**Draft-Age Group Offers Services In National Defense Plans**

**United States Junior Chamber of Commerce to Gear Organization and Activities to Nation's Needs**

NEW YORK, N. Y.—In line with recent conferences with Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox, and other Government officials, Mark S. Matthews, President of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce has announced plans of his Board of Directors to gear the activities of the organization into the needs of national defense and preparedness. The United States Junior Chamber of Commerce, which was one of the first organizations to urge compulsory military training, is probably the only national group in the country having the same age limits as the Selective Service Proclamation now in operation. Every one of the 150,000 young men who are members of its 1,000 affiliated Junior Chambers of Commerce throughout the country are from twenty-one to thirty-five.

**Three-Point Program**  
A three-point program has been set up at the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce headquarters in Chicago and will entail: 1, The

dissemination of information through local organizations to all men of draft age and relating to all matters on compulsory military service; 2, The training of aviators through establishment of Flying Cadet recruiting programs, Junior Chamber of Commerce flying clubs, and CAA courses under JCC sponsorship; and, 3, Establishment of local schools and courses for the training of skilled workers essential to the national defense program, mechanics, welders, machinists, etc.

Commenting on the program during their conference, Secretary Knox said to Mr. Matthews, "Your far-sighted interest is obvious in your early demand for compulsory military training. I congratulate you on your stand here today and ask that you assure your Board of Directors of the gratitude of the United States Navy." Though the membership of the Junior Chamber of Commerce falls 100% within the age limits of Selective Service, Mr. Matthews pointed out that they do not look upon themselves as a special group having any special privilege. The whole purpose of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce is now, and will in the future be, to serve and not to ask.

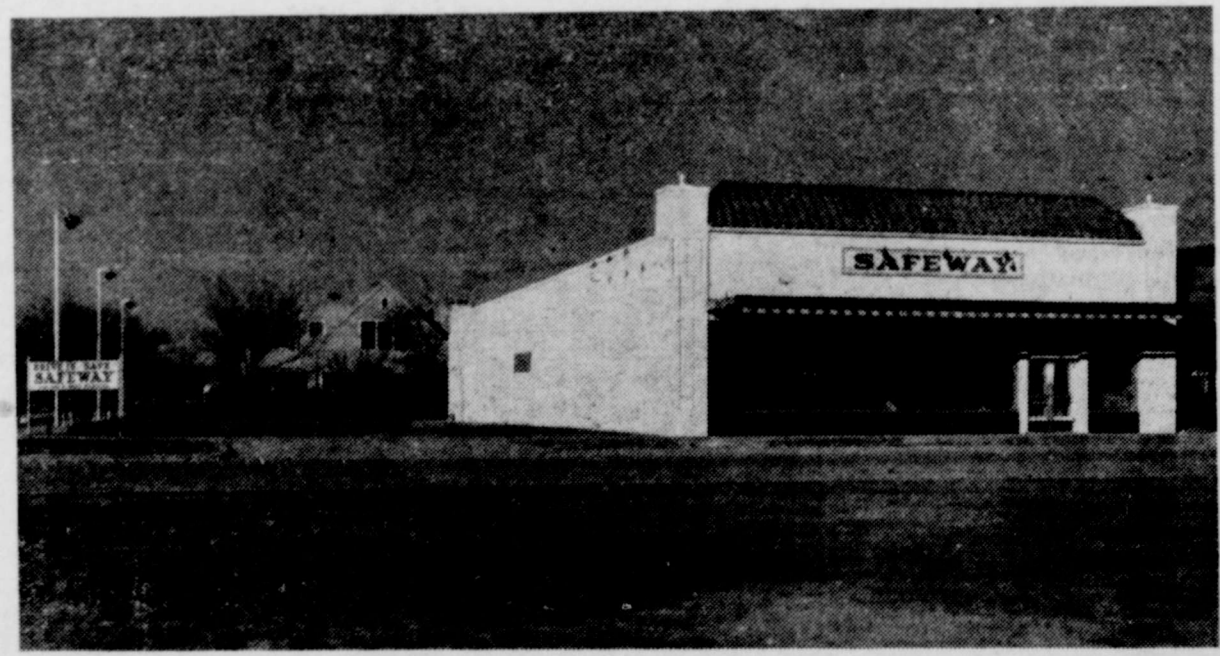

Will Issue Special Permits for Deer Having No Antlers

Applications for El Cielo Peak to Be Received Until December 11

A regulation of the state game commission, according to announcement made by the State Game Department, provides for the issuance of forty permits to take antlerless deer from an overstocked area on El Cielo Peak and vicinity.

"The purpose of the regulation," said Warden Elliott S. Barker, "is, in cooperation with the U. S. Forest Service, to remove some of the breeding stock of deer from a seriously overpopulated area on and adjacent to El Porvenir game refuge and to keep the deer herd within the carrying capacity of the range and prevent further damage to forage growth."

The regulation provides for the taking of forty antlerless deer; that is does, or fawns of either sex, may be taken, but bucks with horns, including spike bucks, shall not be taken.

This is just a very small unit in a cold, snowy area and hunters may expect to encounter considerable hardships, although deer are abundant.

Registration of Aliens Must Be Made by Dec. 26

Jesse L. Truett, Artesia postmaster, who has been kept busy the last few weeks registering aliens of this vicinity, warned this week that alien registration will end on Dec. 26 and that all non-citizens who have not appeared for registration by that date will be subject to severe penalties under the federal law.

All aliens 14 years of age and older must register in person and be fingerprinted and alien children under 14 must be registered by their parents and guardians, Truett said.

Registration takes place at the postoffice and there is no charge of any kind connected with alien registration. In this connection the Department of Justice has warned aliens to beware of racketeers.

