Mr. Polk, who had eaten dinner at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Runyan, lay down after the meal for a nap, from which he did not awaken.

He had suffered several previous heart attacks, the first about eleven years ago, and recently he had been cautioned to keep quiet and not exert himself for fear of a recurrence of the ailment.

John Lee Polk, or "Tex" Polk as everyone knew him, was born at Richland, Navarro County, Tex., Nov. 16, 1875, a son of Jim and Alla Morgan Polk, and was a Penasco Rancher Found by Horse member of an old Southern family, the Polk family of Tennessee.

He was raised on the range and engaged in the ranching business in Texas prior to coming to Artesia Sept. 8, 1914, since when he had been in the livestock commission and real estate businesses here. ### Rain First Eight Months Is Double : Normal for Year ?

ust, During Which 3.79 Was Recorded

Continued rains during August brought the total in Artesia for the first eight months of 1941 to 24.28 inches, more than two times the normal rainfall or the total for 1940, which was 10.19 inches.

Precipitation in August, recorded on eight different days, totaled 3.79 inches, slightly above the 3.68 inches in July, according to the Gas Company, from which readings are taken for the Weather Bureau.

Appreciable rainfall has been recorded each month this year, from a low of .72 inch in February to the record May reading of 10.15 inches, during which month the Pecos and Rio Grande Valleys had bad floods, including the destructive flood at Carlsbad in which several lives were lost and many persons were left homeless.

### TWO SIRENS HAVE OWN TOWER NOW

The new, high-pitched siren, to be used for the blackout Sept. 12 and as a substitute in case the old fire siren ever gets out of whack, has been mounted on a new steel tower erected behind the fire station and city hall for the two. The fire siren will be taken from the Ward building and placed on the forty-fourfoot tower within the next few days.

The new siren was given a try-out Monday evening, when the blackout signal of four short blasts, a pause and four more short blasts was sounded.

In case either siren at any time is out of commission, the other will be substituted for it.

#### THINK THIS OVER

As the time approaches for the first statewide blackout ever tried in the United States, more and more people are viewing the experiment in serious vein.

When New Mexico communities cooperate the night of Sept. 12 in the test, hundreds of workers will be on the job, going about their special tasks just as though an air blitz were in progress and that we were in danger of being bombed off the map.

No one believes that Hitler will attempt an invasion of the Western Hemisphere this month or this year-perhaps never. But there is an old saying about a "stitch in time saves nine," which, had it

been applied in Europe, would have saved many lives. The trouble there was that the lightning thrusts of the blitz form of warfare and the aerial bombing of civilian centers were new, un- partments for each age group and

tried, not realized. But we have the advantage, through studying the plight of Euro-

pean nations, of realizing what such attacks are like. And we have, time after time, said that Hitler soon must run out of manpower and out of resources. But each time we think he has stretched his armed forces to the breaking point, he accomplishes new miracles, takes new territory and launches fresh drives.

So it was when he made war on his former Axis ally, Russia. cons' meeting. That would be the breaking point for the German armies and the end of the endurance of her own peoples, we hoped and prayed. Still, slowly, but surely. Hitler's forces seem to be penetrating deep into missionary auxiliaries' meeting; Russia. It is true that Russia has not been brought to her knees, and 7:30-8:30 p. m., prayer and Bible she may be saved by the coming of winter, but it seems Germany is study; 8:30-9 p. m., teachers' meetlittle weakened by the campaign.

If Russia is taken—what next?

If and when that comes, Japan will find renewed hope and will make more threatening remarks and commit more "incidents," until hood on third Thursday. we almost certainly will be in the war. We can only hope that it will not come to that.

But it might. And when that times does come, the deeply implanted Nazi organizations in the Americas will start their internal work of destruction more openly and anew. Sabotage will be rife. Actual fighting will begin on this hemisphere. And in the confusion -who knows?-there might be an invasion.

It all sounds very remote. Yes, and so did many incidents of the last two years-the first two years of World War II-at which any of us would have laughed before Sept. 1, 1938. That all is history now. But history still is being made, very rapidly, and will

It is better to have a good blackout test and never go to war, than to go to war and never have a blackout test.

Think that over, and cooperate yourself and help make everyone

else conscious of what is planned, enlisting the physical and moral assistance of everyone in New Mexico.

### TRUE SPIRIT OF COOPERATION

We have noticed only one New Mexico editor who is not in entire accord with the statewide blackout idea. Carey Holbrook of The Health City Sun, Albuquerque, and he exercises his American priv-

But he shows of what kind of stuff he is made when he declares that if it is going to be held, he will be right on the job doing his part. That is cooperation and civic-mindedness.

We only hope that those few citizens in Artesia who think, as does Holbrook, that it is "a nutty idea," do not let their personal prejudices interfere with the program, but step in and cooperate like good fellows.

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

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

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
