding 103 fliers dead in one bunch. Plans were being made Monday for replanting crops as soon as the farmers could get in their fields.