All aliens are also warned that, having registered, they are required to report any change in their permanent residence address within five days to the Immigration and Naturalization Service of the Department of Justice in Washington. Forms for this purpose are obtainable at all postoffices.

No alien need be unprepared for the questions he will be asked. Sample registration forms which show him exactly what information he will need at registration are available in all postoffices.

EDDY IS RUNNER-UP IN EMPLOYER COVERAGE

Valencia County led the field the last quarter with a 22 per cent increase over the same period last year in the number of employers covered by the unemployment compensation statute, it was announced by Roy Cook, chairman of the unemployment compensation commission.

Runner-up was Eddy County with a 20.9 per cent increase, while Taos County claimed third place with 15.9. Mora, which has suffered a curtailment of mining and business activities, was the only county to show a decrease, with a 5.9 per cent drop in number of employers covered by the act.

### WHAT'S WHAT —in— NEW MEXICO

News Briefs of the "Sunshine State," Gleaned from Many Sources

A modern Delilah spoiled plans for a series of publicity pictures, publicizing the premiere of "Santa Fe Trail," historical motion picture, which will be staged in Santa Fe Dec. 13-15. Studio press agents had planned to photograph Arleigh Nave, Indian trader, whose hair hung below his shoulders. The next day, to the press agents' consternation, he appeared with a fresh haircut, explaining sheepishly, "I've met the most wonderful girl."

Two Berger, Tex., men were fined \$100 and \$28 costs each on charges of procuring residents' game licenses in New Mexico under assumed names and witnessing each other's signature on the applications, State Game Warden Elliott Barker reported. The men were Joe Paynar and Leo E. Bowling, who allegedly purchased licenses as residents of Jal.

G. S. Carter, director of the state sales and compensating tax divisions, announced that about fifteen New Mexico businessmen would be called upon to post "immediately" cash bonds to insure payment of their sales taxes. The bonds were made necessary, said Carter, because these taxpayers had been, "month in and month out, paying their school tax with 'hot checks.'" The director did not name the fifteen taxpayers who would be asked to put up bonds, as provided in the state school tax law to insure compliance with the act.

Game Warden Elliott Barker said the New Mexico deer kill was 32 per cent this season, the same approximately as last season. Nearly 10,000 hunters checked into game areas, and 8,168 checked out with 2,601 bucks. Hunters also bagged 350 turkeys, 468 squirrels, seven bear and two mountain lion. Nobody knows what happened to the 1,900 hunters who checked into areas and did not check out.

Clinton P. Anderson spent \$263.75 in his successful campaign for election to Congress, he reported to the secretary of state.

State WPA Administrator J. J. Connelly announced that New Mexico's December WPA quota had been set at 10,800, an increase of 750 over the November figure.

The State Bureau of Revenue has a New Mexico Supreme Court decision requiring the Humble Pipeline Company of Texas to pay state income tax on revenue produced in New Mexico. Reversing two judgments by the District Court of Santa Fe County, the

Supervisors of the central Curry County soil conservation district announced plans for cooperating with the State Highway Department in planting trees along paved highways of the county. It is planned to place trees in areas where their growth will be assured by excess water accumulating along barrow ditches. Farmers whose land is adjacent to the routes have been invited to apply for trees in Clovis.

A relief train of forty-eight stock cars headed into Northern New Mexico last week to complete rescue of 8,000 sheep marooned by a three-foot snowfall in the region's range country. The Denver & Rio Grand Western Railroad reported that a bulldozer and twenty horses were used to break trails on which to drive the storm-harassed sheep to loading chutes along the railroad's narrow gauge Antonito-Santa Fe branch.

The attorney general's office held that a police judge could also be a justice of the peace. The opinion, written by Assistant Attorney General Fred J. Federici for Alvin Buck of Clovis, said a 1939 statute specifically provided that an official could hold both offices. As a peace justice, said Federici, the official would act as a state magistrate; as a police judge, he would act as a city magistrate.

Dismissal on Dec. 15 awaits state employees who "flunked" examinations of the state merit system commission. Chairman Ralph Trigg said the commission is setting up eligible registers based on examinations given for about 300 of 400 jobs under the commission's jurisdiction. Employees failing to place on the registers, he said, would be notified by mail the first week in December and their services terminated as of Dec. 15. Affected are employees of the insane

asylum at Las Vegas, the miners' hospital at Raton, the industrial school at Springer, the school for mental defectives at Los Lunas, the girls' welfare home at Albuquerque, the Carrie Tingley Hospital at Hot Springs, the state police and the ports of entry.

A proposal to sell the Surplus Commodities Corporation 114,000 bags of 1939 pinto beans was left up to the agency by Estancia Valley bean growers. In a conference with a representative of the agency, the bean growers suggested that the commodity be purchased at \$2.85 a hundredweight, which would net farmers \$2.20 on 1939, or \$2.35 if the 1940 crop equivalent

were brought instead. The representative, W. O. Kennedy, returned to Washington saying he would advise the growers some time this week.

If the secretary of war approves, Albuquerque's American Legion Drum and Bugle Corps will be a musical unit of a portion of the New Mexico Home Guard, Adj. Gen. R. C. Charlton said. Plans for setting up the Home Guard, a military organization to take the place of National Guardsmen called out of the state for active duty, are awaiting word from the War Department. "Organization of the Home Guard," said Charl-

ton, "depends upon such regulations as the secretary of war may prescribe. When we receive these regulations, the organization will proceed." He added, however, that there was little likelihood any ruling would prevent the drum and bugle corps, which has asked to be included in the guard plans, from becoming a unit.

Attorney General Filo Sedillo has been permitted to practice before the supreme court of the United States. Sedillo, in Washington on business, was sponsored before the high tribunal by Charles Fahy, former Santa Fe attorney, now assistant U. S. solicitor general.

