WE'RE PROUD OF THOSE YOUNG FELLOWS

We felt mighty proud of the young fellows who shoved off Monday morning for a year of training in Uncle Sam's forces and the milling around of about 200 persons at the American Legion hut carried us back just twenty-three years to a similar occasion.

Of course, this country was at war then, but we'll wager that every boy who left Artesia Monday morning realizes that he may see action under war conditions before he is paid off at the end of his one-year hitch. And we imagine every one of them had mingled feelings and thoughts, just as we did more than two decades ago.

The chief idea behind the national defense program is that if we are sufficiently armed and trained no nation nor combination of nations would dare meet the United States in armed conflict, which at present means invasion of these shores.

But Japan is more and more outspoken about conflict with the United States, a program she has been fostering for many years with an eye on our West Coast. Little has been said about what Japan has been planning, but it is a fact, and she thinks that the time is about ripe, with Britain greatly weakened, the British fleet occupied elsewhere and with an excuse that the United States actually is at war against the Axis, in Japan's eyes.

Other nations refuse to admit we do not wish an extension of territory-although they know we have no ulterior motives in arming. But Japan is using that as an excuse.

So we are likely to tangle with Japan, while Germany will do what damage she can through fifth column activities, concentrating mostly the while on England. And we will be busy in the Pacific and in the Western Hemisphere, too busy to help England much. That is the way they figure it out.

And that is why we probably will have a bit of scrapping to do and that is why those young Artesia lads-and thousands like them from all over the nation-are very important at this time.

They know what may happen and they took the step of their own accord.

That is why we are mighty proud of them-young Americans all.
