That set us to thinking and the more we thought about it the worms would rob him of the flesh; more we were inclined to agree-not that democracy is failing to Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath work, but that many citizens believe it is.

Which resolves itself into the truth that we are as we think. Back and death." in 1929 and 1930 we thought ourselves into a much worse state of affairs than needed be. Later the leaders of the nation helped us think ourselves back to a degree of prosperity by the power of suggestion

Adolf Hitler led his people into thinking that the Germans were being mistreated by the Checks and the Poles and others.

Labor leaders through the psychology of thinking and suggestion lead workmen into believing they are being underpaid and that capital is getting more than the lion's share.

We must never allow ourselves to think that democracy cannot work, nor that it is failing. It has worked many decades and no one thought much about it-just took it in the collective stride of the nation.

Then came world unrest, dating back to World War I days and the days of reconstruction, with the infiltration of "isms," the proponents of which suggested that democracy could not continue and that a new world order must come to be.

How foolish! Pretty is as pretty does can be paraphrased to pretty is as pretty thinks.

Personally we think this nation is mighty pretty and that our form of government gives to the masses more actual living and comfort than any or all of the others.

If we could accomplish only one thing in our allotted short time on this globe, it would be our desire to set all of the people to thinking as we do, to believing that there is no greater nation than ours, never has been, nor ever will be; that we, as individuals, have more living in comfort than could be had were we under any other form of government; that we must stop looking on the sour side of things, for we must realize there is a certain amount of bitter with the sweet; and last, but not least, that-

We as a nation must immediately think ourselves into national defense-with the physical effort necessary to maintain our life, lib-erty and pursuit of happiness.

In that way we need not fear that democracy is not working.