Clyde Faulk, state highway department office engineer, has been appointed editor of the Highway Journal, a section of New Mexico Magazine, State Highway Engineer Burton Dwyre announced today. Faulk succeeds the late Ray Bennett, assistant office engineer, who died last week.

The Dec. 10 state land office auction of oil and gas leases will include thirty-four tracts in Eddy and Lea Counties comprising 8,080 acres. It will be the largest sale during the term in office of Land Commissioner Frank Worden.

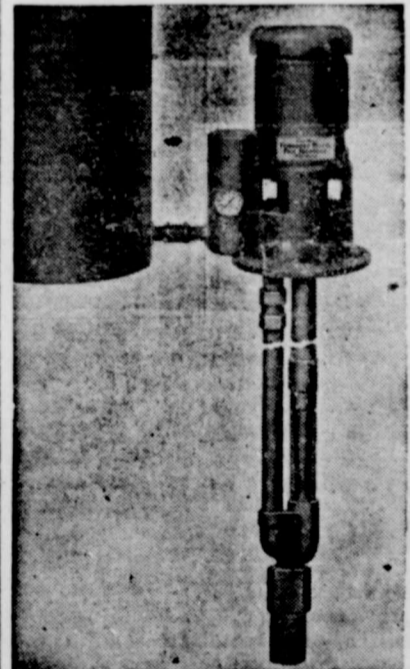
Governor Miles has accepted appointment to the governors' com-

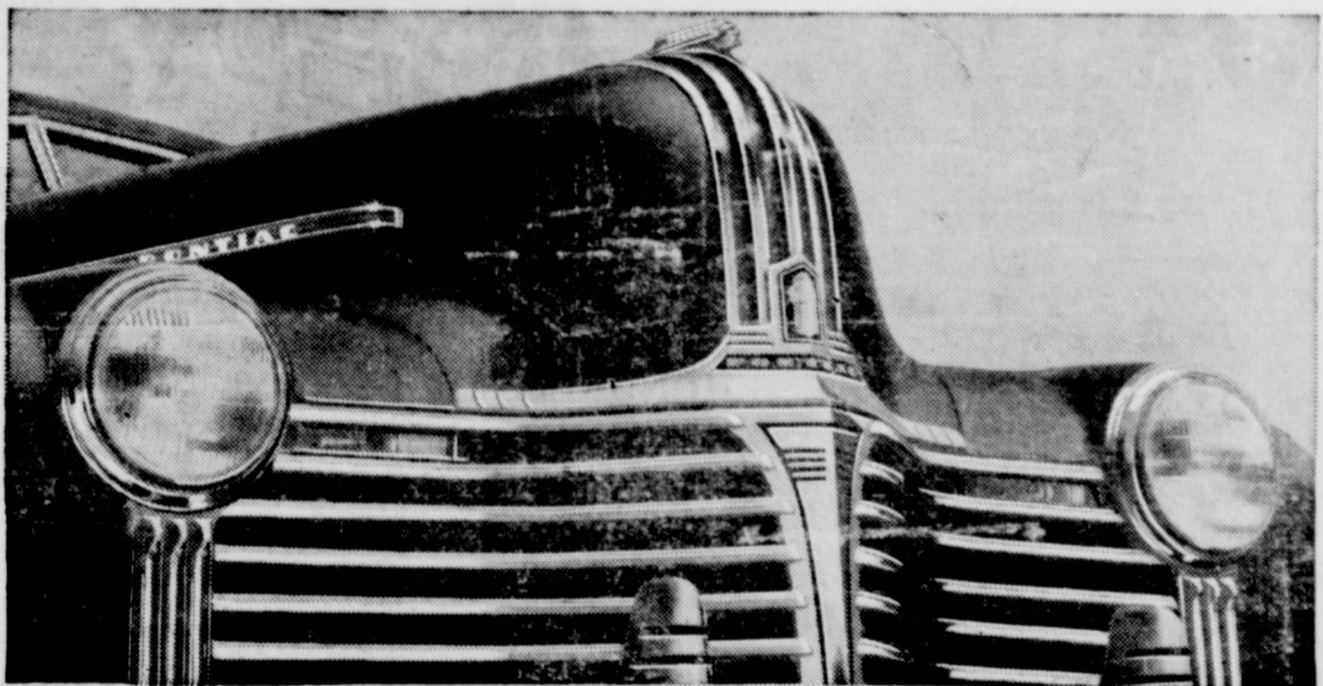

News Briefs of the "Sunshine State," Gleaned from Many Sources

A modern Delilah spoiled plans for a series of publicity pictures, publicizing the premiere of "Santa Fe Trail," historical motion picture, which will be staged in Santa Fe Dec. 13-15. Studio press agents had planned to photograph Arleigh Nave, Indian trader, whose hair hung below his shoulders. The next day, to the press agents' consternation, he appeared with a fresh haircut, explaining sheepishly, "I've met the most wonderful girl."

Two Berger, Tex., men were fined \$100 and \$28 costs each on charges of procuring residents' game licenses in New Mexico under assumed names and witnessing each other's signature on the applications, State Game Warden Elliott Barker reported. The men were Joe Paynar and Leo E. Bowling, who allegedly purchased licenses as residents of Jal.

G. S. Carter, director of the state sales and compensating tax divisions, announced that about fifteen New Mexico businessmen would be called upon to post "immediately" cash bonds to insure payment of their sales taxes. The bonds were made necessary, said Carter, because these taxpayers had been, "month in and month out, paying their school tax with 'hot checks.'" The director did not name the fifteen taxpayers who would be asked to put up bonds, as provided in the state school tax law to insure compliance with the act.

Game Warden Elliott Barker said the New Mexico deer kill was 32 per cent this season, the same approximately as last season. Nearly 10,000 hunters checked into game areas, and 8,168 checked out with 2,601 bucks. Hunters also bagged 350 turkeys, 468 squirrels, seven bear and two mountain lion. Nobody knows what happened to the 1,900 hunters who checked into areas and did not check out.

Anton P. Anderson spent \$283.44 in his successful campaign for election to Congress, he reported to the secretary of state.

State WPA Administrator J. J. Connelly announced that New Mexico's December WPA quota had been set at 10,800, an increase of 750 over the November figure.

The State Bureau of Revenue has a New Mexico Supreme Court decision requiring the Humble Pipeline Company of Texas to pay state income tax on revenue produced in New Mexico. Reversing two judgments by the District Court of Santa Fe County, the

Supervisors of the central Curry County soil conservation district announced plans for cooperating with the State Highway Department in planting trees along paved highways of the county. It is planned to place trees in areas where their growth will be assured by excess water accumulating along barrow ditches. Farmers whose land is adjacent to the routes have been invited to apply for trees in Clovis.

A relief train of forty-eight stock cars headed into Northern New Mexico last week to complete rescue of 8,000 sheep marooned by a three-foot snowfall in the region's range country. The Denver & Rio Grand Western Railroad reported that a bulldozer and twenty horses were used to break trails on which to drive the storm-harassed sheep to loading chutes along the railroad's narrow gauge Antonito-Santa Fe branch.

The attorney general's office held that a police judge could also be a justice of the peace. The opinion, written by Assistant Attorney General Fred J. Federici for Alvin Buck of Clovis, said a 1939 statute specifically provided that an official could hold both offices. As a peace justice, said Federici, the official would act as a state magistrate; as a police judge, he would act as a city magistrate.

Dismissal on Dec. 15 awaits state employees who "flunked" examinations of the state merit system commission. Chairman Ralph Trigg said the commission is setting up eligible registers based on examinations given for about 300 of 400 jobs under the commission's jurisdiction. Employees failing to place on the registers, he said, would be notified by mail the first week in December and their services terminated as of Dec. 15. Affected are employees of the insane

asylum at Las Vegas, the miners' hospital at Raton, the industrial school at Springer, the school for mental defectives at Los Lunas, the girls' welfare home at Albuquerque, the Carrie Tingley Hospital at Hot Springs, the state police and the ports of entry.

A proposal to sell the Surplus Commodities Corporation 114,000 bags of 1939 pinto beans was left up to the agency by Estancia Valley bean growers. In a conference with a representative of the agency, the bean growers suggested that the commodity be purchased at \$2.85 a hundredweight, which would net farmers \$2.20 on 1939, or \$2.35 if the 1940 crop equivalent were brought instead. The representative, W. O. Kennedy, returned to Washington saying he would advise the growers some time this week.

If the secretary of war approves, Albuquerque's American Legion Drum and Bugle Corps will be a musical unit of a portion of the New Mexico Home Guard, Adj. Gen. R. C. Charlton said. Plans for setting up the Home Guard, a military organization to take the place of National Guardsmen called out of the state for active duty, are awaiting word from the War Department. "Organization of the Home Guard," said Charl-

ton, "depends upon such regulations as the secretary of war may prescribe. When we receive these regulations, the organization will proceed." He added, however, that there was little likelihood any ruling would prevent the drum and bugle corps, which has asked to be included in the guard plans, from becoming a unit.

Attorney General Filo Sedillo has been permitted to practice before the supreme court of the United States. Sedillo, in Washington on business, was sponsored before the high tribunal by Charles Fahy, former Santa Fe attorney, now assistant U. S. solicitor general.

Clyde Faulk, state highway department office engineer, has been appointed editor of the Highway Journal, a section of New Mexico Magazine, State Highway Engineer Burton Dwyre announced today. Faulk succeeds the late Ray Bennett, assistant office engineer, who died last week.

The Dec. 10 state land office auction of oil and gas leases will include thirty-four tracts in Eddy and Lea Counties comprising 8,080 acres. It will be the largest sale during the term in office of Land Commissioner Frank Worden.

Governor Miles has accepted appointment to the governors' com-

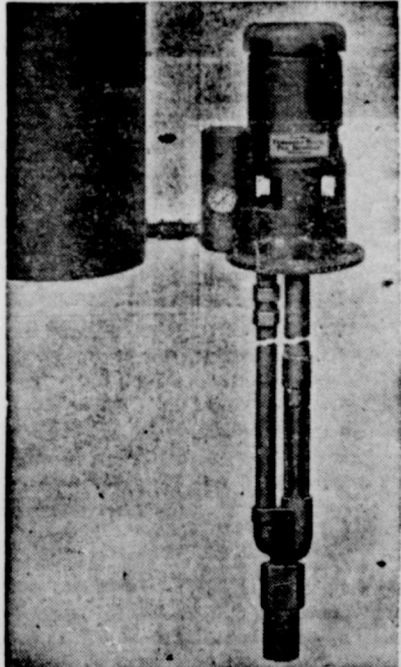

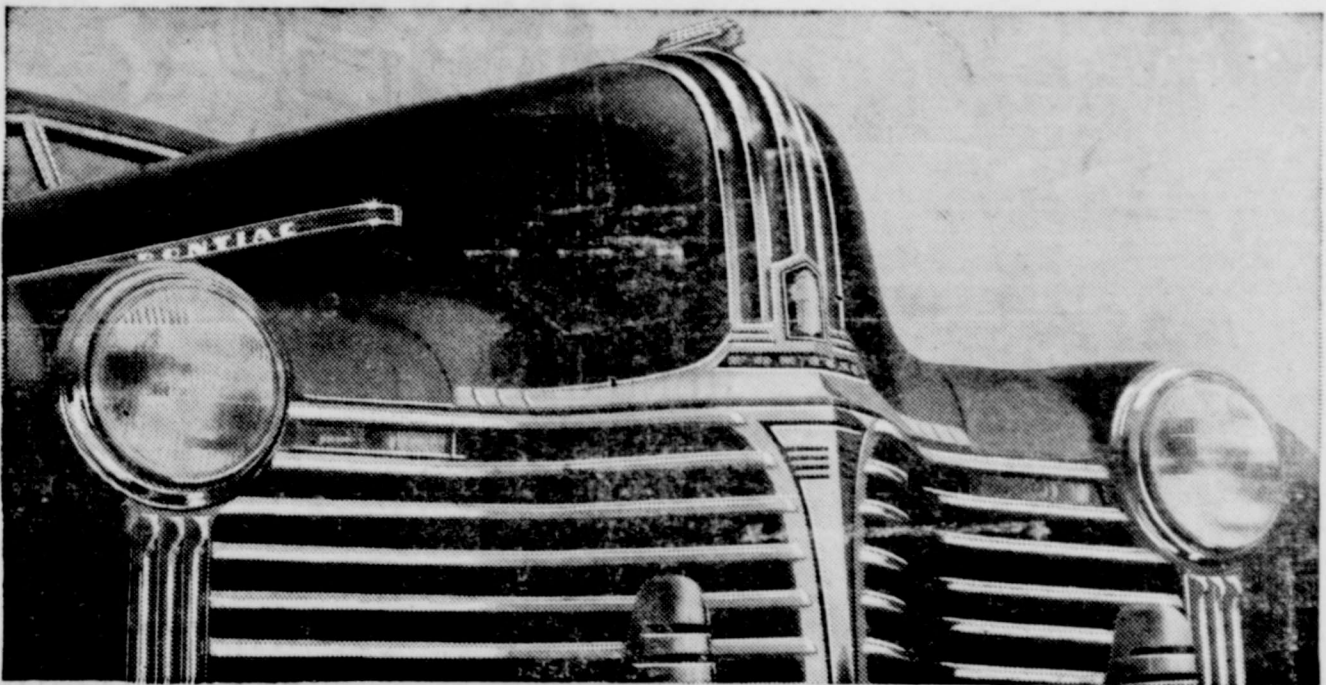

# Here's How the Gateway Bowl Game Stacked Up From Sideline Observation Here on Friday

**Tixier, Clayton Fullback, Is Outstanding Player, Even Though His Team Comes Out Short End.**

In the Gateway Bowl game L. B. Tixier, 145-pound Clayton fullback and signal caller, turned in the greatest exhibition of all-around football playing ever witnessed in Artesia, setting up the lone Yellowjacket score and carrying it over into Hobbs pay dirt, then topping it all off by calmly drop-kicking the extra point, the first drop-kick seen by many fans in a high school game in many years.

Tixier carried the ball in his crashing, jarring style forty-six times during the game and piled up a total of 180 yards, which was better than 4.1 yards a try. He also did all the booting for Clayton, kicking seven times for a total of 200 yards, which is well over 28.5 yards per try, and would have had a perfect day had it not been for his fourth down quick kick being blocked late in the third period, giving Hobbs a safety. And that would not have happened had the line held and given him time to get the boot away. The little Frenchman also intercepted a pass and skittered back with it twenty-five yards before being stopped.

Warren Musteen, Hobbs' outstanding passing ace, dropped into the background, but still managed to do himself justice, getting away two passes, one for forty-eight yards and the other for fifty-two yards. The former set up the first Eagle tally on the Clayton 12-yard line and the last was good for the second Hobbs touchdown. He also made good two out of two place-kick tries for extra points.

Jerry Stoltz, Eagles' stellar center, and Pete Zinck, outstanding sophomore tackle for the Yellowjackets, played the outstanding defensive game for their teams. Stoltz intercepted a pass in the final stanza on the Clayton 20-yard line and ran it back for a score and Zinck's tackling and blocking was practically perfection. Stoltz also blocked the punt which resulted in a safety for Hobbs.

After being played off their feet the first half, the Hobbs Eagles took to the air and although the Yellowjackets did a lot of buzzing around, they could not stop three disastrous tosses. Two of the three Eagles' scores came by the air route, one being set up by a long pass and the other being

good for the tally itself. Hobbs blocked Tixier's punt in the closing minutes of the third quarter, which rolled back in the Clayton end zone for an automatic safety and two points. The Eagles scored three times in the last period and place-kicked all three extra points, while the lone Yellowjacket tally came midway in the same canto and Tixier drop-kicked for the conversion.

Hobbs got the scoring ball rolling in the last minute of the third quarter, when Stoltz broke through the Clayton line to block Tixier's fourth down kick on the Clayton 15-yard line for the safety.

On the first play after the Clayton kick-off to Hobbs, Musteen got away a pretty 48-yard pass to Bill Clemens, Eagles' fullback, completed to the Yellowjacket 15-yard line as the third period ended. On the second play of the final canto Clemens crashed off right tackle for the score from the eight-yard line. Clemens then converted, using the place-kick method.

Scarcely three minutes later it was Musteen again, getting away a beautiful 52-yard spiral toss into the waiting arms of Clemens on the Clayton three-yard line and Clemens went over untouched for the counter. Musteen made good his place-kick try for extra point.

Clayton made its lone tally the tough way on a steady drive down the field with Tixier, as ever, doing the lion's share of the lugging. The Yellowjackets began their scoring march when the Frenchman intercepted Musteen's first down pass on his own 25-yard stripe and ran it back to the 50-yard line. There Clayton was on the march and there was little Hobbs could do about it. After first picking up two first-and-tens, a 15-yard penalty for unnecessary roughness on the part of the Eagles helped Clayton along to another on the Hobbs 15-yard line. Then Tixier hit the line twice for six yards a try and another first down on the three-yard line. Four plays later it was Tixier scoring off right tackle from the Hobbs one-foot line. Tixier then executed his drop-kick neatly for the extra point.

It looked as if Clayton wasn't out of the ball game in the least, when minutes later Vigil, Yellowjacket tackle, intercepted a desperate lateral from Musteen on the Eagles' 27-yard line and ran it over for the score after the Hobbs back had been hit hard. The officials, however, ruled that the whistle had blown before Musteen

lateraled and therefore was dead at that point. Musteen had been tackled and was going down backwards when he threw the ball away.

Jerry Stoltz wound up the scoring for the day when he intercepted Tixier's first-down pass on the Clayton 20-yard line and whirled out of two tacklers' arms to go over standing up for the final touchdown. Musteen again place-kicked for the conversion.

**State Adds 12,000 Bales of Cotton To National Total**

Nearly Thirteen Million in the Country This Year Estimated

New Mexico cotton growers added an estimated 12,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight to the national total production of 12,686,000 bales this year, it was announced by the Department of Agriculture.

The national total was down from 12,847,000 bales estimated a month ago, but above the actual 11,817,000 bales produced last year. The 1929-38 ten-year average was 13,547,000 bales.

It was estimated that in New Mexico there remained 105,000 acres left for harvest from the 108,000 acres in cultivation July 1. The indicated yield was 561 pounds per acre.

The yield of lint cotton was estimated at 252.4 pounds to the acre throughout the nation, compared with 252.1 pounds indicated a month ago, 237.9 pounds produced last year, and 198.1 pounds for the ten-year average.

Cotton acreage estimated for harvesting this year is 24,078,000 acres compared with 24,222,000 acres last year; the abandonment was placed at 4 per cent of the acreage in cultivation July 1 as compared with 2.9 per cent last year. The acreage in cultivation July 1 was 25,073,000 compared with 24,943,000 acres a year ago.

The Census Bureau reported that cotton of this year's growth ginned to Dec. 1 totalled 10,870,247 running bales, counting round as half bales and excluding linters, compared with 11,110,486 bales ginned to that date a year ago, and 11,230,522 bales two years ago.

The Census Bureau report on ginnings to Dec. 1 included: Arizona 102,872 running bales and 131,796 a year ago; New Mexico 90,572 and 78,287; Texas 2,849,351 and 2,617,643.

**Local Ginnings**

Cotton ginned in New Mexico through Nov. 30 of the current season showed a smaller percentage of grades extra white strict middling and above than cotton ginned during the corresponding period last year, according to the Agricultural Marketing Service. About 42 per cent of the ginnings for this season was extra white strict middling and above as compared with about 59 per cent for the same period last year. Grades extra white strict middling and above decreased from about 47 per cent during the first half of November to about 11 per cent during the last half of November. The proportion of staple lengths 1 1/2 inches and longer increased from about 16 per cent last year to about 28 per cent this year for the season through Nov. 30. About 79 per cent of the cotton ginned in New Mexico through Nov. 30 was tenderable on futures contracts. Ginnings of upland cotton in New Mexico through Nov. 30 totalled 90,572 bales for the 1940 crop and 78,787 bales for the 1939 crop, according to the Bureau of the Census. ### Economists Look For Increase In Number of Animals

#### Upward Trend Since 1930 Continues, College Men Say

Practically all classes of meat animals are increasing in numbers over the country as a whole, according to a report of the economics section of the Extension Service, released at State College. Cattle numbers have been on an upward tendency since 1938 and the college economists believe the increase during 1940 will amount to about two million head, which will bring the number to above seventy million head, or the highest since 1934.

While sheep numbers have not changed materially during the last decade, a slight upward tendency has been evidenced during recent years and during 1940 a very slight increase, if any, was expected.

Hog numbers have increased sharply during the last three years, bringing the total number to almost the same level as the peak reached in 1933-34. A net decrease during 1940 is likely, according to the report.

The expected increase in the number of cattle that will be on feed this season will be principally in the Corn Belt, as no change was anticipated in New Mexico or the rest of the West. Lamb feeding is expected to be larger than a year earlier, particularly through-out the Corn Belt.

Significance of these increases in livestock numbers, the college economists point out, is that increases in slaughter and marketing of livestock will eventually result. Unless there is a corresponding increase in the consumer demand for meats, a downward tendency in prices is predicted.

During the coming year, however, consumer demand is expected to be strong enough to hold cattle prices at a level equal to or above that of last year. Outlook for lambs and wools is mostly favorable for a higher price level during 1941.

### '41 Program Is To Emphasize Quality of Seed

The importance of using good quality seed when planting soil-building crops will be emphasized even more strongly under the 1941 AAA farm program than in previous years, according to Fred L. O'Cheskey, chairman of the state AAA committee.

Use of good quality seed has been a requirement of all previous programs, but the 1941 agricultural conservation program strengthens the requirement by specifying that a farmer will not receive payment for planting soil-building crops if it is determined by the county AAA committee that the seed used did not meet the requirements of good farming practice.

The state AAA committee, with the aid of state agricultural specialists, will establish minimum specifications for determining whether the various seeds are locally adapted to the climate, are free of weed seed and have high germination quality. The county AAA committee will decide whether the seed used by farmers will meet these requirements.

It is expected that the new provisions, which are effective immediately, will result in better quality soil-conserving crops having fewer weeds, thereby further increasing conservation and improvement of the soil.

### Eddy Listed for Fifty-Eight Men in Second Quota

New Mexico's second call quota for selective service has been set tentatively at 925 men, with the Eddy County quota at fifty-eight men, Adj. Gen. R. C. Carlton announced last week.

It was expected the second call draftees would be inducted about Jan. 5.

Eddy County's first call last month for nine men was made up of volunteers, so no one had to be drafted.

For the second time, Luna County will not be required to furnish any men for selective service training. Because of its heavy proportion of Regular Army, Navy and National Guard volunteers, it still has a credit of thirty-two men.

### No Soap for Hair Clipper, Razors and Quart of Bay Rum

While the aid of around 80,000 volunteer workers with state and local boards has been invaluable for the success of selective service, their lack of experience in connection with government accounting gives rise to amusing and sometimes startling incidents.

Picture the surprise of Major Chauncey G. Parker, Jr., chief of the Finance and Supply Section of National Headquarters, Selective Service System, when confronted recently with a request from a local board to pay for one hair clipper, a half dozen razors and a quart of bay rum.

Investigation developed with the demand originating in the use of a barber shop as a registration office last Oct. 16. The morning after, the proprietor reported to the local board that some predatory or absentminded person, during registration, had departed with the itemized accessories for tonorial ministrations and he demanded reimbursement.

"No soap," declared the hard-boiled Major Parker of the Marine Corps, and the request was courteously refused.

### Most New Mexico Artisans Soon Are Expected to Be Employed

For the first time in more than a decade, skilled labor throughout the state actually can look forward to seeing most artisans at work.

This bright spot in New Mexico's economic map was seen today in a labor market report released by Roy L. Cook, chairman of the unemployment compensation commission. The report was gathered by the State Employment Service.

The Fort Bliss Cantonment construction, the Fort Wingate ordnance depot project, scheduled to begin early next year, the proposed Air Corps base at Albuquerque and a threatened shortage of skilled tradesmen in Santa Fe and Carlsbad caused labor's Christmas stocking to bulge with actual and prospective pay envelopes.

Big package for labor contained in the report was prospective reconstruction work on Highways 70, 80 and 85 for defense purposes. This huge undertaking to widen highways in the state, bolster and build bridges would provide 11,586 man-months of skilled and unskilled labor and consume \$1,500,000.

There is possibility that Deming will be successful in its efforts to obtain a permanent army post which has been tentatively allotted to Fort Riley, Kan., the report stated. In that event, a shortage of construction workers in that area will develop. Proposed construction of manganese stock piles and a manganese mill at Deming by the Newal-Pitt Corporation (government contract) would fur-

ther deplete the reserves of manpower in that section.

Carlsbad State Employment Service office reported increased demands for construction tradesmen and clerical workers. Recruitment of labor at Carlsbad was done by referring job seekers from other state employment offices and clearance of service registrants intrastate.

The Hobbs area saw a decrease in its supply of oil field workers, while Artesia fields looked to a slight hike in employment because of the wage hour law.

The usual oversupply of clerical workers in Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Las Vegas and Hot Springs was cited in the report. Although 250 miners remained unemployed in Raton, the picture was brightened when one company re-hired fifty coal miners laid off in August, while Phelps Dodge Corporation hired twenty coal miners, the first hiring activity in Raton by this company in three years.

Defense industry training courses were being conducted at New Mexico Normal University, State College, Raton and Clayton. Similar courses were in progress at Albuquerque High School. The Employment Service is cooperating with these defense measures by properly classifying the trainees' skills and making them available for armament jobs.

All coal miners in the Gallup area are working full or part time. Skilled labor was plentiful in Roswell, but migratory workers were becoming a problem. The service has been advised funds are available for an aviation ground school to be established in Albuquerque.

### Saint Nick Will Not Be Visitor On Naval Ships

Saint Nicholas is not likely to be a visitor aboard any of the United States warships this year, although he was formerly a welcome guest at Christmastime.

His coming was heralded by hundreds of children who lived in the vicinity of navy yards. They were invited aboard ship by the sailors and marines who gave them a feast and provided a "Santa Claus" who distributed gifts to their juvenile guests.

Today the navy yards are closed to visitors as a reasonable precaution against sabotage and espionage. What had become a well-established tradition has been temporarily abandoned.

According to Admiral Hugh Rodman, U.S.N. (retired), the custom started aboard the U.S.S. New York in 1915 and spread rapidly to other ships of the Navy. Funds for entertaining the children were donated by the sailors and marines who found the smiles of the happy youngsters more than an ample reward.

Two years after its first Christmas party, the New York, which had become known as the "Christmas Ship," left suddenly to join naval vessels in European waters. The crew had expected to be in an American port, but Christmas found them at Edinburgh, Scotland.

This sudden shift in plans did not deter the bluejackets or marines who rounded up 125 Scotch warifs, many of whom were war orphans. They brought them to the dock in buses and thence aboard ship where they were given a good dinner, toys, presents and two bright silver shillings—probably the most cash any of them had ever possessed at one time.

For nearly a quarter of a century American naval vessels entertained children at Christmas, and there is every reason to believe that in due time this pleasant custom will be revived.

### Farm Placements Expected to Drop During This Month

#### As Harvest Eases Off, Employment Service Seeks Other Fields

With most of the agricultural harvest out of the way, New Mexico State Employment Service officials are looking to other fields of employment to take up the labor slack. Agricultural communities during October supplied 84 per cent of the 8,680 jobs filled by the service, but farm placements were expected to drop sharply this month.

The Clovis Employment Service topped the state with 3,160, mostly in broom corn and wheat fields. In other agricultural areas, Artesia had 66 placements, Carlsbad 1,544, Las Cruces 1,052 and Roswell 1,575. Totals from the remainder of the 16 local offices of the service ranged down from 290 in Albuquerque to 15 in Gallup and the same number in Taos.

Other October placements: Hobbs 44, Las Vegas 159, Raton 79, Santa Fe 108, Silver City 68, Tucumcari 112, Alamogordo 269, Hot Springs 124.

Industrial distribution of placements for September were: Agriculture, forestry and fishing 1,458, construction 357, domestic service 393, mining 12, manufacturing 34, transportation, communication and public utilities 23, wholesale and retail trade 85, finance, insurance and real estate 8, service industries 60, government service 22.

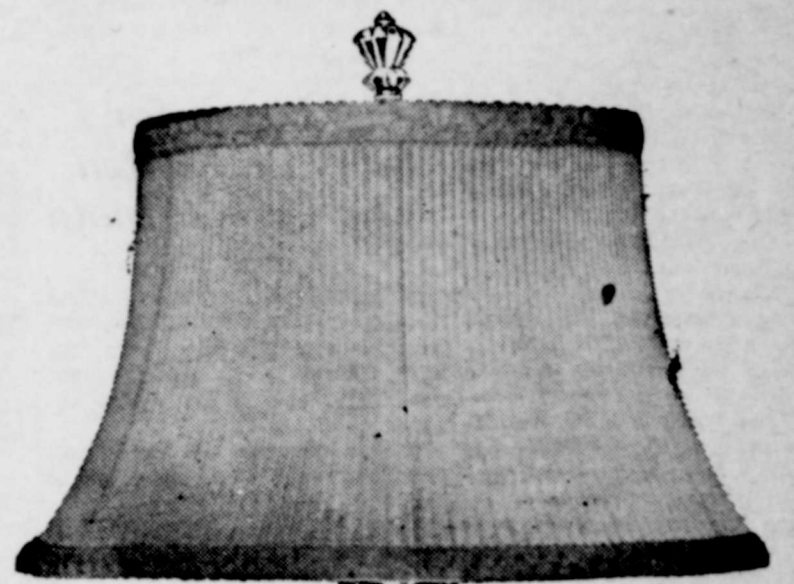

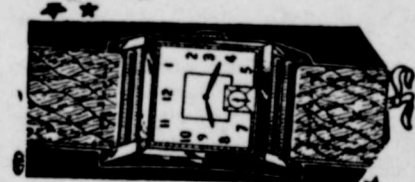

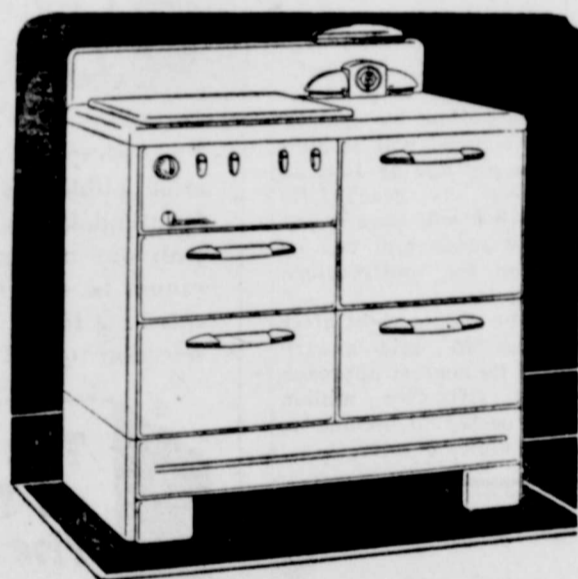

**Food Stamp to Be Used Here**

Here is the stamp to be used under the food stamp plan, which will go into effect at 9 o'clock next Wednesday morning, Dec. 18, in Eddy County and nine other counties of New Mexico.

Approximately 16,500 persons are receiving public assistance in the ten counties, all in Southeast-



New Mexico. All will be made eligible next Wednesday to purchase food order stamps like the facsimile pictured here.

The Surplus Marketing Administration office at Albuquerque announced Artesia food merchants would be invited to attend a meeting in Carlsbad prior to the date the stamps go into effect, at which all food merchants of Eddy County will be instructed in the use and limitations of the stamps.

The office said the importance of this project to the people of the state of New Mexico is of great public interest. It is estimated that with the addition of this ten-county area to those already operating the stamp plan, there will be more than a million dollars worth of additional surplus foods moved annually through regular trade channels in the total of sixteen counties. That will not only benefit the farmers, the Albuquerque office said, but general business and about 59,200 needy persons in the entire area as well.

Studies show that on the average throughout the country, these needy people have been living on about 5c a meal per person, and under the food stamp plan they may get half again as much food for their money.

State and county welfare departments are busily engaged in the preparation of all mailings to those who are to be made eligible to participate in the plan.

(Continued from page 1) ningham less than three months ago.

By Saturday night of this week it should be visible to the naked eye in the western sky, astronomers figure. It has been seen for the last few days through prism glasses and for a night or two through field glasses.

When it becomes visible, it will be noted to be a head nearest the horizon, with its tail pointing towards the meridian, as the tail of a comet always points away from the sun.

Cunningham's Comet was discovered at the Harvard University Observatory.

Astronomers predicted an elliptical rise and fall of the comet in the west—although its exact geographic orbit, elliptical, hyperbolic or parabolic was not as yet estimated—and said that by tonight the head of the comet will be high in the western sky and by Dec. 28 it will just about have reached its peak. By Jan. 5 it will have begun to drift to the south and will be back almost on the southwestern horizon by Jan. 19.

It will best be visible right after darkness, and in mid-January when it makes its nearest approach to the earth, fifty-five million miles, it is expected to become as bright as the planet Jupiter.
